#### Report On City Sales Tax Rebates

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Texas cities would receive \$23.4 million in rebates from the onepercent city sales tax during January.

The city sales tax allocation is about \$5.2 million more than cities received in January of 1979, Bullock

He commented that the increase is due more to changes in bookkeeping systems and late sales tax returns from taxpayers than significant increases in sales in the state.

His office reported that a substantial number of taxpayers filed 1979 third quarter returns late and the rebates were included in this January's allocation instead of last December's figures.

During this period, Mun-

day received \$1,359.30 as compared to \$1,069.25 for this same period last year. Knox City received \$2,412.09 as compared with \$1,100.13 for the same period in 1979.

#### Girl Scout **Cookie Time**


Have you seen the Brownie Scouts busy as little bees taking orders for Girl Scout cookies? Well, they are circulating around town and now is the time to place your order.

In fact, three variances have been requested because the laws seem so very oriented to large jails that small county jails not only find it difficult to comply with some of the specifications but simply find that some of them "are very extreme" in respect to a small county jail.

> For instance, one standard that will be complied with because they must is "immediately insure that there is a jail guard on duty in the jail 24 hours a day, 365 days a year." If you can not see the problem, think of it this way - this is saying that Knox County will furnish a jail guard 24 hours per day; broken down, this would be three shifts of eight hours for three employees. However, many times Knox County jail will be vacant of prisoners for a number of

One permanent variance request made by Sheriff Redwine to the Commission of Jail Standards has to do with not complying with exit doors. The requirement states they must "change swing of exit doors". Knox County has asked to not be forced to comply because "due to the low capacity of prisoners, we feel the existing exit doors are sufficient and the change would cost the county too much money". The doors and facings would have to be removed completely and the completion of this standard is estimated at \$5,000, so one can readily see why the County would ask not to be expected to comply with this requirement.

Another variance sent by Knox County is on the requirement that "all doors in the security area of the jail cannot permit the quick release of inmates by remote mechanical means located outside the inmate living areas and this type of locking devices should be installed on all doors." Knox County is requesting the variance be granted allowing the procedure set out below to be used instead:

"In an emergency, the Sheriff or Deputy on duty can open all cell doors using two keys. We feel that a mechanical means of opening cell doors is not justified due to the close living quarters of the Sheriff, and the short time required to open all doors manually. #### LIVER FLUKE CONTROL IN CATTLE

Control of common liver flukes in cattle has been set back with the removal of the drug hexachlorethane from the market, points out Jim Mazurkiewicz, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

However, albendazole, a new preparation presently being used for fluke control parasite. in countries outside the United States, will be made available for fluke control in specific areas of the nation. The product will be released as an emergency Investigational New Animal Drug (INAD) to licensed veterinarians in Texas, Florida. Oregon and Louisiana.

Veterinarians will be required to follow certain record keeping procedures to allow federal officials to monitor the drug's usage. The product will probably be sold under the trade name fluke control in cattle and sheep. Limited quantities of albendazole should be available by April 1, says Jim

Mazurkiewicz. Research by parasitologists at the Texas A&M University College of Veterinary Medicine indicates that albendazole used as a drench will control not only the adult fluke but also the immature form as well as

#### REPLACE PLANTS

TO CONTROL DISEASE Replacing a diseased plant in the home landscape may be less expensive and more effective than trying to pamper the plant back to health, says Jim Mazurkiewicz, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

It is not unusual for an "Valbazen" as a drench for individual to spend twice as much money pampering a diseased plant than would be required to replace it with a healthy one.

Occasionally it becomes obvious that a poor initial choice was made in plant and site selection. One good example of this is eunonymous which is susceptible to powdery mildew. This fungus causes white patches of mold growth on leaves. Plants located near structures where air circulation is affected by powdery mildew, and constant spraying would be necessary to prevent it. Under such conditions, it's best to remove the plant and place

it with something like wax

leaf ligustrum that is not

susceptible to powdery mil-

Root knot nematodes often make it difficult, if not impossible, to grow certain plants, points out Jim Mazurkiewicz. Once these microscopic worms are present in soil, they are generally there to stay. Boxwood is especially susceptible and will be doomed to a slow and agonizing death if root knot nematodes are present. Pulling them out and replacing them with resistant plants such as dwarf yaupons is a realistic

approach. Sometimes people develop emotional attachments to plants received from a friend or relative. In this case an individual will want to invest the time and energy required to spray or pamper the plant. The county Extension office can provide information on effective

procedures.

When a plant becomes diseased, take action, advises Jim Mazurkiewicz. Either try to cure it or find an appropriate replace-





Look your best while losing weight by planning your wardrobe with weight loss in mind.

BE REALISTIC

Begin determining your clothing needs by being realistic about yourself. How much weight do you plan to lose? Will you be able to maintain your weight loss? Will you exercise to firm up inches? Where will you more than likely lose most?

Losing weight is better news for your wardrobe than gaining. Alterations are more successful when "taking in" opposed to "letting out."

Existing seams can usually accomodate one size smaller. Looseness is more comfortable, attractive and controllable than binding, pulling and extreme tightness.

PLANNING

Planning is essential to avoid spending too much on clothing that might fit for a very short time.

Before buying anything new, take an inventory of what you have. Get rid of everything that doesn't have make-over possibilities.

While losing weight, keep your wardrobe to a minimum. Separates are the key especially since different parts of the body may change sizes at different

Coordinate individual pieces with garments that can still be worn and replace components as needed. Stick with basic colors and patterns that can be varied with tops and accessories. BUYING

buy one that fits. Don't buy Friday and Saturday with

"too small" as an incentive. Consider that some designs will fit for a longer time than others. Garments that wrap, hang from the shoulder and without a defined waistline are usually more adaptable.
