cracked corn.

The roosters from this flock dressed  
out as fryers at an average of 7½ pounds,  
and they were very tender and delicious  
eating.

system.

High School, and was active in the  
Munday school system as assistant foot-  
ball coach, head coach and athletic  
director, and as high school principal for  
a period of about 10 years, 1961-70.

Mr. and Mrs. Lowrance have purchased

the home of the late Mrs. Lela Hill and  
have become settled in Munday to take  
part in school and community activities.

Myers does not plan to be idle in his  
retirement--his wife, Dorothy, did not  
retire, you know!

Motion was made by Bryan and sec-  
onded by Gass to adopt the previous  
minutes as read. Carried.

The following bids were received and  
opened on the sale of two school buses,  
one 48-passenger 1965 Chevrolet, A.  
Clifford Trimble, 4088 Geneva Dr.,  
Von Ormy, Tex., 78073, bid of \$108.00;  
48-passenger 1968 Chevrolet, \$146.00;  
Bid No. 2 - 48-passenger 1968  
Chevrolet, Elvey McDonald, Box 211,  
Garrison, Tex., 75946, bid of \$231.00.  
Motion was made by Gass and sec-

onded by Bryan to reject bids from bid-  
ders as opened, the thinking being that  
they would bring more by being sold as  
salvage. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Hosea and sec-  
onded by Bryan to pay all bills as listed.  
Motion carried.

Motion was made by Gass and sec-  
onded by Bryan to amend the budget as  
follows: 22-6634 from \$1,500 to \$3,600,  
consolidated title IV Part B 22-6600  
from 0 to \$1,478.00. Carried.

## Members Of Council Have Busy Session

The City Council of the City of Munday met in regular session on Tuesday night, June 8, 1982, at 9 p.m. in the City Hall.

Members present: Mayor James W. Reid and Aldermen Ray Lynn Hardin, Donald Hobert, M. M. Booe, Von Marr and Bob Therwhanger. No members were absent.

Mayor Reid called the meeting to order. Minutes of the May 11th regular and May 13 special meetings were read. Addition to May 11, 1982 minutes was in relation to swimming pool roof shingle replacement contract at a cost of \$770.00 to Don Hatfield of Haskell. This repair was authorized on a motion by Bob Therwhanger and seconded by M. M. Booe. All members voted for. Mayor Reid stated minutes to be approved as written.

Next business was consideration of annexation of Lot 1, Block 3, Ruff Addition to the City of Munday. A petition was filed on March 16, 1982, by Severiano Garcia and wife Maria Garcia requesting this property be annexed to the city limits of the City of Munday, Texas. The petition was approved by the City Council at the April 13 and May 11, 1982 regular meetings. At the public hearing on May 11, 1982, no objection was voiced. Alderman Marr moved the ordinance annexing Lot 1, Block 3 of the Ruff Addition to Munday, Texas be passed. Full text of the ordinance is to be filed in the City's annexation files. Hobert seconded the motion. Voting for were Marr, Hobert, Booe, Hardin and Therwhanger. Noes, none. Carried.

Reinhart Redder met with the Council to discuss the airport farmland lease. Terms, such as mowing four times of unfarmed area and other requirements were discussed. After discussion, Therwhanger moved that Reinhart Redder's offer of \$1,000.00 for the June 82 to June 83 lease of farmland be accepted on same requirements as in last contract. Hardin seconded. All members voted for.

Mayor Reid next opened the bid on the new police car. Only one bid (sealed) was received. It was from Bill Wilson Motor Company for a 1982 Ford L.T.D.

with 351 engine, police package, etc., according to specifications. The bid was \$8,000 with the 1978 L.T.D. being traded in. Spotlights and other lighting is to be extra. Therwhanger moved the bid be accepted. Hardin seconded. All members voted for.

After discussion, Hobert moved the following resolution be passed:

**RESOLUTION:** To accept the following easements upon completion of property acquisition by the Munday Housing Authority:

1. A 10 ft. easement, said easement running east and west along the south line of a tract of land to be owned by Munday Housing Authority, said property located in the J. T. Lee Addition to Munday, Texas, Block 37, Continued on Page 2

High point winner in the 13 and under division was 11-year-old Todd Rabon of Coleman, riding his sorrel gelding TEQ Triple Bar 73, who was also named Grand Champion Gelding.

The high point buckle in the 14-18 division went the Otaka Horner of Clyde, riding her gelding Running Tag.

High point honors in the open division went to Joe

Boone of Knox City. He was showing his stallion Turtle Feather, who also took Reserve Champion Stallion honors.

Horse Show chairman Mary Ann Boone expressed appreciation to all who helped with the show, especially to bookkeeping chairman Jan Carver and her assistants, Stasy and Gary Antille of Guthrie, Lisa Boone Cockerell of Wichita Falls, Kelley Boone and Joetta Boyd; to gatemanager Charles Yost of Munday; Sam Boone of Knox City, who served as ring steward; to Knox County Extension Agent Charles Siepel, show announcer, and to Ned Jones and Fred Carver, both of Benjamin, who assisted in the arena.

Honorable mention in the walk-trot class went to Kyle Everson of Crowell, Tressie Boyd of Knox City, Michelle and April Folds of Clyde and Jason Patterson of Benjamin.

Other Knox County residents placing in the show included Leah Boone of Knox City, who placed first in showmanship and trail; second in western pleasure and western riding; and fourth in western horsemanship in the 13 and under division.

Kemp Jones of Benjamin placed first in open poles and open stakes, second in open flage, third in geldings 80 and after, and third in western riding and stake race in the 13 and under division.

known as Site 1 and Site 2 (Plat is to be attached showing size of tract and easement location). This easement is granted for the purpose of installation of utility lines. A sewer line is to be installed by Munday Housing Authority in this 10 ft. easement. The Housing Authority requests the City of Munday maintain the 6 inch sewer line once it is installed;

2. A 10 ft. easement, said easement running east and west along the north side of a tract of land to be owned by Munday Housing Authority out of the southwest one-fourth of Block 23 in the Wallace Addition to Munday, Texas (also known as Site 4). Plat is to be attached showing size of tract and easement location. This easement is granted for the purpose of installation of all utility services and to assure there will be no construction over an existing Lone Star Gas Company line. Hobert's motion further states that the easements require nothing be built on the easement dedicated property, no trees planted, etc., that would interfere with free access for utility installation and maintenance; also that after the drawing of easements and upon property acquisition by Munday Housing Authority that the two easements will be filed in the deed records of Knox County, Texas.

The motion also includes the following: That upon proper installation of the 6 inch sewer main by Munday Housing Authority according to City specifications and as agreed to by the City Administrator with the Munday Housing Authority, the City of Munday will assume all future maintenance and upkeep on said 6 inch line. (Pipe to be used is Schedule 40 P.V.C. or better - manhole required - cleanout required.)

Booe seconded the motion for resolution passage. Voting for were Hobert, Booe, Hardin, Therwhanger and Marr. Noes, none. Carried.

Next business was discussion of light-

ing for the new police car when it comes in. Melvin Cypert, police patrolman, was present. Booe moved the car be lighted to meet Cypert's request with best prices to be secured by the Police Department and the City Administrator. Spotlights are to be purchased and installed by Bill Wilson Motor Company. Therwhanger seconded the motion with all members voting for.

Next business was examination of the audit as prepared by Travis Lee for the fiscal year of April 1, 1981 to March 31, 1982. After examination, Hardin moved for audit approval. Marr seconded. All in favor.

Next City Administrator Hertel recommended changeout of thirty-two 405 watt street lights to 175 Mercury Vapor lights. This cost is \$26.00 each and installation costs will be saved in one year due to energy savings and also provide better lighting. After discussion Marr moved the City Administrator write a letter to West Texas Utilities Company authorizing this change out. Hardin seconded. All in favor.

The Council next examined street paving proposals for seal coat of 24,934 square yards of asphalt paving. After examination of the proposal, Therwhanger moved the City advertise for bids. Booe seconded. All members voted in favor.

City Administrator Hertel reported that McCreary and Huey have filed approximately six tax suits and judgement in District Court has been made. The Council requested the City Administrator press the tax attorneys to begin proceedings on several vacant tracts of land bearing delinquent taxes.

Marr moved bills be paid as follows: from airport fund, \$35.00; from ambulance fund, \$134.97; from swimming pool fund, \$444.55; from street paving special fund, \$356.25; from waterworks improvement bond account, \$577.47; from operating fund, \$11,419.13. Therwhanger seconded bill payment. All members voted Aye.

Hobert moved for adjournment. Marr

## Munday Watermelons Featured In Regional Magazine

Munday seedless watermelons are featured in an article in this month's issue of *This Is West Texas* magazine.

Written by Munday Chamber of Commerce manager Callie Ann Combs, the article discusses the history of how Munday was chosen to grow the seedless fruit, "Tri-x 314" and the success of marketing both the melon and its starter seeds.

## Local Boy Graduates From School For Blind

Last month Harold Collier, who is quick to call the home of his grandmother, Mrs. Norma Lee Collier, his real home, graduated from Texas School for the Blind in Austin.

When time came for Harold to begin school in Munday at six years of age, his mother, Nora Lee Collier, enrolled him. Mrs. Ina Cowan was his first grade teacher. After a short time, Mrs. Cowan began to ask questions such as, "Harold, can you see these words on the chalk board?" Harold would answer, "No, ma'am." Mrs. Cowan was realizing that Harold's sight was very poor and this is something Harold had not realized. He thought everyone saw things as he did.

An appointment to the office of Drs. Tucker and Walker in Abilene for tests revealed that, in fact, Harold's vision was not ample for him to do public school work. With the assistance of Mrs. Cowan and other interested persons, and the cooperation of Harold's mother, plans were made for him to be evaluated at the Texas School for the Blind in Austin.

We asked Harold, when we visited him last week at the home of his grandmother, if he was scared when he and his mother made that first trip to Austin by bus, and he answered, "I was terrified," but he made it, and he and his mother began the adjustment - hers to let her young son leave her because it was best for him; and his to leave his mother and home and take up residence with house-parents who were strangers. Not a simple task for Harold or his mother.

Harold is the eldest of the family, and his sister and other brothers, Nora Faye, Billy Ray, Curtis, Ricky and Gerald, have made their home with their grandmother Collier in Munday since the death of their mother.

As a second grade student in the Austin School, Harold was a member of the PeeWee wrestling team, a sport he participated in throughout his school years. He also ran track, was on a swimming team, and played goal ball, which is a game for the blind played with a huge ball with a bell inside to aid in locating the ball.

Harold has a number of trophies, plaques and medals which he earned in wrestling competition. He is a member of the United States Association For Blind Athletes (U.S.A.B.A.), and won a gold medal in his weight division in that competition. "Other competition involved other schools with sighted students or public schools," stated Harold.

Harold explained that he

did not study braille as the only students learning braille were those who were completely sightless or were victims of diseases that in time would take their sight. Harold's problem was present at birth and he is able to read and see objects by placing them at very close range to his eyes. He experiences better vision at night than in the daylight.

Sharing some of the fun time he has experienced at the school, he said, "We went to Six Flags, AstroWorld and the Astrodome. We went to a U.S.A.B.A. tournament in Macome, Illinois, which I enjoyed very much. I also went to Missouri where I tried out for the world goal ball team and received alternate - I was real pleased because I really had not been playing all that long. Oh yes, and one of the most enjoyable trips was to a university in Boston, Mass., where we gave a goal ball
