Ever since Glenn started columnizing, so far as we know, he had a prominent spot on the front page. At least, it had been that way ever since we'd been reading the things that came out of his typewriter.

Until recently, that is.

Some weeks ago, he was relegated to a inside spot in his newspaper. For a time, there appeared a "box" on the front page, giving directions as to where his Hired Hand column could be found.

And some folks don't like that! Especially us.

Back in 1947, when we first gained a partnership in The Munday Times, we toyed with the idea of starting a column. At length, we discussed the idea with a friend, Wade Mahan, whose mortuary

business was right next door to us. "I don't think a newspaper is a newspaper without a column," Wade said, "especially a weekly paper. And the proper place for it is the same spot on the front page every week."

This conversation clinched our idea of starting a column in our weekly. It maintained the same front page spot some 18 years, a few months after the newspaper was sold. It's interesting how the idea came to us to call it "Kracker Krumbs", but that could entail a different story. We were named after our column--and, today, there are a few friends who call us by that name!

Finally, we decided to rest and see what the reaction would be. We had an automatic car wash that required a bit of our thinking and efforts. There were a few people--more than we expected-who told of the sorrow they had over the demise of Kracker Krumbs.

After the demise of The Munday Times, we were encouraged to start another paper, which became The Munday Courier. For legal and other reasons, we could not use the reverred name of The Munday Times.

We resumed our column writing with the new publication. Realizing what a great miracle we experienced each day with the rising of the morning sun, we dubbed this column "Look to the East" that we might behold the miracle.

On one of our retirement "efforts", we again stopped column writing. Soon we were prevailed by the Waggoners to crank up the machinery again. "There's only one request we make," we said. "That is that you give my column a front page beginning. You may jump it anyplace you want, but start it on the front page." This request is being carried out, even to this day.

But back to Glenn.

We had a friend who told us some weeks ago that Glenn Shelton's column had been a part of his "breakfast diet". He'd made a habit of picking up the Continued on Page 7





Medical Doctor To **Practice In Munday**

The Munday Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture received notice Monday, May 31, that Dr. J. Patrick Hooker of College Station will be coming to Munday in the very near future to locate housing facilities prior to opening an office for medical practice on August 15.

Dr. Hooker and his wife, Mary Kaye, visited in Munday on May 19 and 20 to meet with Chamber of Commerce officials and the Medical Search committee of the Chamber. Dr. Hooker returned May 26 to further inspect the offices of the late Dr. R. L. Newsom, where he will be practicing.

The agreement with Dr. Hooker culminates many hours of work and searching by a number of local people since 1979 for a medical doctor to enter practice and serve a great need of people in the Munday area. Elation would well describe the feeling of the people who have met Dr. Hooker and learned that he has decided to set up practice here.

Dr. and Mrs. Hooker were able to meet a number of townspeople during their visit. Not only they, but the local people making contact with them, expressed the presence of a very cordial and pleasant atmosphere. The Hookers stated that they were looking forward to coming to our community. It is believed by the chamber officers and the medical search committee that area people will have a very pleasant association with Dr. Hooker. Much of the conversation one is hearing in the coffee shops and other meeting places begins with, "We are getting a doctor!"

Dr. Hooker was born at Frost, Texas. He was in military service from 1944 to 1946, assigned to the Asiatic-Pacific Theater. He earned his bachelor of arts degree at the University of Texas at Austin in 1950, and completed his medical education at the University of Texas at Galveston in 1954.

He completed his internship from 1954 to 1955 at Jackson Memorial Hospital, University of Miami. He was resident in general surgery at this hospital in 1955-56.

Dr. Hooker was a Fellow in Neurosurgery in 1956-58 at the Mayo Foundation, Rochester, Minn., and Fellow in Neurological Surgery 1958-61 at Ochsner Foundation, New Orleans, La. In 1964 he received his diploma from the American Board of Neurological Surgery.

He has done solo practice in Lumberton, North Carolina, and Midland

He holds memberships in the AMA, TMA, Brazos/Robertson County Medical Society, Southern Medical Association, Congress of Neurological Surgeons, American Association of Neurological Surgeons, was a charter-founding member of the North Carolina Neurological Society, Pan-American Medical Association, Pan-Pacific Surgical Association and the Royal Society of Medicine (United Kingdom).

Dr. Hooker holds fellowships from the American College of Surgeons, International College of Surgeons, International College of Angiology, American Geriatrics Society and Royal Society of Health, United Kingdom.

He is a Rotarian, a member of the board of directors of the American Red Cross, and has worked actively with the Bryan-College Station Chamber of Commerce, serving on the public education and small business committees. He is presently employed as an inspector for hospital accreditation. Dr. and Mrs. Hooker were very im-

pressed with this area and expressed their desire to live in a small rural community where they can work and be an active part of that community. They are members of the Episcopal Church. Mrs. Hooker served as county lib-

rarian in Hidalgo County, and is now on the staff as a professional librarian at Texas A&M University.

Husband Of Former Goree Woman Dies

Joseph Virgil Young, 72, Lt., U. S. N., retired, died May 12, 1982 at St. Mary's Hospital, Russellville, Ark. He was a former resident of Palatka, Florida. He had a distinguished career in both military and civilian life, and retired from the Naval Service after 22 years. A veteran of two wars, he was wounded and received the Purple Heart.

Claims Are **Being Reviewed**

If you receive Social Security disability checks, you should be aware of a new law effective this year. It requires review of your claim from time to time to make sure you meet all requirements for benefits.

Previously, only certain disability claims were reexamined. For example, a review was made if the beneficiary's condition was very likely to improve or if he or she returned to work. Now, each claim must be reviewed periodically, generally at least once every three years unless the Social Security Administration determines a shorter or longer review period is justified.
