What form of recreation will your children have during the summer months—the school vacation period?

There's been a little agitation among students and others for a youth center in Munday. We don't know just what all this embodies—the forms of activities, etc.

The American Legion, through its commander, Kirby Fitzgerald, has come up with an idea that might be worked out with the proper backing.

The Legion has some "surplus property", just like the war department, or something.

This surplus property is in the form of land, more land than is covered by the Legion hall, and this has been offered to the youth.

Kirby says that the school, any church, club or civic organization that wants to back the idea is plumb welcome to the lots adjoining the Legion hall. They can be converted into tennis courts or anything else that's wanted to furnish recreation and activities for our youth.

The Legion would back it, he says, but they've bit off enough to make them "lots of chewing" for some time to come, in paying for the Legion property. So if someone else wants it for a youth recreation center, there it is.

Activities of a portion of the boys of certain age will be taken care of this summer through the American Legion's youth softball team. But there are others who want recreation, too.

We're not backing it, especially. We're just passing the news along that the lots are there and offered by Legion members for this purpose. A right noble gesture on their part, whether we take advantage of it or not.

Well, our paving is taking on form rather rapidly. And it looks like we're going to be able to "pull out" one of our six-point needs for Munday that we're carrying over on the "ed" page.

We've done without paving for so long that it looks like the curb and gutter crew is getting along rather slowly. But once the curb and gutters are in, the job of paving in between is rather "small pickings", as we understand it.

Those curbs are going right on down, too. Harvey Lee, city secretary, was in the office the latter part of last week and offered the information that better than a mile of curbs have been laid—around 6,000 feet, to be exact.

When the paving job is finally completed, we'll likely forget about the spring winds and the dust the trucks and other paving activities have stirred up.

We don't mind a little immediate discomfort of dust being stirred up, though, when we think of that "long-range comfort of being able to go somewhere in Munday on paved streets."

We understand some of the streets are going to be "gappy". Those non-paved gaps will be along property of "homesteaders" who feel like the cost is prohibitive, as compared to their means.

But guess we ought to have a few of our good-sized mudholes left, as a souvenir of those "good old days" when we didn't have paving to ride on.

Then there's the drainage. While we're just rambling this week, we might as well do a little rambling along the drainage line.

And the hearing on creation of the drainage district comes up before the Commissioners Court on Wednesday, April 28. We get it that there's quite a bit of opposition to the idea, and this will probably be registered good and strong at the hearing.

Some have tried to figure the cost. We admit we can't figure a millyun dollars, so we take the other fellow's word for it.

## Rex E. Sullivan Announces For Representative

Rex E. Sullivan, Jr., of Quanah this week has authorized the announcement of his candidacy for election to the office of State Representative from this district, which includes Hardeman, Foard, Knox and King Counties, subject to the action of the Democratic primaries in July. He is now attending Law School in the State University at Austin; and will return home at the end of the Spring term to actively campaign for the office.

Sullivan was born at Quanah twenty-four years ago; was graduated from Quanah high school. He was attending Tech College at Lubbock before he entered the military service for a three-year tour of duty. He was with the U. S. Navy in the Pacific theatre during World War II; entered the University after receiving an honorable discharge in 1946.

In discussing his candidacy, Sullivan said, in part: "If elected to this office, I shall not try to be a reformer, except I shall try to help abolish unnecessary bureaus and departments of the state government; and shall try to cut expenses, and affect economies in every way possible. I shall favor all reasonable measures to better handle flood control, soil conservation and a proper marshaling of our natural resources. ## County Gets Quota In New Bond Drive

A quota of \$93,000 has been set for Knox County in the Security Loan campaign, April 15 through June 30, Mr. W. E. Braly, County Savings Bonds chairman, announced today after receiving the figure from the U. S. Treasury Department.

"This is the highest quota we have received since the war," Mr. Braly said, "but the threat that today's peacetime inflation offers to our personal and national economic security makes it vital that we achieve the objective. I have no doubt that this county can and will meet the quota."

He said that rapid progress was being made toward completion of the volunteer organization that will carry out the Savings Bonds solicitation in the county, but urged that individuals, clubs and organizations offer their services in the campaign.

"The United States cannot be strong unless we have a strong national economy," he said. "If the individual citizens of this and every county in the nation provide for their own financial security, follows that the nation is strong economically. Widespread ownership of Savings Bonds by the people fights inflation, provides a guard against possible depression and allows for the sound management of our national debt. Money received from the sale of Savings Bonds is used to retire inflationary short-term government obligations which are held by banks and large corporations."

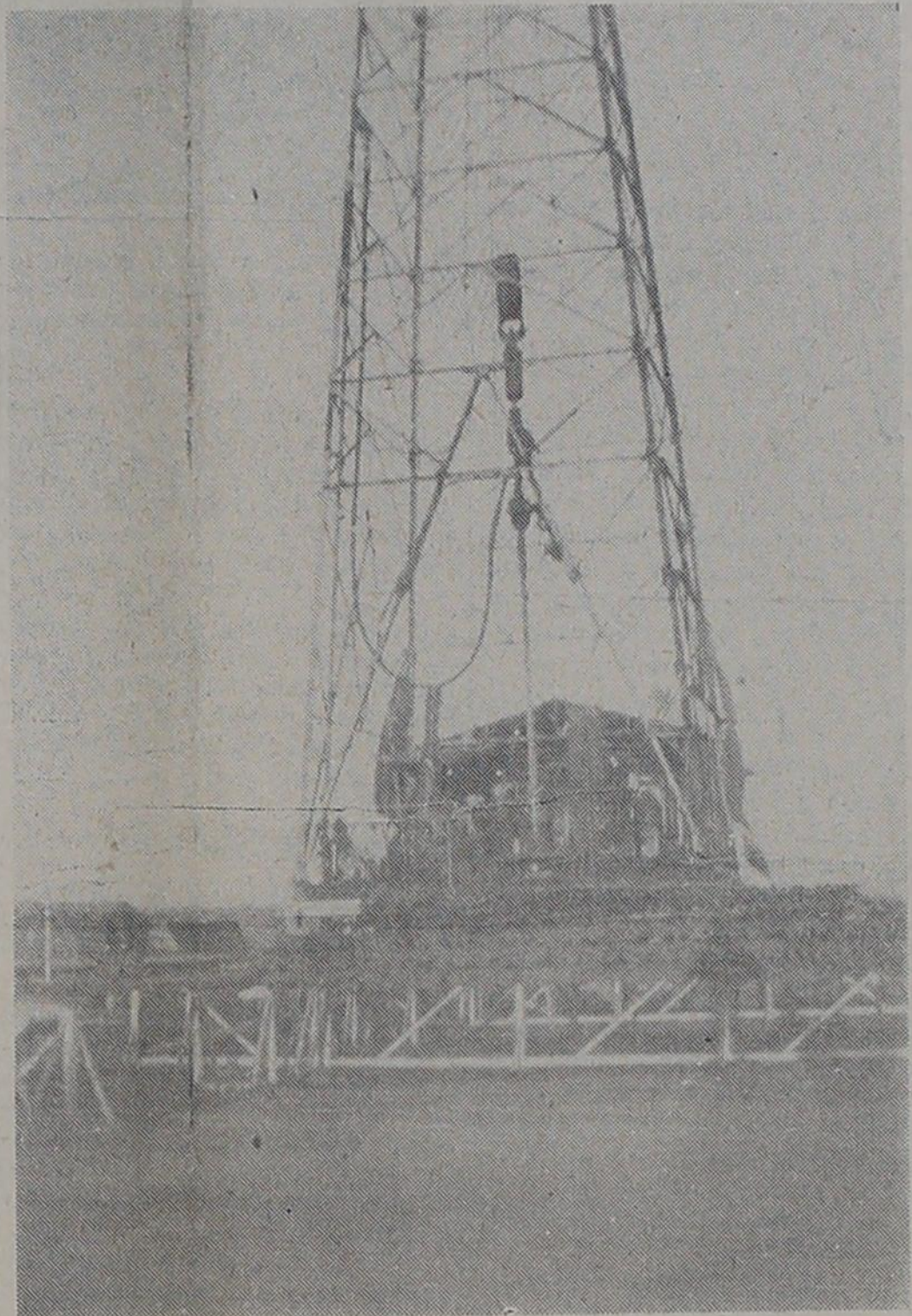
The Methodist church of Vera will sponsor a political rally and pie supper at the Vera high school gymnasium on Friday night April 30.

## 4-H Boys Get New Variety Of Milo Maize

4-H members of Knox County received milo maize seed of the 7078 variety. This is a new type of milo maize, and will be tested by the boys to determine the value here, as compared with the other recognized grain sorghums.

This practice, of testing new varieties, has been carried on for several years by the boys as new grain sorghums are produced by breeders.

In this manner Plainsman, Caprock, Early Hegari, Bonita, Martins and Midland have been grown by the 4-H clubbers so that farmers could observe their growth, habit and yield.

Last year four pounds of this seed was given to Frank Cervey, Certified Seed Grower for Knox County, and he produced 1600 lbs. from this amount. From this multiplication the boys will be able to conduct several tests.

## Failure At Truscott

Thomas D. Humphrey, Dallas, has staked a wildcat in northwestern Throckmorton County which, if a producing well, could force drilling in the near future on a portion of the Swenson Ranch, lease on which is held jointly by Cities Service Oil Company and Sinclair Prairie Oil Company. The lease of the two companies covers approximately 105,000 acres, more than three-fourths of which is in northwestern Throckmorton.

Humphrey staked No. 1 Marie Baker, 990 feet from north and 1,990 feet from west line of the Thomas Pew survey, approximately half a mile east of the Haskell County line. The location is 12 miles east of Weinert, 10 miles northeast of the Humphrey-Chapman pool in Haskell and 8,000 feet southeast of the Mohawk Drilling Company No. 1 Baker, a 5,512-foot failure completed in January 1946. With elevation of 1,389 feet, the Mohawk wildcat topped the Caddo at 5,000 feet, chert at 5,120 feet, and the Mississippi lime at 5,405 feet.

Warren Oil Corporation holds a large block north of the Mohawk wildcat.—Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

Unofficial reports early this week were that drilling had passed the 2,000-foot mark and was going forward.

## Smith Well Shows Oil

Following cementing last week to shut off water, the British American A. A. Smith No. 1 well started swabbing oil early this week.

Perforation was completed and the swab started Tuesday morning, and reports coming from the location Tuesday night were that lots of oil was being swabbed. The well had been plugged back to the depth where oil blew over the derrick in drilling operations.

Strength of the Smith well may not be determined for several days, yet.

## Truscott Well Abandoned

According to a story in Wednesday's Wichita Record-News, the W. J. and J. J. Moran, No. 1 Doris (Mulkey, in section 151, block 14, H & T C R R survey, a wildcat three miles southwest of Truscott, underwent a one hour drill stem test of a Mississippian zone from 5335-43 feet with a discovery of 18 feet of drilling mud with trace of oil. Survey was run and the hole abandoned as a dry hole at 6343 feet. Top of Mississippian formation was encountered at 6236 feet.

### SHOWDOWN

During the war and since, John L. Lewis and his union have made monkeys out of all of us. Time and time again they have crippled production in our country. Their latest act demonstrates their complete disregard for the welfare of the people and the prestige of the government in a time of World crisis.

The report of the President's fact finding board on the coal dispute shows the UMWA is a monopoly. Commenting on it, John D. Battle of the National Coal Association said: "The board places blame for the coal mine strike on John L. Lewis."

"The country is confronted with one man exercising dictatorial powers over a commodity that is vital to the welfare of all the people. The performance of Lewis in recent weeks should clearly prove to the people that labor unions do not deserve exemptions from the antitrust laws where a labor monopoly is so injurious to the public interest."

"For years all forms of business monopoly have been prohibited by law and properly so. The country is now faced with a monopolistic union that surpasses any form of business monopoly ever known."

"Lewis has been arrogant and wholly unresponsive to every approach made by the coal mine owners' representatives for a resumption of operation. The orderly processes of government as provided by law have been sneered at by Lewis. The efforts of the United States Conciliation Service to get the mines back in operation were delayed and rendered ineffective by the same tactics of ridicule and evasion used by Lewis against the coal mine owners. The President's fact finding board was impeded in its work and its findings delayed as Lewis had to be

### THE FIGHT CONTINUES

It seems clear that retail merchandising has just about gone the limit in paring its profit margin in order to reduce prices, or to prevent or minimize price increases. All kinds of stores have voluntarily reduced their mark-ups in the last year. In many cases, the margin between an overall profit and loss is very thin.

This does not mean that retailing will in any way relax its fight against inflation. It won't. But it does illustrate the fact that your storekeeper, whether he has a big organization or a small one, is severely restricted in his ability to do anything about retail prices. He must pay the going wholesale prices—and he must pay the going scale of wages, rents, taxes and everything else.

What the retailer can do is to avoid stocking over-priced goods, work with manufacturers in producing goods of given qualities at the lowest cost, and operate on as small a unit profit as business safety and survival permit. Progressive stores in every community are doing all this. And the result, whether we know it or not, have been to save consumers enormous sums of money.

Consumer resentment against retailing makes no sense—as the Congressional investigation of the price situation which was carried on last winter proved. The Congressmen participating were tremendously impressed by the fact that not a single instance of retail profiteering was produced. To the contrary, all the evidence indicated that retailing has been one of the most aggressive and effective forces fighting on the consumer's side.

## Wichita Valley Conductor Has Ridden 2 Million Miles in 39 Years

Conductor J. L. Bonds of the Doodle-bug" run on the Wichita valley railroad between Abilene and Wichita Falls has ridden an estimated 2,135,750 miles during the last 39 to 40 years that he has been giving "high-balls" to engineers and punching pasteboards for passengers.

On the sleeve of his coat are three gold bars—each for 10 years of service—and an added star that will soon grow into another bar. Bonds has been railroading through Munday for about 40 years. He is now around 70 years old.

When he first "ran" on the Wichita Valley two passenger trains were operated daily each way between Abilene and Wichita Falls. But in recent years when passenger business fell off, the sleek passenger coaches and the steam locomotive gave way to the coach-like combination engine, baggage-mail and two-passenger compartment "doodle bug". The run handles very few passengers these days.

Bonds travels 152 miles every day on the "doodle-bug." One early morning he rides it from Abilene to Wichita Falls, arriving at 12:30 p. m. Then he's off till 5:45 p. m. the next day, when he skips the return trip to Abilene, arriving some time before midnight. He knows all the bridges & curves on the 152-mile track. All the section foremen, agents, traveling agents and officials he knows by their first names.

He began his rail career on the Missouri-Kansas-Texas out of Parsons, Kansas, back near the start of the present century. Hamilton Wright, Reporter-News, Abilene, Texas.

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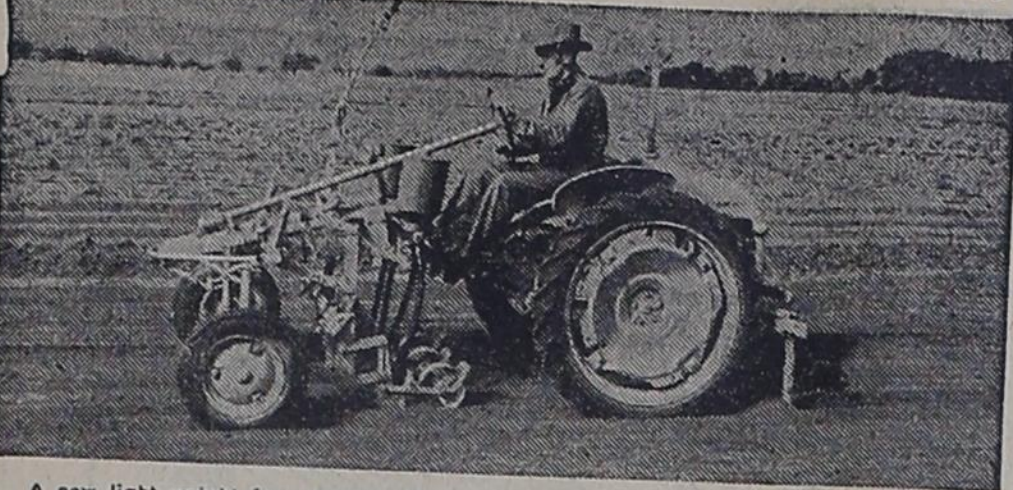

## NEW A-C TRACTOR MOUNTS ENGINE IN REAR, IMPLEMENTS IN FRONT FOR BETTER VISION



A new light weight farm tractor with implements mounted in front of the operator has just been announced by the Allis-Chalmers Tractor Division. Designed similar to rear-behind the driver.

MILWAUKEE, Wis.—A new farm tractor in the low priced field featuring a rear-mounted engine design was recently placed in production at the Allis-Chalmers Mfg. Company's Gadsden, Alabama, plant.

A noteworthy feature of the new light weight Model G tractor is the unusually wide range of operator-visibility permitted by the rear-mounted engine design. By shifting the engine to the rear, A-C engineers report they have succeeded in mounting farm implements in full view of the operator.

A complete line of front-mounted, quick hitch, companion implements designed especially for use with the new tractor is also being produced by the company's tractor division.

The new Model G tractor is equipped with a 4-cylinder, L-head engine—2 3/8" bore; 3 1/2" stroke; 62 cu. in. piston displacement—and is capable of handling one 12-inch moldboard plow in average soils at customary plowing depths. It has 4 forward speeds, including a super-low gear for operations requiring extremely slow speeds. Fuel consumption is

low, running from 2 to 3 quarts per hour under medium to heavy loads. Tractor wheel treads can be adjusted to fit any row-crop spacing. Any of the "G" implements can be attached to the tractor or removed from it in 5 minutes or less. The plow, like the planters and cultivators, is mounted ahead of the operator—a radical departure from conventional practice.

In a prepared statement, W. A. Roberts, Allis-Chalmers Executive Vice President, said: "In the new Model G tractor and the implements designed for it, we believe we have contributed a farm tool that will further advance the mechanization of agriculture, lower farm production costs, and place the advantage of mechanization within reach of thousands of farmers, who are still using animals and other unprofitable forms of farm power."

"We believe that this tractor will find a useful place on family farms of all types and sizes, because of its adaptability to all field operations, particularly those requiring great accuracy and precision."

I was readin in a newspaper the other day which I picked up off a counter in a cafe in Munday where some scientists in Chicago are studyin different ways of livin in order to avoid high blood pressure, and one of em claims farmin is the way to live and be healthy.

Course he ain't farmin himself, but for once I will agree with a city man, provided he understands what kind of farmer he's talkin about.

Now you take a farmer like my neighbor from across the creek. If you want to get high blood pressure, just practice farmin like he does. He plans his work.

For example, maybe Sunday he will decide he will start plowin first thing Monday mornin. That ruins his day Sunday, as he comes outside every few minutes peerin at the sky and speculatin on the chances of rain.

Monday mornin he's up after a restless night and after worryin over the air pressure in his tractor or tires and wonderin how the gas in his storage tank got so low when it seems like Posie Williams filled it up only last week, he starts plowin and worryin, worry-

in over the wind blowin, over the ground dryin out, over whether he'll get through before it rains. After three days of this, when he's about through with the field, he begins worryin over the fact it ain't rained yet.

This goes on all the time, from field to field, rain to rain, drought to drought, week to week, month to month.

If he makes a crop, he worries over whether to sell it or hold it, if he sells it he wishes he'd held it, if he holds it he wishes he'd sold it.

Why, in all the time I've known that neighbor, ain't been over four or five times when everything was about right and things suited him, and he ain't by himself, as half the farmers right now is worried over the drought, provided it don't rain by the time Mail Carrier W. O. Lewis gets this in to you, in which case they're worryin over the wet spell.

Now I don't know how they stand up to it, but these farmers get their farmin done and produce enough for the world, but personally it would give me high blood pressure.

If you want to live a long time, don't never plan your work. Don't let yourself or your mule or your wife or your banker know what you're gonna do tomorrow, and if the notion strikes you when you get up, don't do nothin. I ain't callin no names, but I know several people in town who uses the same philosophy, which works the same, town or country.

## Strength Of Nation Rooted In The Soil

The statement "eternal vigilance is the price of liberty" applies to our soil as well as our national life, says Emmett Partridge, Chairman of the Knox County Agricultural Conservation Com-

mittee. "At this time when there is so much being said about increasing our military forces, building more airplanes and developing super atomic bombs, some of us may forget that the real strength of the nation is rooted in the soil.

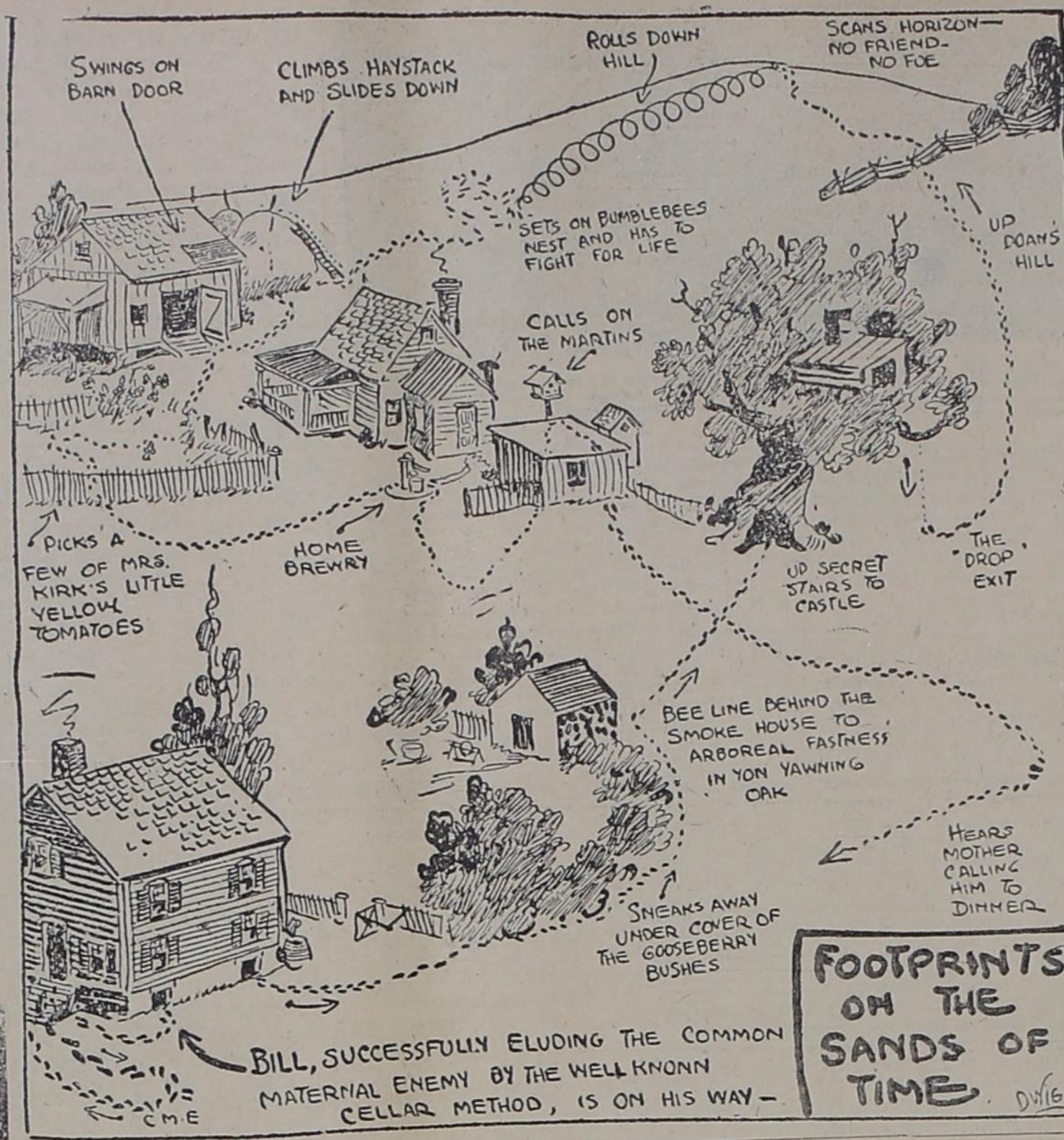
"From the soil comes food. And without food all the other things have little meaning. Too often and for too long the soil from which we get our food has been taken for granted. Even floods which wash away millions of tons of precious top-soil often interest us only because of the bridges washed away or the homes destroyed. A \$10,000 bridge washed out attracts attention, \$100,000 worth of top-soil washed away by the same flood may not be even mentioned. And yet, the bridge can be replaced while the soil cannot.

The chairman points out that the thin layer of top-soil which supports life on the earth is getting thinner each year. Only by "eternal vigilance" in checking erosion wherever possible can "we continue to take from our soil the 240 billion pounds of food needed for the people in this country each year. Only by keeping our soil and keeping it productive through the use of conservation practices will we be able to keep our Nation strong."

## Weekly Health LETTER

Issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox  
M. D., State Health Officer

Austin—The ordinary housefly is an enemy to health, and is one of the agents most commonly responsible for the spread of disease throughout the nation, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Typhoid fever, dysentery, and many other intestinal diseases can often be traced to the common housefly as the carrier of infection.

Speaking in this connection, Dr. Cox advised: "Be sure that your windows and doors are tightly screened so that stray flies will not endanger the health of your family. Keep flies away from food, drink, and utensils used in the preparation of food. Make sure, if you live in rural districts, that outside privy vaults are tightly covered so as not to permit the entrance of flies. Infections from this source with food, drink, and utensils. Keep all garbage covered until collected or

buried. Eliminate all breeding places for flies and you will be helping your community in its work of controlling communicable diseases and preventing unnecessary illness."

Dr. Cox said that the State Health Department would furnish upon request a pamphlet outlining safe and practical methods recommended for use in fly control.

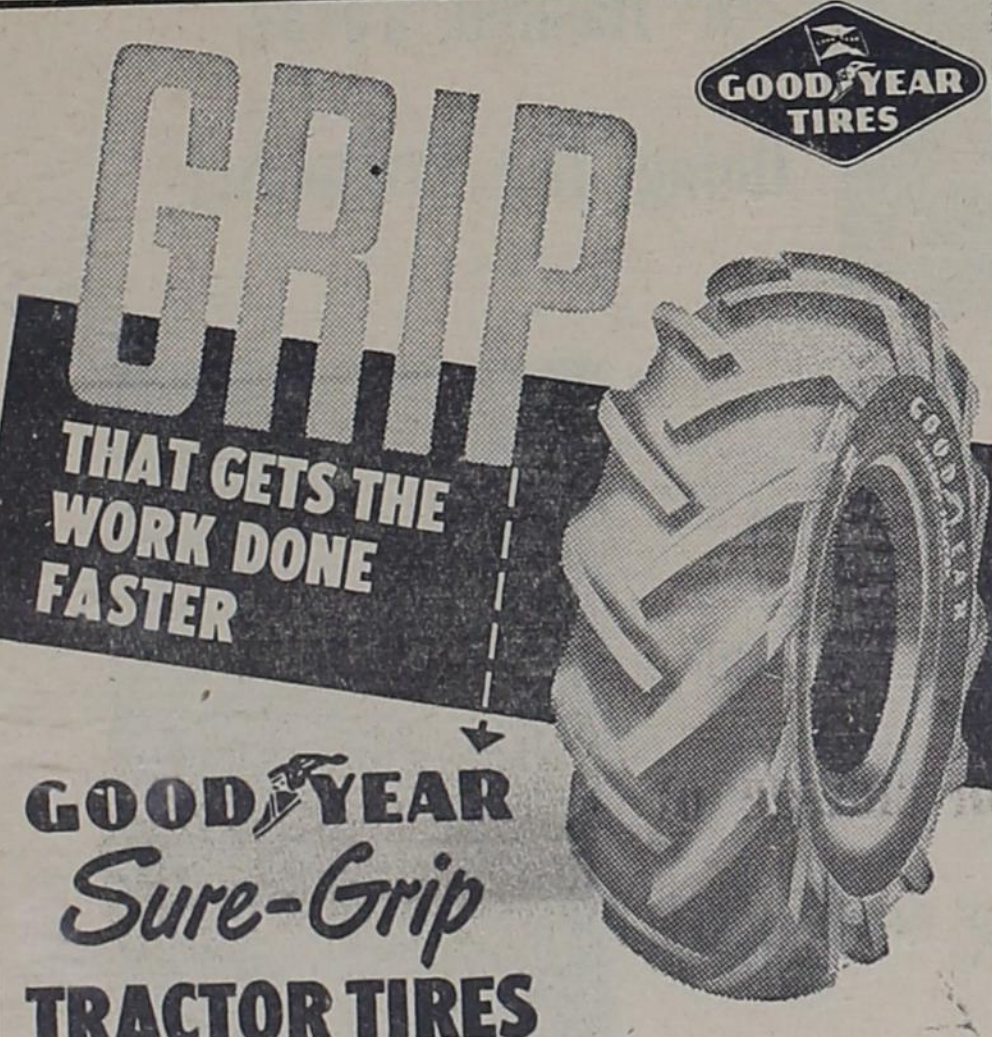

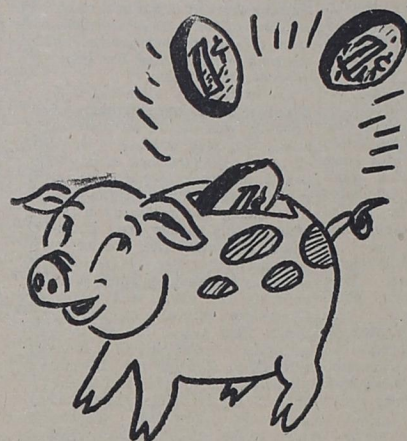

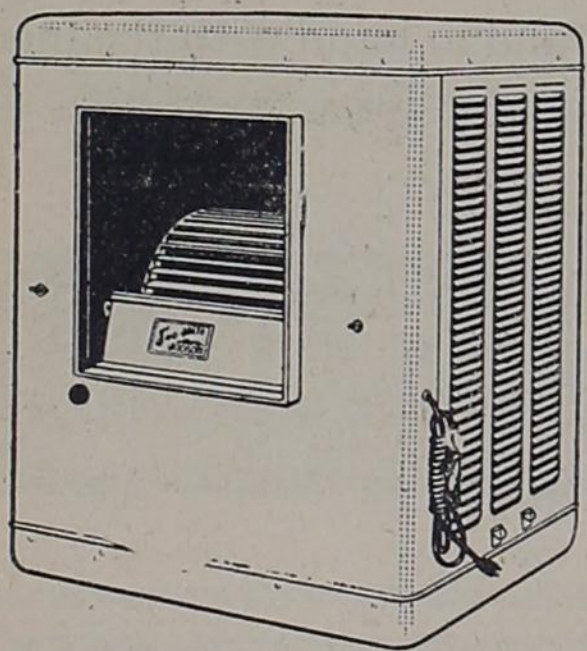

# Veterans' News

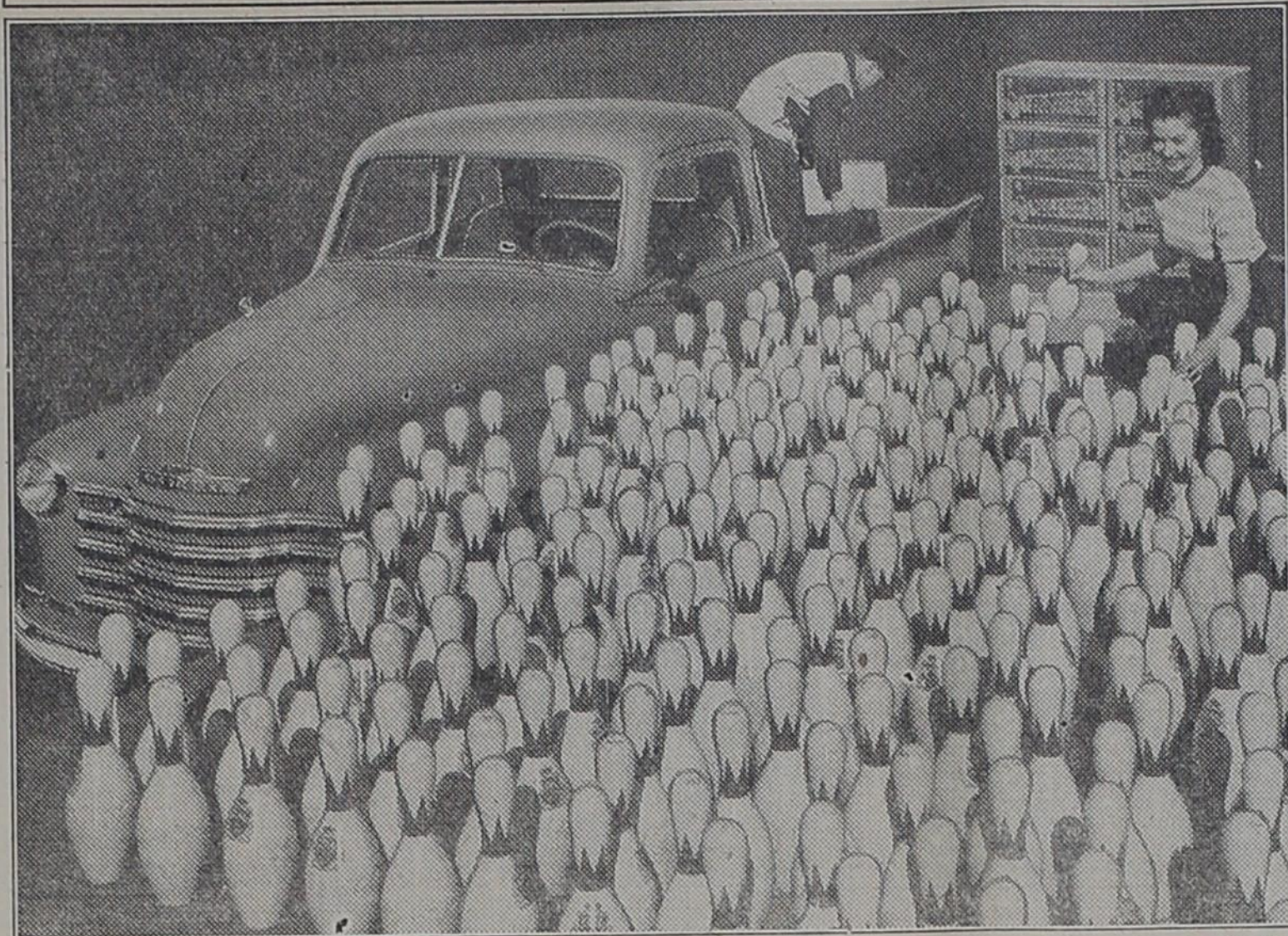
The Veterans Administration today relieved its training officers of all responsibility for the direct supervision of 220,000 non-disabled World War II veterans in training under the GI Bill in Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi.

The change will permit VA's training officers to devote more time to the needs of the 30,000 disabled veterans in training under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act (Public Law 16) in the same tri-state area. The law gives VA full responsibility for the training of these veterans.

In suspending supervision of GI Bill trainees by direct contact, VA called on all state approval agencies, schools and training establishments to meet fully their obligations under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act (GI Bill).

VA will look, to an increased extent, to state approving agencies to carry out their obligation to approve only schools and establishments that are fully qualified and equipped to give good courses of instruction and are otherwise satisfactory on the basis of current

inspections. Schools and job establishments are obligated to furnish effective education and training to each veteran they enroll, VA said. The institutions must not keep a veteran in training any longer than his conduct and progress warrant. They must provide VA with reports of the veteran's attendance and progress.

VA will use these reports, along with spot checks of veterans in GI Bill programs, to safeguard the veterans' rights to adequate training and to prevent possible fraud against the government.

The new supervision policy varies among the different types of training institutions.

No change was made among colleges and universities which already have the responsibility to supervise all veteran-students they enroll.

VA will use periodic conduct and progress reports and spot checks to supervise ex-servicemen and women in other schools and in job-training establishments.

Spot checks will be used in supervising veterans taking institutional on-farm training.

**QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS**  
Q. I have added total disability income coverage to my 20-payment National Service Life Insurance policy. Does the disability coverage continue after my policy is paid up?

A. Yes, provided you have not reached the age of 60. You continue to pay the additional premium for disability protection to the end of the 20 year period when it, too, becomes paid up. All disability income protection ceases when the insured reaches age 60, but payments are continued to those who are totally disabled at the time they reach 60.

Q. I have been discharged from the service for over a year. What is the latest date on which I can enter school or take training under the GI Bill?

A. You have until July 25, 1951 to start to school or training under the provisions of Public Law 346 (GI Bill), and all schooling or training must be completed by July 25, 1956.

Q. I converted my National

Life Insurance to 20-payment life. Is it possible to convert this policy once again to a cheaper plan of insurance, such as ordinary life?

A. You may, provided you are able to pass a physical examination, and the effective date of the converted policy is not more than five years ago.

Q. I am the beneficiary of a \$10,000 National Service Life Insurance policy. Are the payments

I am receiving subject to taxation?  
A. No. The payments of National Service Life Insurance as such are wholly exempt from Federal taxation. Except that they must be included as a part of the estate for Federal estate tax purposes.

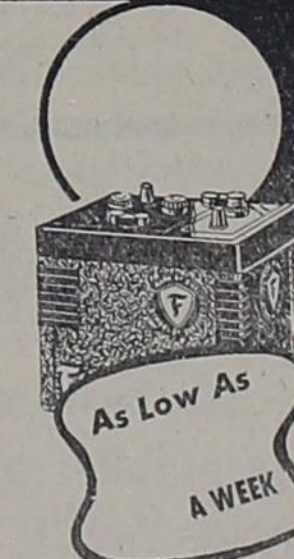

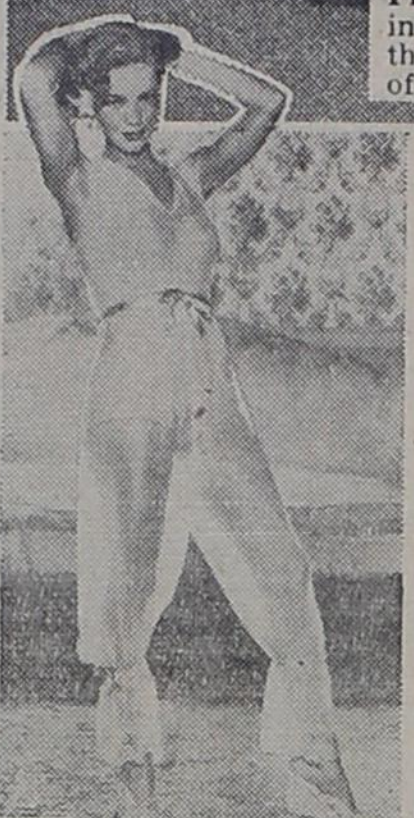
The bride is a graduate of the Rhineland high school and Durham's Business College in Fort Worth. She was employed at Montgomery Wards in Fort Worth for the past five years.

The missus can't help but burst out laughing — and they settle what might have been a quarrel over a

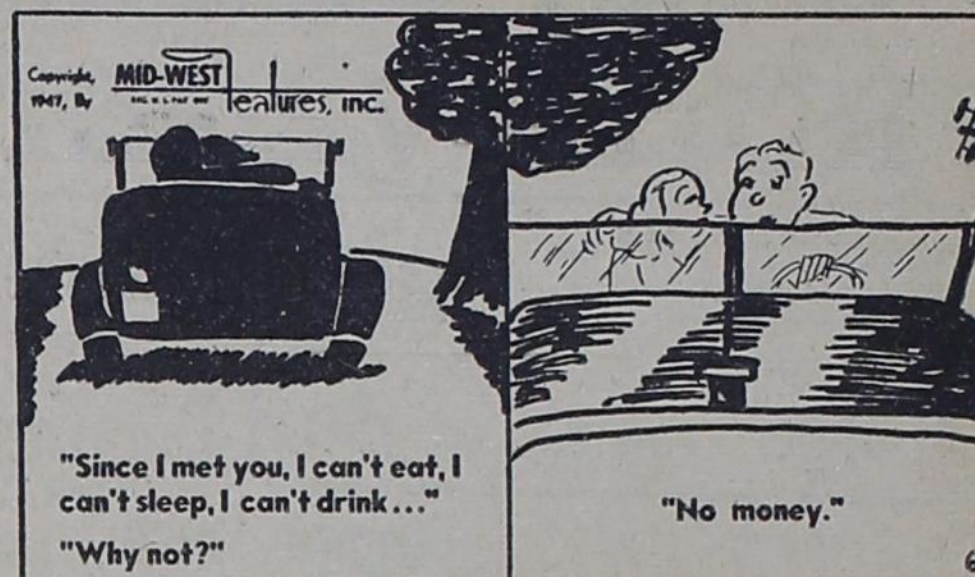

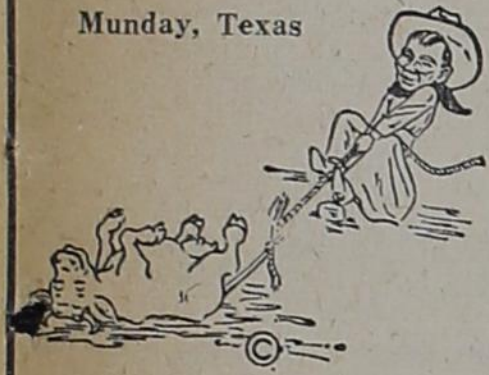

### Looking Ahead

IF YOU ARE a tradesman, or a skilled or unskilled laborer who works with his hands — if you call yourself a "worker" — you must indeed be thankful that you live in America. Not that you should be any more or less thankful, being a doctor, lawyer, teacher, or whatever you are. But somebody has called this nation a "workers' Republic," and I consider that phrase a good way to describe what we enjoy in this land of plenty.

Indeed there is no other country, whether socialized, partly socialized, or even communistic, that has given its workers more. A capitalistic America has enabled even "common" laborers to live like kings were accustomed to live not many years ago. We produce and enjoy the fruits of production. We must never forget that this has come about because the American way of life makes it possible.

**Glorious DO YOU KNOW** of a better and happier workers' nation? Have the "isms" and ideologies of the experimenters produced anything better? Certainly they have not. No worker in the world comes anywhere close to drawing the pay or enjoying the comforts of the average person right here in America. There is hardly a nation today that is not begging us to send them goods, or to bolster up their lagging economy in some way.

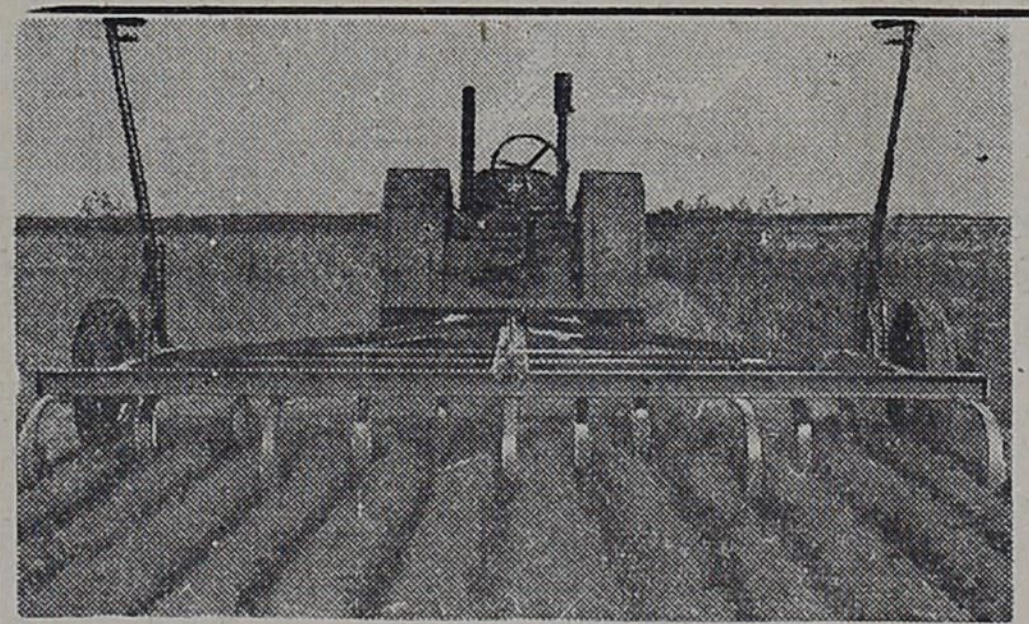
Possibly there are shortcomings in the American method. But judging from the achievements of the past, and viewing the possibilities ahead, I can think of nothing more foolish than to discard any part of our American way. We can have a future as glorious as our past. We have new worlds of atomic energy, jet

No other land can show the progress America has made. Nowhere else is there such a high standard of living — that applies to everybody. Progress has flourished here as nowhere else. Why? We have been free to exercise ingenuity, incentive, competition, and thrift. We have been free to invest savings in more and better tools. We have not been subject to tyranny or despotism from government. What political dictatorship can match this achievement?

### Low Carryover Of Cotton For Year Predicted

Austin—The carryover of cotton in the United States at the end of this cotton year, July 31, will be one of the lowest for more than 20 years, according to Dr. A. B. Cox, professor of cotton marketing, The University of Texas.

An estimated 2,500,000 bales of cotton will be carried over July 31. Likewise, the world supply of all commercial cotton is exceptionally low, 13,000,000 bales, or the least since August 1929.

The outlook for production in the United States is for some increase as a result of expansion in both acreage and probable yield per acre, Dr. Cox said. The world outside of the United States will likewise increase acreage to some extent.

If the European Recovery Plan is enacted by Congress, world consumption of cotton may easily approach 28 million bales during 1948-49. However, it is very unlikely that world cotton production for the year 1948-49 can reach that amount, Dr. Cox added.

The prospective value of the dollar six or seven months from now is of paramount importance in the cotton market situation, according to Dr. Cox. "The enactment of the

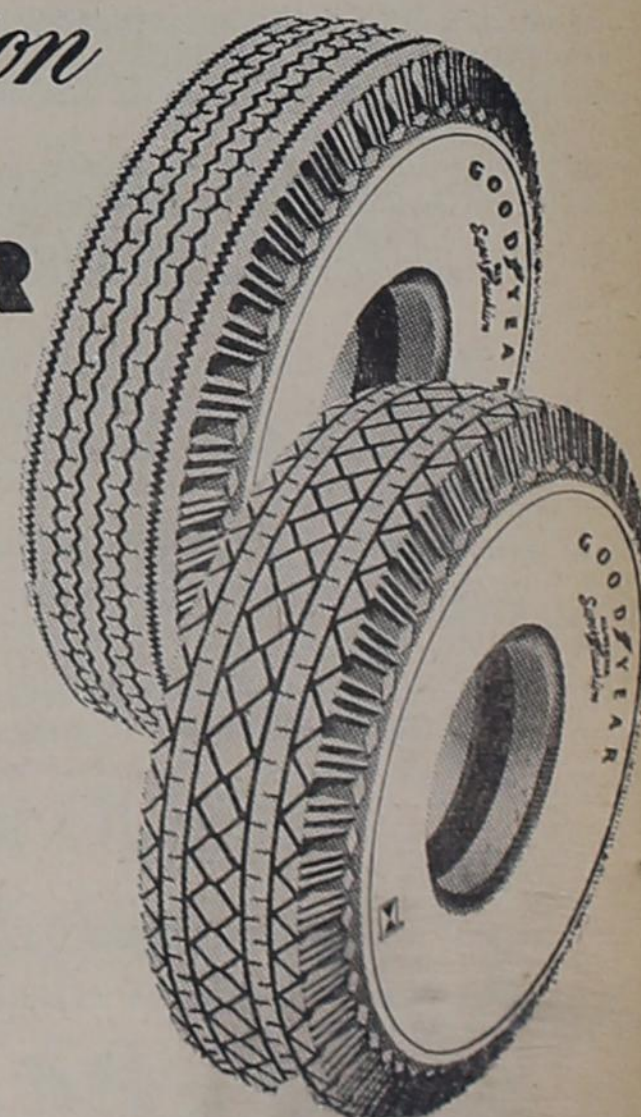
