COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT

The Knox County 4-H horse show will be held Saturday morning, July 13 beginning at 8 a.m. in Benjamin. The show is open to all 4-H members in the county who have horses.

Nine classes will be shown at halter. These are as follows: Registered mares, any breed, 3 years of age and over; registered mares, any breed, under 3 years of age; grade mares, under 3 years of age; registered geldings, any breed, 3 years of age and over; registered geldings, any breed, under 2 years of age; stallion, 3 years of age and over; stallion, under 3 years of age; champion showman.

Performance classes will be held in the following: Western pleasure; reining pattern; pole bending; keyhole race; and barrel racing.

In the performance classes, the contestants will be divided as follows: 10-12 years; 12-15, over 15. The same classes will be held for girls the same ages.

A trophy will be awarded the boy or girl who complies the highest number of points in the whole show. The points will be determined as follows: first place, 4 points; second place, 3 points; third place, 2 points and fourth place 1 point. Champion will count 4 points and reserve champion 3 points.

Contestants are urged to be at the showgrounds on the east edge of Benjamin by 7:30 in order to have everyone registered and ready to go by 8:00 a.m.

The Knox County 4-H Rally Day will be held Tuesday, July 16, at the Seymour Park beginning at 9:00 a.m. General assembly will begin at 9:30. Crafts will be from 10:00-12:00. 4-H members helping with crafts will be Dean Partridge, Judy Roberson, Susan Phillips, Kay Cook and Jan Burgess.

The 4-H members will divide into groups and plan the night party from 1:00-3:00. The Department of Public Safety will give a demonstration on the use of Radar from 3:15 to 4:00 p.m. Swimming time will be from 4:00-5:30.

The night party will begin at 7:30. The planning committee chose a Wild West theme for the party. Everyone is urged to attend in some costume that represents a part of the Wild West. This could be as an Indian, bandit, sheriff, cowgirl, pioneer woman and other possibilities.

Parents are urged to attend the night party which will be held in the VFW Hall.

Cost of the Rally Day will be 75 cents per person.

Two more cases of screwworms have been detected on the south side of the Brazos River this past week. Sam Clonts and Johnny Michels both sent in samples that were confirmed as screwworm. Previously a sample from Ted Hertel was confirmed as a screwworm. Sterile flies are being dropped on the area by plane. The infested herds are being sprayed at program expense with Co-Ral.

All cattlemen up and down the Brazos are urged to be on the lookout for possible cases, take samples and mail them to the Mission Laboratory. Spraying with Co-Ral will help control screwworms as well as hornflies.

Research Seeks New Cotton Uses

Four late June developments, announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, should be of interest to producers and consumers of cotton.

Three of the developments have to do with research aimed at finding new uses for cotton and evaluating an already announced process for making all-cotton stretch yarns.

The fourth development was the announcement of Secretary Freeman of an agreement with India which provides for a record-breaking barter of cotton and possibly other agricultural products in exchange for strategic materials. Up to 300,000 bales of cotton will be exported to India, the largest bilateral barter transaction ever negotiated between the U. S. and another country.

The research announced will be conducted under contracts with the USDA. Scientists at North Carolina State College of Agriculture and Engineering will evaluate all-cotton stretch yarns in circular-knit wear. Others at the Stanford Research Institute in California will conduct research aimed at improving cotton fiber strength while a third group at Clemson Agricultural College in South Carolina will seek methods for producing improved cotton knit goods.

The research to be conducted at Clemson is seeking a method for producing cotton knit goods with increased bulk, warmth and dimensional stability. Such a process, the USDA said, would make cotton knit goods more suitable for use in winter apparel and thus open wider markets for cotton.

In Munday, Rev. Gene Sanchez is pastor of the Temple Baptist Mission. Rev. Julian Vigil of Sinton will serve as evangelist.

Climaxing the two week effort will be a Central Campaign Rally in Abilene, with the Rev. Rudy A. Hernandez, Staff Associate Evangelism Division, Baptist General Convention of Texas.

The Abilene tent revival will be July 18-21 at the Hardin-Simmons University's Rodeo Grounds, 2800 Grape.

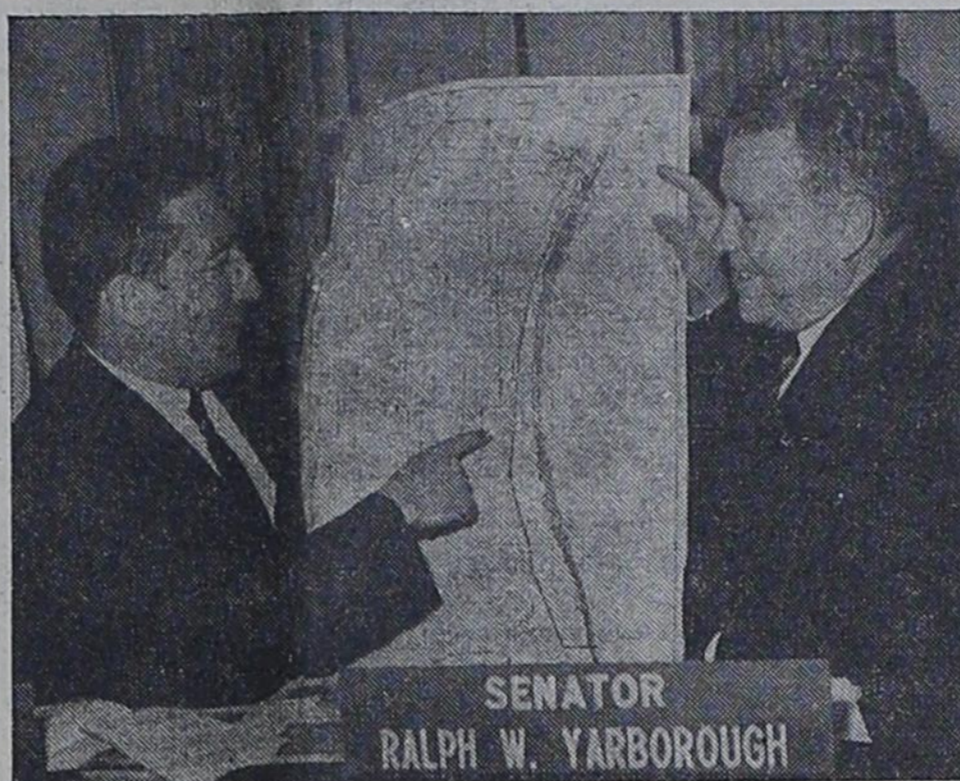

Secretary Udall said that Padre Island, which extends along the Texas coastal counties of Nueces, Kleberg, Kenedy, Willacy and Cameron, will become one of the state's greatest assets because of its drawing power as a tourist attraction. The Texas legislature has recently passed a concurring bill clearing the way for the Interior Department to begin buying the land for the Padre Island National Park site. Senator Yarborough said he had received assurance that Interior Department personnel will be at work on Padre Island within 60 days.

Go Easy With Use Of Water!

Munday is about to be faced with a critical water situation, according to Mayor V. E. Moore, who stated Tuesday that another week of hot, dry weather may bring on a request for rationing of water in the residential areas.

"We ask the people of Munday to co-operate with us in conserving water," he said. "Use as little as you possibly can, and don't waste any at all!"

The situation, which is faced almost every summer, is that the wells, Munday's source of municipal water supply, are just not supplying enough water during this period of peak consumption.

Bank's Deposits Show Decrease

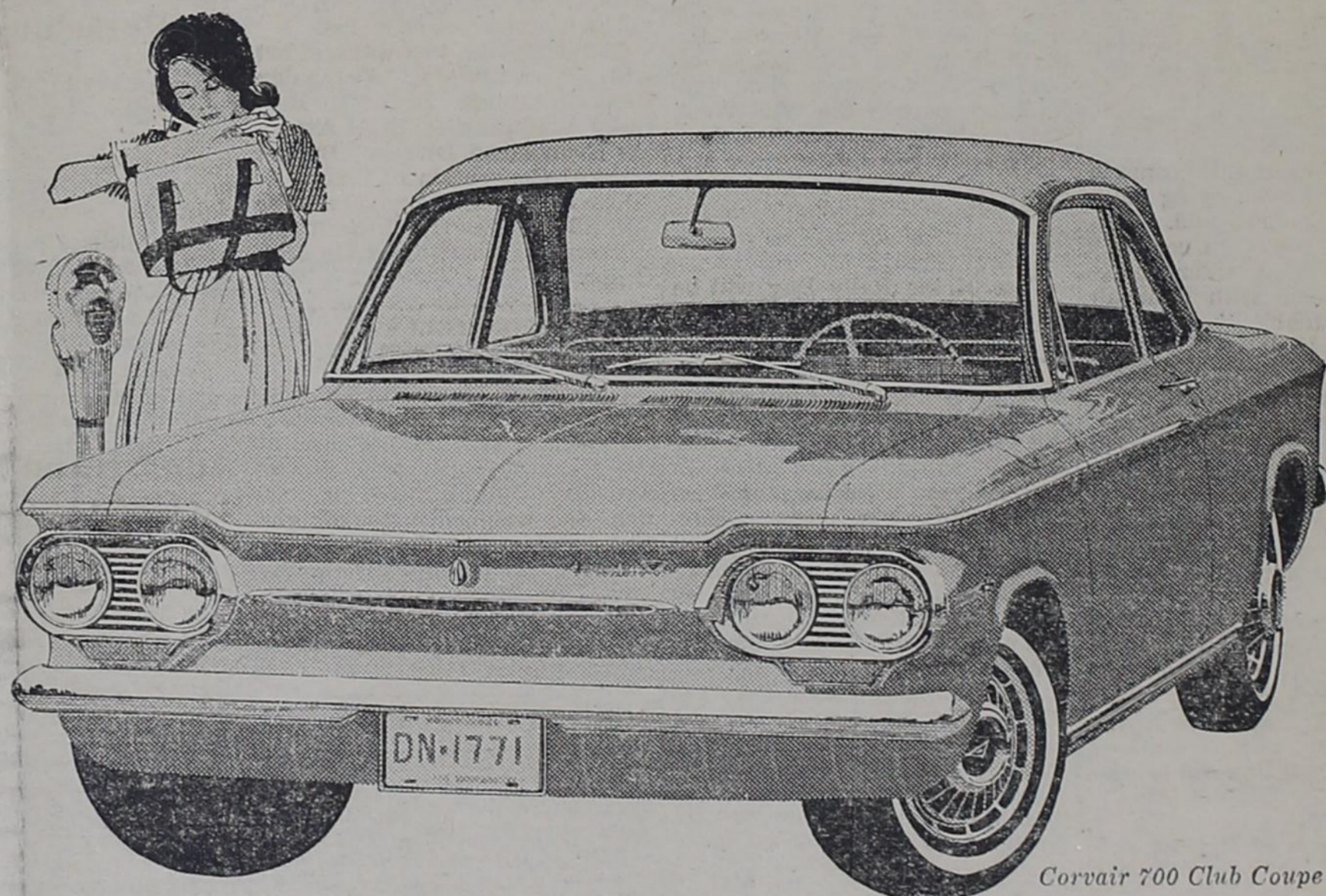

Weekly Health LETTER

Issued by the State Health Department

"Pedodontics" is a big word with a simple meaning—the care and treatment of children's teeth. A major part of pedodontics is preventive dentistry, and preventive dentistry for the very young is the one great hope for a realistic solution to our dental woes.

If a child's teeth are properly cared for up to age 15, a strong foundation has been laid for minimizing dental troubles in later years.

At about 6 months of age the four front teeth—two upper and two lower—begin to peek out. These front teeth are incisors, the cutting teeth. By age 7 to 11 months, four more teeth, upper and lower, start to come in. These are the lateral incisors at either side of the central teeth.

Then Mother Nature wisely skips a few spaces in order to properly shape the jaw. In 12 to 16 months, the back teeth or molars, come in. Then the cuspids show to fill in the space between. At about 24 months, the second molars come in.

Up to this point all teeth which have erupted are primary teeth, and although temporary they are vital. They help shape the face, help the youngster learn to speak distinctly, help him nutritionally and must serve the child until he is 12.

While all this has been going on, the permanent teeth are slowly developing in the jaw bone so they can come forth at the proper time.

The first permanent teeth to erupt are molars—sometimes called "six-year" molars simply because they emerge at about age 6. Because they do not replace the first teeth but come in just behind them, these molars tend to confuse parents who think they are also temporary teeth.

This error can lead to unfortunate consequences. Since the "six-year" molars are permanent teeth, they will not be replaced if lost.

Family dentists strongly emphasize the importance of watching for the six-year molars. They are important to the structure of the mouth. The manner in which they interlock with their opposite teeth will determine the eventual shape of the jaw, facial contour and regularity of alignment of

other teeth.

Because of their importance, the first permanent teeth are often referred to as the "keystone of the dental arch."

The strength or weakness of adult dental health—barring loss of teeth through accidents—can invariably be traced to habits of preventive dentistry learned or left unlearned in childhood. And when it comes to preventive dentistry, the pedodontist is a child's best friend.

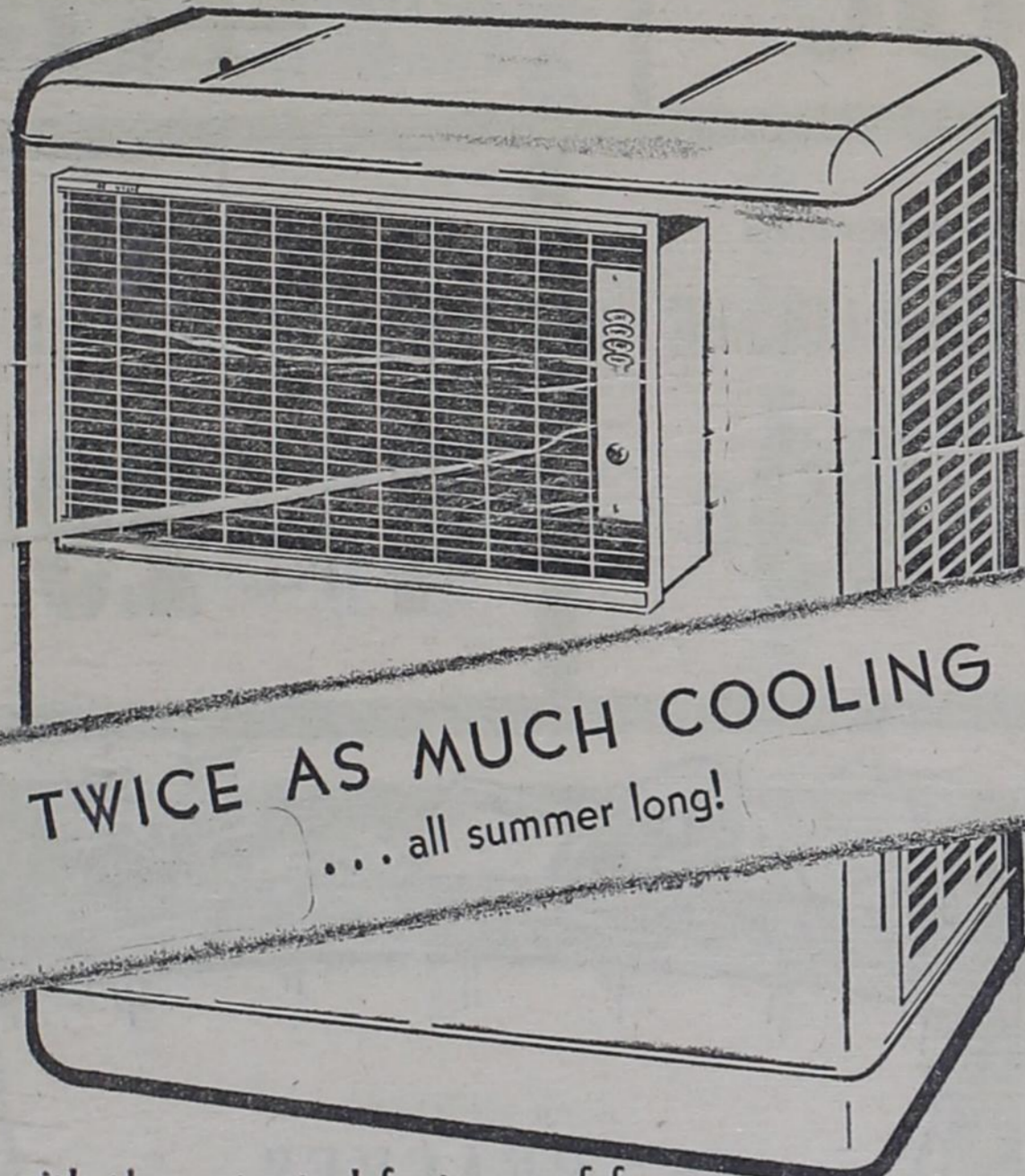

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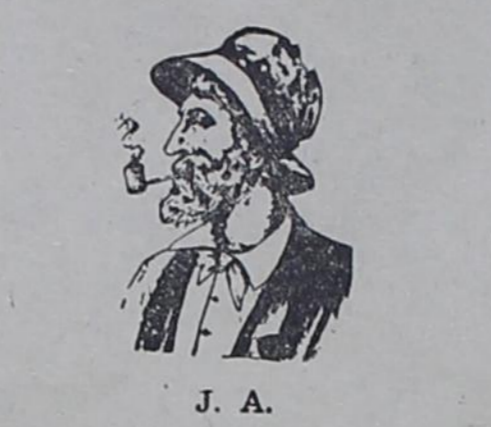
