Frankfort, Ky., Dec. 9—At 9.45 o'clock this morning the election certificate of William S. Taylor was signed by the election commissioners, and he was declared to be the governor elect of Kentucky.

The official figures of the vote filed with the Secretary of State are: Taylor 193,714, Gobel 191,331. Taylor's plurality is 2383.

The certificates, as soon as signed, were filed with the secretary of state, and commissions will be issued to the elected men at once by Gov. Bradley.
