### PROFIT ISN'T THE TROUBLE

At more or less frequent intervals, the newspapers still carry accounts of consumer "strikes" against retail stores. The participants pledge themselves to cut their buying to the minimum until the storekeepers reduce prices by 10 or 20 per cent or some other arbitrary figure.

This kind of consumer feeling may be understandable. But to blame the retailer for today's steep prices makes no sense at all. If the storekeepers—particularly those dealing in staple necessities—made no profit whatever, the average family's buying power would be increased very little.

The proof of that is found in statistical breakdowns of what happens to the money spent in typical stores. Practically all of it goes to buy supplies, to pay wages and taxes, for rent and maintenance, and for other unavoidable expenses. All that is left as profit, in most cases, is two to five cents out of each dollar rung up in the cash register.

There is one main reason why this should be so—competition. In this country all kinds of stores compete with each other. They are after your business. They try to outdo each other by offering better qualities, more extensive stocks, improved service—and more reasonable prices. Under that kind of a set-up, no one is going to be able to profiteer for long.

Retailers will be among the first to cheer if prices ever come down. And, in the meantime, they'll sell you what you want at the lowest cost possible.

Cotton holds a unique place among textile fibers, for it is the only fiber that is stronger wet than dry! Cotton's strength actually increases 25 percent when wet. The ability of cotton fabrics to withstand repeated washings is due largely to this wet strength property, along with cotton's excellent resistance to alkalis that are present in nearly all laundry soaps.

Cotton is the most important cash crop in the United States. It is valued at an average of more than Two Billion annually. The Cotton Belt covers nearly one-fourth of the nation's land area, reaching from Virginia to California. This year more than 22,200,000 acres are planted to cotton!

When early travelers to Asia first viewed cotton growing in the fields, they carried home to Europe fanciful tales of tiny limbs which grew on trees. The fluffy white fiber was thought to be "tree wool," and cotton plants were called "vegetable lambs."

### FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

This year, Fire Prevention Week will be observed from October 3 to 9. And never in our history has there been a time when the week was more important.

Our fire waste is still running at an all-time high. During the first seven months of this year alone the destruction amounted to more than \$437,000,000—far exceeding the total for the entire year of 1944. And we cannot blame this on higher prices and values. They are a factor, or course, but the fact remains that we are having more fires, and that the average fire is causing more destruction.

Fire prevention is especially important on farms and in rural areas, which usually lack first-class fire fighting facilities. According to the National Board of Fire Underwriters, farm fires takes 3,500 lives and do \$100,000,000 worth of damage annually. And nearly one-third of those fires could be prevented by the installation of lightning rods of the proper type on buildings. Other major causes of farm fires are improper handling of gasoline, and chimneys and flues which are "dirty" or in bad condition. Simple care and adequate maintenance would eliminate the vast majority of these dangers.

The toll of death and destruction by fire can and must be checked. Fire Prevention Week will witness a peak of activity by the forces whose job is to prevent fire and to educate the people in fire safety. If the country will listen and learn, this needless waste can be reduced now.

### REMEDY FOR THE MEAT SITUATION

The meat situation has been the subject of more loose and uninformed talk than practically anything else, ranging from unfounded charges that big profits are the cause of high prices, to political demands for a reimposition of price controls, which would discourage production and channel most of the available meat supply into black markets.

In the light of that, a statement recently issued by the American Meat Institute deserves wide reading. "The real remedy for the meat situation," it said, "is the production, as promptly as nature and other conditions will permit, of adequate numbers of meat animals." It then went on to make a series of specific suggestions for achieving this goal.

First, farmers should be encouraged to breed sows for late fall and early winter farrowing. Second, producers should be urged to use the new corn crop to feed spring pigs to reasonably heavy weights. Third, breeding herds should be rebuilt with younger stocks, and older, poorer producing cows should be marketed. Fourth, the slaughter of calves should be reduced. Fifth, producers must be assured of a continued relative strong demand for meat. Sixth, livestock conservation should be pushed.

This is a long range program, and it is based upon the sound principle that the country must have more meat—and that high meat prices are in large part the result of heavy demand in the face of a limited supply. Rationing and other government controls, as any school child can understand, would not increase the supply of meat by a single pound. Whenever the government interferes with the basic laws of economics, scarcity, not abundance, exists.

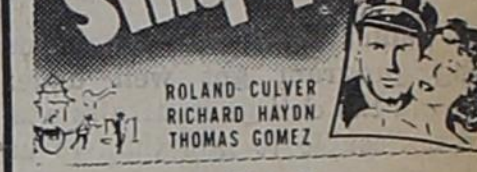

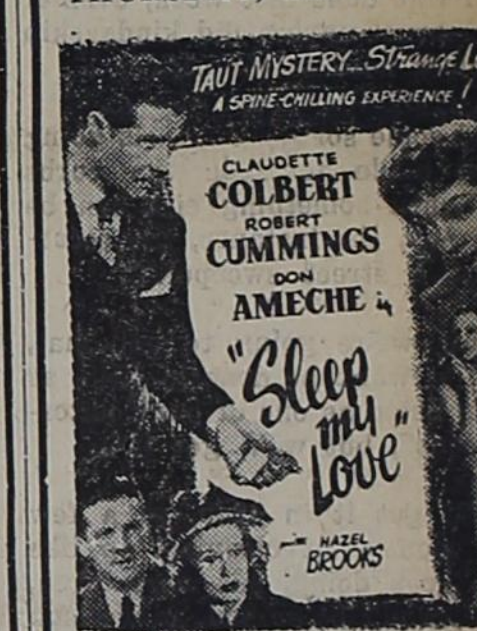

I don't like to see the government waste money, and spendin money to improve my place is about like tryin to put a windshield wiper on a walkin plow, and while it might be nice to have the

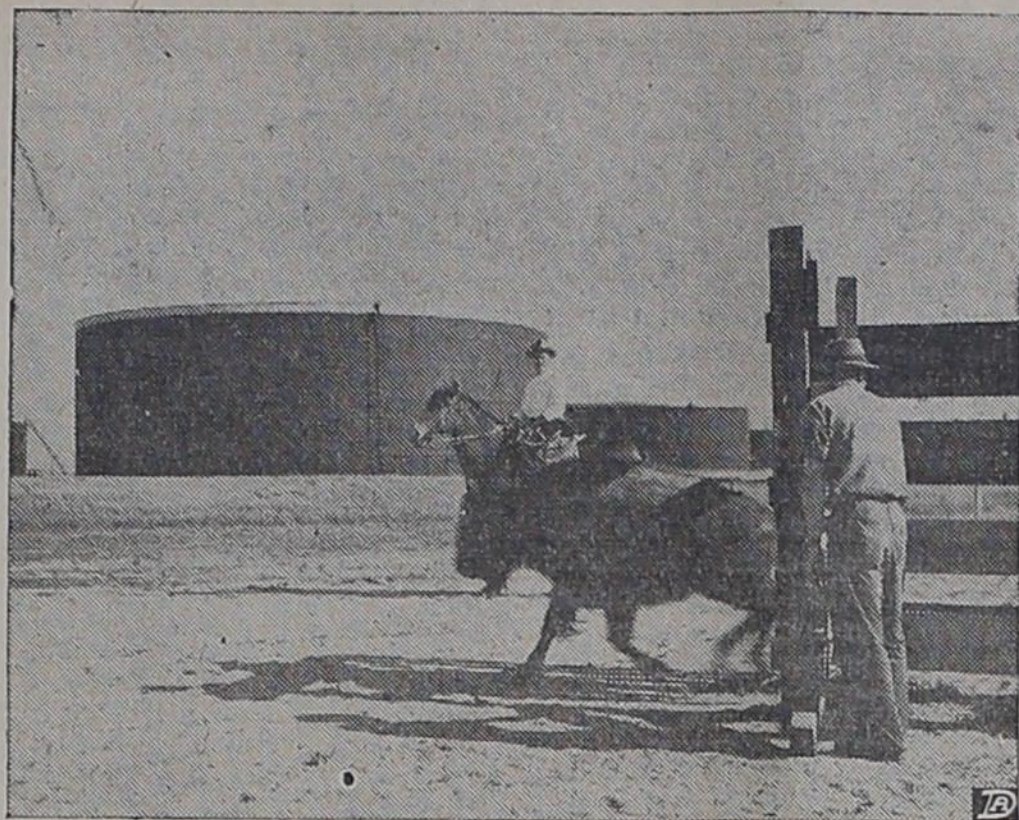

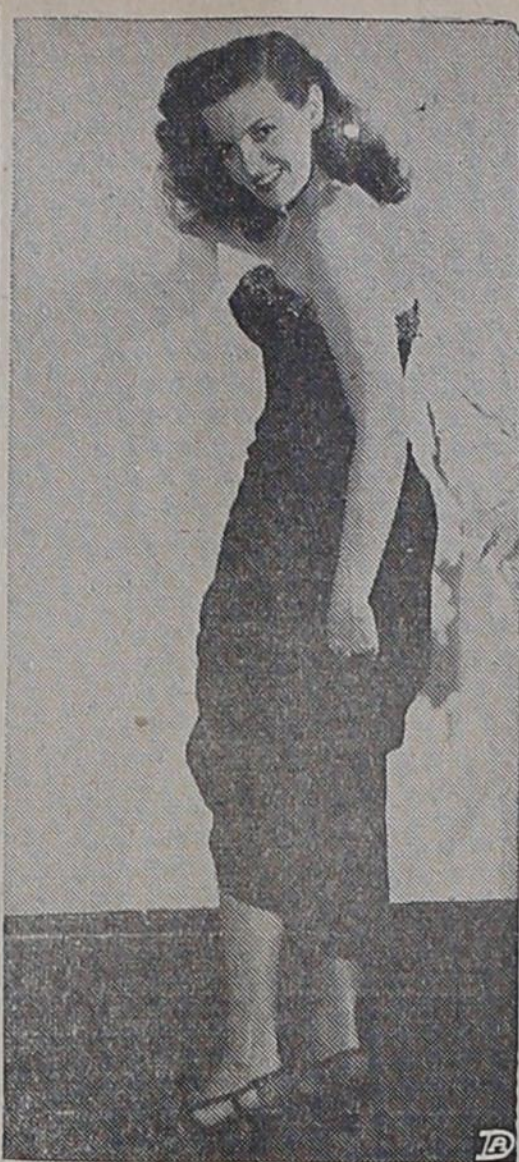

## Weekly Health LETTER

Issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox  
M. D., State Health Officer  
of Texas

Austin—A state-wide effort to reduce Texas' child accident toll of about 900 lives yearly through participation in the national child safety campaign in September was set forth by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, as an immediate public health objective calling for concerted cooperation by all public health and medical authorities and interested civic organizations within the state.

"The needless loss of a single life, or the crippling of even one child, is an exorbitant price to pay for any neglect of this problem," said Dr. Cox.

The importance of such a campaign is evidenced by the fact that accidents are now the leading cause of death among children more than one year old. Among children 5 to 9 years old, the death rate from accidents was 25.7 per 100,000, as compared with a rate of 4.6 for rheumatic fever and organic heart disease, the next cause; and among children from 9 to 14, the accident death rate was 20.8 and that for rheumatic fever and organic disease 7.2.

The outstanding improvement in the death rates from all non-accident causes during recent years is the result of the advance in medical science and concentrated efforts in the field of child health. The premise of the child safety campaign is that efforts now must be intensified to bring about a somewhat comparable reduction in the number of child accidents.

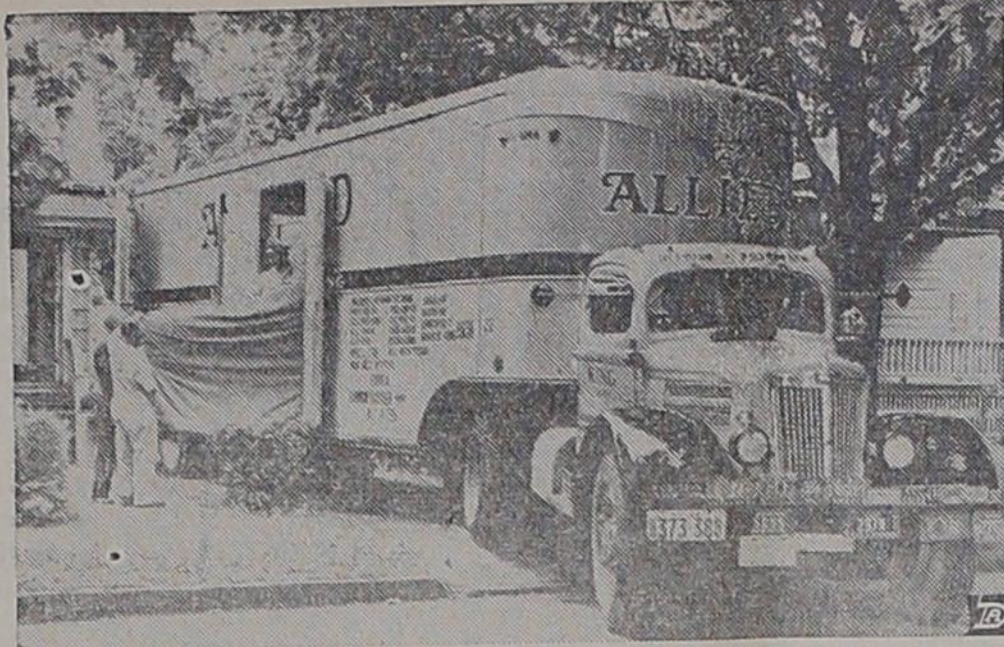
sible entitlement to income tax refunds, and of the necessity for applying for them before the end of the year, VA reports.

The refunds authorized by Public Law 867 of the 80th Congress, apply to certain income taxes of members of the armed forces who died while in active service between December 7, 1941 and December 31, 1947. Application must be made by December 31, 1948.

Subject to refund under the law are all Federal income taxes paid by or on behalf of such members of the armed forces for the taxable year in which they died, and for prior tax years dating back to December 7, 1941, during any part of which they served.

Most members of the armed forces—particularly enlisted men—were exempt from income tax under special wartime law. Consequently, the number entitled to rebates is not expected to be large,

and the VA notice advises dependents first to make sure taxes actually were paid before seeking refunds.

Forms for applying may be obtained from the office of any collector of internal revenue (Form 845). Applications for refunds and any correspondence on the subject also should be directed to the Collector of Internal Revenue where the tax was paid, and not to VA or the Bureau of Internal Revenue in Washington.

The number of veterans of all wars reached 18,744,000 on May 1, 1948, the VA reports. Of these, 14,887,000 served in World War II. The remainder were veterans of World War I and other wars.

In 1955, VA predicts, the number of veterans of all wars will be 17,200,000 and the number of persons in their families, 42,900,000.

Questions And Answers  
Q. I am a World War II veteran and intend to go abroad for several years. Does VA have representatives in foreign countries?

A. The Foreign Service of the Department of State cooperates with Veterans Administration in the administration of certain benefits available to veterans in Foreign areas.

Q. Does VA attempt to improve types of prosthetic aids available to veterans?

A. Yes, Veterans Administration conducts extensive research projects in attempting to discover new and better prosthetic devices.

Q. Is a disabled veteran in on-

the-job training permitted to receive wages and if so, how much can he receive?

A. A disabled veteran in on-the-job training may receive wages while training, but if the wages plus his subsistence allowance exceeds the journeyman rate for a trained worker in that occupation, the subsistence allowance will be reduced by VA proportionately. However, other payments that he receives from VA because of his disability will not be affected.

Q. Will Veterans Administration pay for the medical care of my dependants?

A. No. Under existing laws, only eligible veterans are entitled to VA medical care.

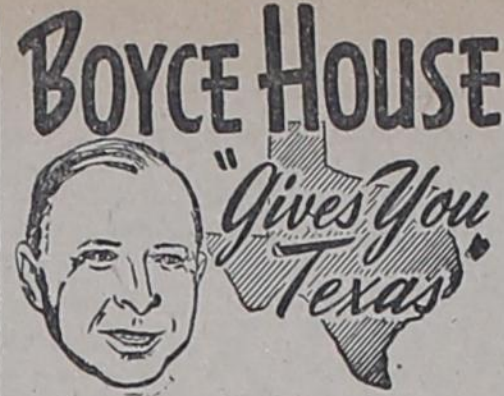

In a very courteous tone, the Justice said, "Go ahead and change it."

And so that is how, though I have never "edited" a message of a President, I did "edit" a speech by a member of the United States Supreme Court.

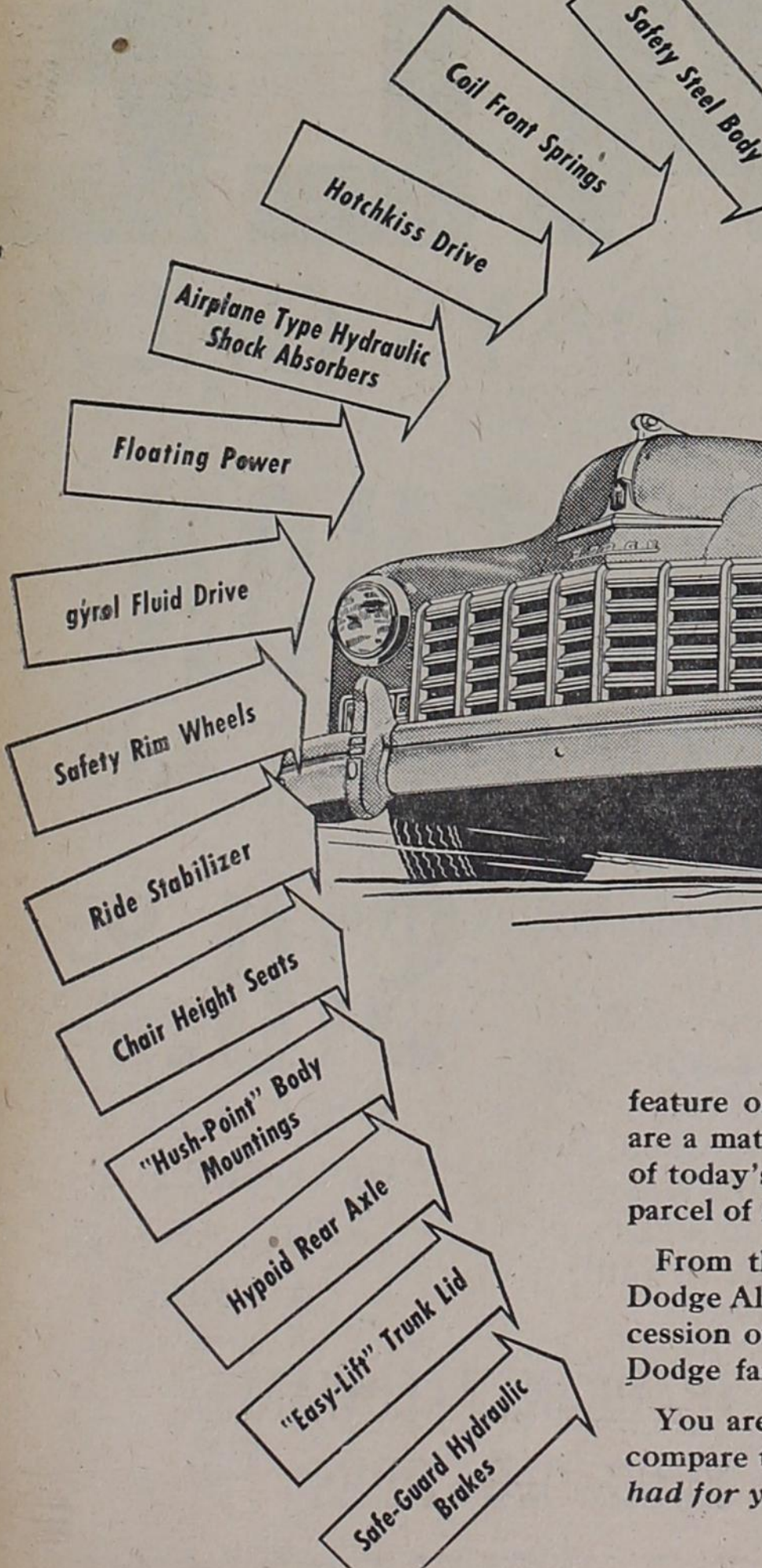
