In many instances the tickets have been given out in person, but quite a number have been mailed. Purchasers are asked to watch for them.






#### **Better Concrete Patches**

TO do an A-1 job of patching a concrete floor, it is essential to follow a few simple rules so that a strong bond is created between the new and old. Simply cleaning out the old material and filling the hole with new concrete won't work satisfactorily. Remove enough of the old concrete

so the bottom of the hole is as wide as the top and uniformly deep. This will hold the patch in place. Dampen the old concrete to prevent water in the new mix from being absorbed. Be cer-tain, however, that he surplus water is left in the hole.

Eggs pass from the body, and dain, puts the finger on it as the hatch within 24 hours. Then the young worm lies in wait for the first unsuspecting barefoot person—usually a youngster—to come by. It pierces the foot skin and slowly inches its way deeper and deeper into the body until it reaches the intestinal tract

where the cycle starts again. "It is a disease," Dr. Cox says, "that stunts the growth of chilren, causes skin discoloration, loss of weight, and anemia." Severe infections often cause a morbid craving for things as chalk or dirt, he adds.

But it's easy enough to control-merely by building properly designed sanitary pit privies or septic tanks. That, and wearing shoes.

A good many children in rural sections have had light infestions all of their lives, and have never known what it means to feel entirely well.

The way to prevent "long corners" on towels-and an aid to folding them when dry-is to fold all towels lengthwise before hanging on the line.

Retrieving a handkerchief from a floor or a shirt from a door knob may seem to require little effort. Actually, when done several times a day, it becomes a back-breaking chore.

This extra work is completely unnecessary. It may be eliminated by teaching members the pick-up-and-put-away habit.

Mum's the Word

Teaching the habit is accelerated by following a line of quiet resistance-saying not a word about and paying no attention whatsoever to personal belongings which are out of place.

When careless members realize that they aren't getting the customary help, they begin putting their own things away. At first there may be some grumbling, but, in the event of an open discussion of the subjcet, mothers have air-tight cases.

After this common problem is solved, mothers may encourage their families to help accasionally with some of the actual cleaning chores. Something can be found for every one in the family to do.

Small children may help dust. If they need an incentive, hide a few pennies around the home, telling the tots they may keep the pennies they find while dusting.

#### '51 WHEAT SUPPORT SET AT 1.99 OR 90%

their production plans, the Secretary of Agriculture has an-1950 crop, B. F. Vance, chairman of the State Production and Marketing Administration Committee, said today. The action was taken in accordance with legislation which directs that suport for field crops be announced in advance of the planting season.

Mr. Vance explained that support for the 1951 wheat crop will be at 90 percent of parity but not less than a national average of \$1.99 a bushel. This figure is based upon the latest parity price information available. If parity is higher at the beginning of the 1951-52 marketing year, the support will be increased.

While the mandatory price suports for the 1951 wheat crop could have been set as low as 80 percent of parity, Mr. Vance said that Secretary Brannon put the support at 90 percent to assure an abundant supply of wheat in accordance with acreage allotments. With average way:

Farmers who knowingly overplant their cotton acreage allotments will not be eligible for payments under the Agricultural Conservation Program, J. C. McGee, Chairman of the County PMA Committee, reminded growers today.

"There seems to be some misunderstanding about this part of the program," Mr. Mc-Gee said. "While farmers generally know that they may not obtain cotton loans on other cotton price supports if they overplant their cotton allotments, they don't seem to realize that overplanting cotton also affects their participation in ACP."



Since insects are likely to be found near the surface of a bin. the degree of infestation can ussistant extensio n entomologist ually be determined by sifting a sample of the surface grain. If as many as two weevils or five bran beetles are found in a two pound sample, the bin should be fumigated.


> If the grain is stored in wooden bins, 1000 bushels of the grain can be fumigated with a mixture of ten gallons of one part carbon tetrachloride and three parts dichloride. Other recommended dosages are eight gallons of carbon tetrachloride or eight gallons of a mixture of four parts of carbon tetrachloride and one part of carbon disulfide per 1000 bushels of grain. The dosages of the three fumigants can be reduced by 25 per cent if the grain is stored in steel bins.

> Fumigants should be applied from the outside of the bin by means of a bucket pump or other type of sprayer, and they should be distributed evenly over the surface of the grain.




