In fact, we've been reminded that Christmas is coming for several weeks, now.



Representatives of American retailing have told officials of the National Production Authority that they are opposed to rationing and wagepirce controls at the present time.

The retailers of this country, both large and small, can vividly remember their experiences under OPA after the last war when, with the real emergency over, controls were continued for a long time. Production was discouraged, and stocks were sparse. The black market flourished, serving the few who would pay outrageous prices for goods.

Rowland Jones, president of the American Retail Federation put the case against controls in these words: "Americans need not blindly submit to the prospect of the economic straitjacket of control regimentation based on the assumption that we are already at our maximum in terms of available manpower. We do have a choice if we have the will and wisdom to work together to push our production to ever higher levels unshackled by the defeatist idea that there are no more production frontiers to cross."

The long-term thinking on cattle and calves is for higher prices. It is freely predicted that stocker calves would again hit the \$35 level if general rains came to the Southwest.

Barring a radical change in the over-all picture the Spring market for stockers will be high and many cattle are beingwinteded in that expectation.

Rain is needed nearly everywhere in Texas and would not hurt any particular section so far as livestock are concerned.





AUSTIN - The Texas State Board of Health has elected Dr. George W. Cox of Austin to his eighth consecutive two-year term as state health officer.

The vote of the nine member board was unanimous in favor of keping Dr. Cox in the post he has held since 1936, the longest tenure in the 70-odd year history of the State Department of

Dr. O. B. Kiel of Wichita Falls chairman of the board, called Dr. Cox, "outstanding among them." the health officers in the nation.

"The job he has done in his capacity is remarkable," Dr. Kiel said, "I speak for the whole board when I say Texas is fortunate to have such a man as Dr. Cox heading its public health activities."





Dividers for Drawer

DIVIDERS in the silverware drawer can be made in a jiffy by the home handyman - or woman. They are a great help in keeping the silver nicely sepa-

rated and in apple-pie order. They have similarly useful purposes in other household drawers, too. For example, they will quickly bring order out of chaos in the sock and handkerchief drawers of the men and boys of the famly. There probably are drawers in the



ment, utility room or linen closet in which dividers would be most welcome by the homemaker.

The "makings" are pieces of Masonte one-eighth-inch tempered hardboard, which serve as the partitions; pieces of quarter-inch quarter-round which form he slots into which the hardboard panels slide; and some brads to nail the latter to the drawer frame.

Advantages of the hardboard dividers are that they won't splinter or chip, they can be removed and washed, and the will wear indefinitely. Cross-dividers car be made of the same material by cutting one-eighth-inch notches and fitting the pieces together as in an egg crate.
