Nevertheless, it was announced a few days ago that a new high-pressure natural gas pipeline costing \$140 million and using up a lot of steel, would be built from Texas oil fields into the eastern states.

For some time it had been rumored that some of the Texas gas being piped east was being used to re-pressure some of the broken-down fields of older oil-producing areas. Commenting on the new pipeline, the New York Times observes:

"The Appalachian and Midcontinent fields must be integrated for economic and military reasons ... This means the depleted areas of the Appalachian field must become storage reservoirs for gas piped from the Midcontinent field. The Federal Power Commission is clearly right in insisting on the provision of storage at a time when the national security is uppermost in the country's mind."
