



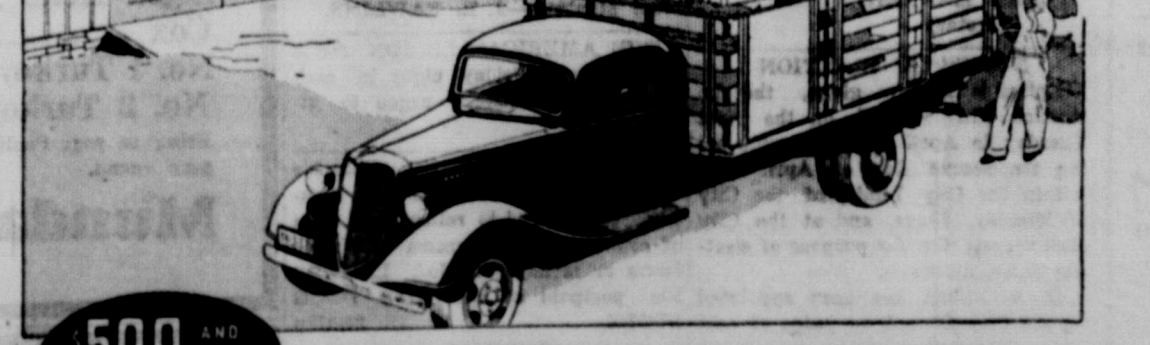

Nine out of ten of them live in memory because of their service to others. That is the highest test of character, whether a man puts his own selfish interests first or those of the social order in which he finds himself.
