### "BIGNESS" DOESN'T MEAN MONOPOLY

The growth of big businses, it is often argued makes for monopoly.

That idea is not held in informed quarters. For example, the Brookings Institution has been working for five years on an exhaustive factual study of the role of big business in this country. In one section its report says, "The nationwide businesses . . . . may do more to break up the power of local monopolies than to cement their

We see examples of this on every hnad. The manufacturers of national brands, for instance, must be represented in every market place-and the result is much greater competition than would otherwise be the case.

A very important example can be found in retailing. A generation or so ago the small-town general store had pretty much of a monopoly. Competitors were few or non-existent. Mark-ups were extremely high compared with present-day standards.

Then the early chains came into being. They pioneered low-cost merchandising, and began to open outlets in more and more communties. Other kinds of retailers had to compete or perish. They did compete-and consumers everywhere received greater value than they ever had

In a free country, where government sticks to the role of "umpire", there is plenty of room for business of every size and kind. None has a monopoly of anything-for long.

### OFF TO A GOOD START

This is the mechanized age.

We see the evidence of that fact everywherein our homes and businesses, in the great cities and the small towns. And nowhere has the machine effected a swifter or more dramatic revolution than on the American farm.

Today, it is estimated, our farmers are using more than \$121/2 billions worth of machinerytractors, corn pickers, combines, hay balers and so down the long list. These mechanical marvels preform basic farm tasks far more cheaply for more swiftly, and far more efficiently than is possible with human or animal labor. They have been one of the biggest factors in increasing the farm income-and in making it possible for a small percentage of the population to provide ample farm products for all the rest of us, with heavy quantities left over for export to less fortunate lands.

This represents tremendous progress. But it is not the end of the story. In agriculture, the mechanized age is still far from maturity.

An authority on farm management has stated that the average American farmer is actually working for less than one dollar an hour. Commenting on that fact, the president of an organization which markets farm equipment nationally said, "There can be only one explanation for this. It is simply that not enough tools have been provided for the American farmer. Power has not yet been applied to enough of the jobs that make up the complex business of farming.. The average farmers still does 60 per cent of his work without benefit of any power other than his own

The machine has been a boon to agriculture. What is needed now is still more machines, still more mechanization, still greater gains in productivity and efficiency.

We try to be Christians and nothing else, since the early disciples were called by that name (Acts 11:26) and Peter, the apostle, bound that name on the followers of Christ (1 Pet. 4:16). We teach that salvation is in a name, for the Bible so states (Acts 4:12).

We plead for the church as Jesus built it, and the New Testament reveals it, since Christ built one church (Eph. 4:4) and only one (1 Cor. 12:20. Hence we exhort men to be members of the Lord's church only, while there is yet life and opportunity (22 Cor. 6:17-18).

To be saved from our sins we have trusted in Christ for salvation, first hearing the Gospel (Mark 12:29) which tells us how that Christ died, was buried, and was raised from the dead (1 Cor. 15-1-2). Being convinced by this testimony, we believe with all of our hearts that Jesus is the Christ (Acts 8:37).

This belief in the goodness of God produced a godly sorrow in our hearts which led to repentance (2 Cor. 7-10) (Romans 2:4).

Repenting of our sins, we confessed with the mouth that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of the Living God (Romans 20:9-10), in order to be saved.

Then having learned that salvation is IN CHRIST (2 Tim. 2:10) and that men must be "baptised into Christ" (Gal. 3:-27), we were buried with Christ in baptism (Col. 2:12) for the remission of sins (Acts 2:38).

We were then added by the Lord to the New Testament church (Acts 2:47).

He stated that manpower is of little consequence to the Chinese Communists, and loss of supplies and equipment by the Communist forces is felt much more keenly than the loss of troops by them.

Life-size Wood Carving of Last Supper

BOSTON, MASS .- All the specialized skills of some of the finest craftsmen of New England have been combined to create this life-size copy in wood of the famous painting "The Last Supper" by Leonardo da Vinci.

More than a year was used in preparing the great carving—18½ feet long and 8½ feet wide. The figures, of limewood, are delicately tinted to give a feeling of lifelike reality, and a giant frame of contrasting walnut gives it depth. The carving will be the point of central interest in The Upper Room chapel, now nearing completion in Nashville. It is expected that visitors who view the carving will be moved to spend a few moments in prayer and meditation in keeping with the purpose of The Upper Room—a devotional guide issued in 17 languages and used round the world. The chapel itself is part of the new headquarters building for The Upper Room, the world's most widely used devotional guide. It is believed that it will become a devotional shrine and point of interest for visitors of the Midsouth.



This may be right, but I'm name absorbed. afraid the request comes anywhere from fifteen to thirty years too late to help the present adult population.


