**FOR THE STRENGTH OF THE LAND**

Conservation under the Agricultural Conservation Program is more than just keeping land from washing or blowing away, says B. F. Vance, Chairman of the Texas Production and Marketing Administration Committee. It is keeping the land productive and where possible making the land more productive. It is a program of restoring, building and improving as well as checking, holding and preserving.

The program is helping farmers maintain and build the fertility and productive capacity of their land as well as to check erosion. The purpose of conservation is to assure the Nation of a sustained, and as necessary an increasing production.

Mr. Vance points out that the most economical way to stop a gully is to farm in such a way that the gully doesn't get started. The relatively high level of living in this country is due in large part to the relatively high ratio of productive soil to population. In many other countries this ratio is too low due to excessive population and loss of arable lands through poor soil management.

Dr. Charles E. Kellogg, Chief of the Division of Soil Survey at the United States Department of Agriculture's Plant Industry Station at Beltsville, Maryland, has expressed this view: "Of course we want a protective cover, but it must be a productive cover. If

we want our farmers to improve living conditions it must be even more productive than the original cover. That is why farm planning for sustained production must lay so much emphasis on lime, fertilizer, drought-resistant and disease-resistant varieties, and so on. ## Weekly Health LETTER

Issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox  
M. D., State Health Officer  
of Texas

Austin—Tuleremia, or "rabbit fever", is transmitted to human beings through the careless handling of wild rabbits, and according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, every wild rabbit should be handled with extreme

care from the time he is bagged, until he is placed on the table. "If a rabbit is diseased, careless handling can cause tuleremia. This serious disease is transmitted from rabbits to human beings, usually through direct contact with the infected animal or with objects contaminated by the meat or fur," Dr. Cox said. "Each year many persons contract tuleremia because they fail to use proper precautions in the handling of the rabbits which are killed for food."

Dr. Cox said that one of the first precautions recommended is to shoot only the healthy rabbits with enough energy to run away from the hunter as he approaches. A listless rabbit that fails to run is probably sick, and should not be taken by the hunter.

A second precaution is for the hunter to use rubber gloves for cleaning and preparing the rabbit for cooking. The gloves should be sterilized after using, and the rabbit should be washed thoroughly after the meat has been cooked. Adequate cooking is a safeguard that should be observed at all times. To destroy germs that may be present, meat should be cooked at boiling temperature for at least two minutes, regardless of whether it is to be fried or baked later. By observing these safety rules, Texans may enjoy their rabbit hunts and rabbit dinners without fear of tuleremia.

# ARM NEWS

## ED COMMITTEEMEN INFLUENCE FOR GOOD FARMING

The Farmer committeemen will be elected next week to administer the 1949 Agricultural Conservation and related programs in counties and communities will take office January 1, B. F. Vance, chairman of the Texas PMA Committee announces.

A total of 5,424 committeemen will be elected this year to administer the 1949 farm programs in Texas. This includes 762 county committeemen and 4,662 community committeemen.

According to Vance, these farmers who will be elected by their neighbors will administer the Agricultural Conservation Program and supporting activities in the counties. Through the conservation program they are key figures in the nation's efforts to encourage soil and water conservation to maintain current and future production.

They are in key positions to pass soil and water conservation methods along to their fellow farmers. They are familiar with both the conservation and production problems in local areas and therefore are in a position to help farmers adapt the Agricultural

Conservation Program to local needs. They have available both the technical knowledge from agronomists and soil specialists and the practical understanding from their experience in farming.

## THE POPULATION AND THE LAND

The importance of widespread use of soil and water conservation practices is emphasized when the number of people to be fed from the land are considered, says Emmett Partridge, Chairman of the Knox County Agricultural Conservation Committee.

The livestock producer thinks naturally of the carrying capacity of his land in terms of animal units but the real problem concerns the number of acres required to feed a person. It is only by keeping up the productivity of the land now under cultivation—to maintain the human carrying capacity—that the needs of an increasing population can be met.

There is hope, the chairman points out, that through conservation farming land is being made more productive. Erosion is being checked and soil built up to resist erosion. Water is being used to help grow crops instead of being allowed to carry away the vital topsoil.

In every agricultural county in

the United States and in Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands farmers are cooperating in the Agricultural Conservation Program, to keep the land from washing and blowing away and wearing out. Essentially, the chairman points out, this program is helping to maintain and increase the human carrying capacity of the land so that the people of this country may continue to have enough food.

"Under this program," says the chairman, "farmers are cooperating with the rest of the people of the country to make the land productive and to keep it producing. It's a consumers' program as much as it is a farm program."

## THAT WE MAY EAT

This year the Government is helping upwards of 3 million farmers carry out soil and water conservation practices on their farms. The practices include construction of terraces and contour farming which provide barriers to the rapid flow of runoff water. By checking and spreading the water, more of it soaks into the ground and gullies are prevented.

Other practices are the seeding of grasses and legumes to hold the soil and restore humus, and applying lime and phosphate to make the grass and legumes grow better.

In general, farmers carry out practices which meet the conservation needs of their farms and of the area in which they live.

The main purpose of all this activity and this program of soil and water conservation, according to Mr. Partridge, chairman of the Knox County Agricultural Conservation Committee, is abundant production—"not just for this year or next but for all the future."

"The amount of soil from which all people in the country must obtain feed and fiber is limited. Population is increasing. Enough food for the future depends on keeping the limited land we have productive. If it washes or blows away or wears out and becomes unproductive that means that much less land from which the food and fiber must come."

"So," says Mr. Partridge, "the next time you see a farmer applying lime or phosphate, building a dam or constructing a terrace, you can put it down that this means something to all of us. The soil and water conserved through these and similar practices will go a long way to make sure there will be enough to eat."

Some of the favorite touches given by the writers for Western story magazines and for the cowboy movies are treated rather roughly by George Hendricks in his book "The Bad Man of the West", (Naylor Company, San Antonio).

Very few of the famous real-life gunfighters actually fired two guns at the same time, nor did they fire fro mthe hip.

Of approximately 250 gunfighters whose records Hendricks studied, Billy the Kid was the only one who preferred the double-action .45 to the single action. To fire the double action pistol, all you do is pull the trigger, the machanism automatically lifting the hammer, then causing it to

With the single action gun, thewhipped out his six-shooter and

user had to pull the hammer back with his thumb and then squeeze the trigger with his finger. However, the experts usually altered the mechanism so the weapon could be afired merely by pulling the hammer back with the thumb and then letting it fall back, not using the trigger at all. In fact, usually the trigger was fidel off.

But is would be almost impossible for the fiction writers to think up situations more exciting or unusual than actually happened, as related in Hendricks' book.

For instance, Red Kelly's final fight. Kelly was credited with having killed Bob Ford, who was the slayer of Jesse James. Kelly and an enemy met at very close range, each went for his gun and each seized the other by the wrist of the gun-hand. As they struggled, each fired three times before they fell heavily to the ground with Kelly on top. His adversary finally was able to free his arm sufficiently to level and fire, killing Kelly; but the victor who so exhausted from the struggle that he could neither throw off Kelly's body nor wriggle from under it but had to ask to be liberated by spectators.

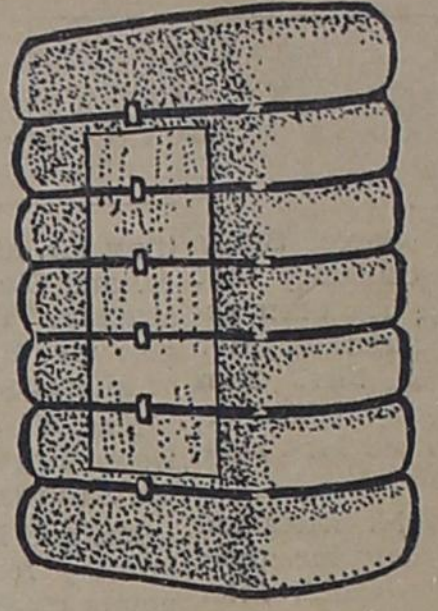

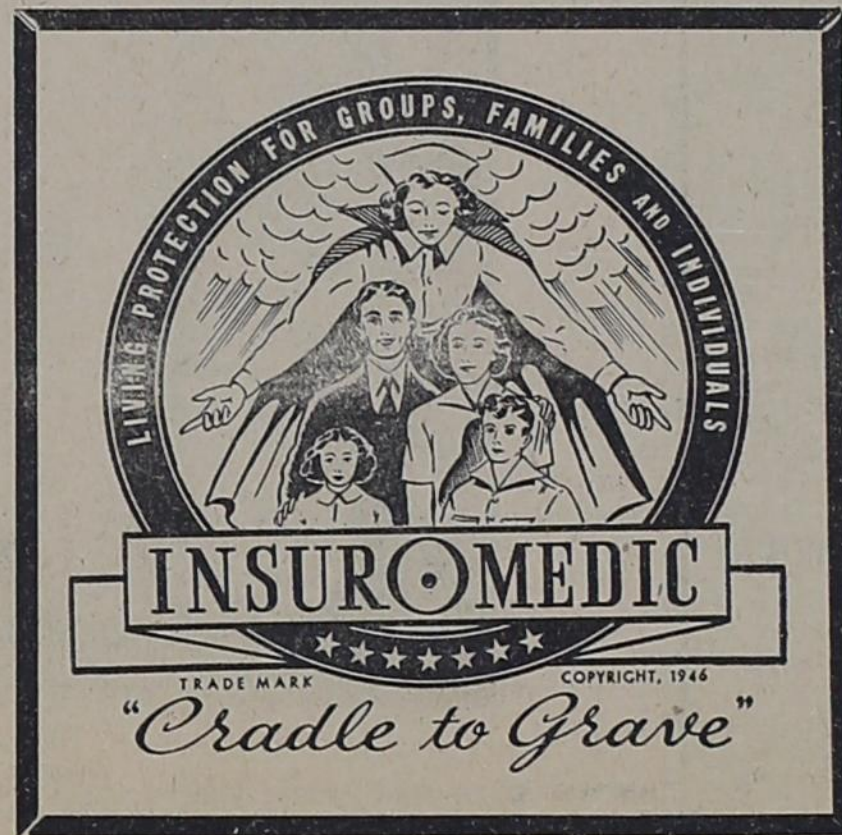
