1993-94 Budget Adopted **At March Council Meeting**

The City Council of the City of the Mayor and the City Adminis-Munday met March 9 in regular session at the Munday City Hall. All members were present.

Mayor Albus called the meeting to order at 7:04 p.m. and ordered the reading of previous minutes. Minutes of the February 9 meeting were read and approved.

Mayor Albus declared that the Public Hearing to consider the 1993-94 Budget was in progress and would remain so until the end of the meeting. Public input will be requested at that time.

The Council received a proposal from Knox County Hospital regarding the ambulance service. After deliberation, Andrade moved to accept the proposal pending approval of a formal contract. All were in favor.

The Council entered into Executive Session at 7:55 p.m. to discuss city employees and property. Regular session resumed at 8:23 p.m. No official action was

The decision as to how to vote on May 1 regarding school finance will have a dramatic effect on the The amount of money to be recapschools of Texas.

Passage of the propositions should ensure the continued operation of schools as we now know across the state. The continued process of recapture will enable the state to flow money to schools in a similar fashion as the prior two years.

What is not known at this time is how this will impact local taxes, whether it be in the form of just local taxes or in combination with

Recapture would only take money from the wealthiest counties, which according to reliable sources would be 33, and redistribute that money by some method to schools in the other counties. tured is estimated at about 400 million. Munday I.S.D. will contribute \$242,000 toward the C.E.D. in 1992-93 and is scheduled to receive \$570,000 from the C.E.D.

Some legislative sources believe that failure of the first proposition on the May 1 ballot would result in mass consolidation of school districts across the state. This belief is shared by many professional educational organizations around the state. Consolidation could re-

tricts and no one seems to know what the final outcome would be.

Some people believe that other options exist if amendment one fails on May 1. Failure of amendment one on May 1 would not necessarily result in the closing of schools on June 1. Judge Scott McCown has ruled that failure to have a constitutional finance system in place by June 1, 1993, would result in a stoppage of state and C.E.D. fnds. Schools would continue to operate out of reserve funds and/or borrowed money. Some districts have indicated that they would be unable to pay bills through the summer if these funds are stopped June 1.

Retired City Administrator Walter M. Hertel is in our spotlight this week.

Walter was born September 5, 1925, in Knox City to Walter R. and Elnora A. Hertel. He has two brothers and one sister.

Raised in Benjamin, Walter attended 11 years in the Benjamin school, graduating in 1942.

Following graduation, he entered the military service, U.S. Army division, on December 27, 1943, serving in England, France and Germany. During a furlough from Camp Carson, Colorado, he and Peggy Trainham were married in Seymour on May 5, 1944. Walter was discharged on April 13, 1946. "Two years, three months and seventeen days, I counted them!" Walter said. "I was ready to return home to my young wife."

The couple made their home in Benjamin, where Walter served as City Manager until 1969. During this time, three sons were born, Gary Mat, who was a victim of cystic fibrosis and died in 1954, Larry Don, now a city engineer for the City of Lubbock, and Walter Timothy, a construction engineer for the Texas Department of Transportation served by Wichita Falls. They now have two grandchildren, Gregory, 14, and Kristi, 10.

Walter accepted the position of City Administrator for the City of Munday in 1969, a position he held until his retirement in 1990. He was involved in many improvements during his 21 years of service to Munday. "I feel the Corps of Engineers' million dollar drainage ditch was the most important project for Munday. How can a town grow or do anything else when we did not know when all work had to be dropped and downtown business doors had to be sandbagged to keep floodwater out?" Other projects completed were the storm sewer construc-

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tion, which was the first storm sewer grant in Texas, paving projects, airport construction, and a new city hall, which all citizens of Munday are proud of.

Walter's recommendation to the citizens of Munday is, "Be proud of your mayor and city councilmen. Some of the finest people I know served during my tenure in office, and they and the present mayor and council deserve our thanks for the many hours of service they give to us. Problems they face are much greater than most of us realize.

"My thanks to each citizen of Munday for your support given to me for 21 years, and to the present city administration for maintaining existing facilities and seeking ways to further improve our city.'

Walter fulfilled his dream occupation by working with others to help promote progress in Munday, and therefore help the citi-

The most famous person Walter and Peggy met was President Lyndon B. Johnson. They were on vacation, and as the President drove down the Pedernales River at his Johnson City Ranch, his convertible stopped periodically to visit with vacationers. "He had a pretty blond driving for him. We wondered if she was his chauffeur, granddaughter, or what!"

"The most important person in my life, and also in my career, is Peggy, my wife, who patiently listened to my sometimes seemingly insurmountable problems."

The best advice Walter received was from his father. He taught him how to work, and stressed that it wasn't a sin to work.

What would you do if you won the grand prize in the Texas Lottery? I would give some to family members, help my children, and travel more as long as my wife and I were physically able.

Favorite city - Next to Munday, it has to be Corpus Christi, the sparkling city by the sea, which is my favorite vacation spot, as is the Rockport area.

Favorite movie - "Love Story" starring Ali McGraw and Ryan O'Neal, and "Curly Sue"; actor -Burt Reynolds; actress - Brook Shields; comic strip - "Sally Forth"; TV show - Evening Shade and Matlock; magazine - Readers Digest; food - steak; recreation visiting the Johnny High Country Music Review in Fort Worth; song - "God Bless the USA."

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

Steps Should Be Taken To Control Ticks And Fleas

Ticks and fleas are very prominent in this part of Texas. They carry diseases that not only affect pets, but also humans. These diseases include Ehrlichiosis, Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever, and Lymes disease.

Ehrlichiosis is caused by the ickettsial organism ehrlichia and s carried by the brown dog tick. The organism is transmitted from he tick to the dog or man through plood. This disease causes high fever, enlarged lymph nodes, decreased appetite, depression, weakness, and bleeding problems. It is diagnosed through clinical signs and serology.

Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever (RMSF) is an important disease in man and is caused by rickettsia rickettsii. It is known as "tick fever" in dogs. The dermacenter tick carries this organism. Clinical signs are very similar to those of Ehrlichiosis. The diagnosis is also made through scrology.

Lymes disease, caused by barretia burgdorter, is carried by the ixodes tick. Arthritis is the primary clinical sign in animals. Humans also develop arthritis and may exhibit skin rashes and headaches.

Treatment for these diseases in dogs is through oral antibiotics. It is important that treatment be continued at least two weeks.

These diseases can easily be prevented through the control of fleas and ticks. Due to the mild temperatures this winter, fleas and ticks are sure to be out in large numbers.

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washed, and your pet should be bathed and dipped. Yard products such as diazenon and malathion are both effective. Dogs with excessive hair may be sheared so that fleas and ticks are more easily noticed.

Great care should be taken in removing ticks. It is important that you do not come into contact with the blood. Your hands should always be washed thoroughly.

If you are uncomfortable removing ticks, contact your veterinarian for assistance.



My seminary class on "The Jewish Faith" is taught by Rabbi Zimmerman. It is a new experience for me to spend so much time with a Jew. In the first through twelfth grades I had a Jewish classmate, and I remember thinking that his name was odd: Goldstucker. But I never got to know him throughout our school years.

Now I am a preacher of the Christian faith, and I sit under a preacher of the Jewish faith. How do I feel about that? First, I hide my feelings. The Rabbi and I have much in common as fellow human beings. We both put on one trouser leg at a time. Furthermore, we share the same religious roots. Jesus was a Jew.

Christianity is the child of Judaism. But hiding or ignoring feelings will not work. They sneak out. After class I say something to the Rabbi which I thought was innocuous, even funny, but I immediately feel the blood rush out of my face and fellow classmates become deathly quiet. Then the Rabbi laughs and slaps me on the back! I quickly, fearfully,

the Rabbi. Is the monster of irrational, hateful, hurtful anti-Semitic prejudice in my heart, too?

I read in the Abilene newspaper this morning that 50 years ago today, at the start of Passover, the Jews of Warsaw, Poland began a valiant, month long defense of their ghetto against the German Nazis. The defense could not last, but it was valiant and joyful (!), the article says. The Nazis finally burned the ghetto down in May, 1943. All in all, 400,000 Warsaw Jews were destroyed, 3/4 of them in the gas chambers of Treblinka,

Today at Treblinka there is a commemoration of the uprising. Vice-president Gore is there. Rabbi Zimmerman is there, too. I wonder what he is thinking and feeling as he stands upon that holy, bloody ground. When I see him in class Thursday, I will wonder about my thoughts and feelings before I speak.

The Rabbi and I have much in common, but we also have much different. We pray to the same God, the God of Moses and Jesus Christ, but we pray with very different beliefs and heritages. I am not sure how to bridge such a chasm. A good slap on the back helps, though!
