### Oil Production Is Indicated In Clonts Wildcat

Another producer for Knox Especially early on Tuesday Count and opening of Palo Pinto reef lime oil production was indicated with recovery of oil last Thursday in Stanolind Oil and Gas Company's No. 1 Icelana Clonts, a wildcat about five miles northeast of Knox City.

Five-hour test from 4,212 to 4,230 feet showed gas to surface in 19 minutes. Recovery was 3,510 feet of 39 gravity oil. Flowing pressure ranged from 9 to 950 pounds and bottomhole pressure was 1,850 pounds in 30 minutes. Top of the reef was called as 2,175 feet.

The wildcat is on a block of approximately 250,000 acres and is 31/2 miles north and slightly east of the first wildcat drilled on the block. The latter was abandoned in the Ellenburger after failing to find production. Slight shows in the reef, how ever, encourage the drilling of the second test.

Although originally staked as an Ellenburger test, casing is being set on the No. 1 Clonts completed in the Palo Pinto. It was indicated that this would be the best producer for Knox







The damage caused by cattle grubs each year in Texas exeeds \$20 million. Beef cattle Poducers and dairymen can do something about these losses and this is the time of the year when control measures must be

cook stove due to the fact that the government won't let anybody sell me one for a dollar, down and a dollar a week, says I got to pay at least a third down, which eliminates my stove-buyin from now on, but I've been workin on an idea.

If you give American ingenuity a chance, it'll come through, and what I want to know is what would be wrong in goin ahead and followin the government's rules and payin a third down for a new car, say, but work out an installment payment plan for the down pay ment? Say the car costs \$1860 and the downpayment has to be \$600, go ahead and meet them terms but pay out the downpayment at \$5 a week.

Of course, my favorite plan, which wouldn't require no round-about way, is to have the government sell money orders on the installment plan, which would enable a man to select a new car, find out how much a third down is, go by the post office, take out a money order for that much, pay a dollar down or get the full amount, go to the car dealer's hand over the money, and drive off. 

### Weekly Health LETTER

Issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox M. D., State Health Officer of Texas

AUSTIN-The Texas State Department of Health has undertaken a program to promote the fluoridization of municipal water supplies wherever necessary, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

It has been proved that where drinking water contains 1.0 to 1.5 parts per million of sodium fluoride that less dental decay occurs, especially among those that have used the water since birth. Excessive amounts of fluorine causes mottling of the

The city water supply at Marshall has been treated for four and one-half years. This has resulted in a reduction of 47 per cent in the decay rate among the age group 6 and 7 years. The younger groups receive the earliest benefits from such a program but all ages have shown some improvement. Other cities adopting fluoridization of their water supplies are Austin and Corpus Christi. Fort Worth, Iowa Park and Breckenridge and some forty other Texas cities are seriously considering the measure.




