"Yes, I'm aware of that! And I have no interest in what you're going to talk about; and, besides that, you woke me up and made me mad!"

Hanging up on him, we glanced at the clock as we returned to bed. It was 9:05 p.m.!

Within the matter of days, we again responded to the telephone's ring. We're afraid not to answer, you know. It could be good news, happy news, an emergency message, or whatnot.

This time, the male voice said: "Mr. Edgar, I realize you're not familiar to talking to a computer, but I want to explain to you some details about Medicare . . ." and that's when we hang up!

He was right! We didn't know anything about talking to a computer, but we knew as much as we wanted to at the time!

The last time we viewed a computer at work, our friend, Gary Schur, was demonstrating the computerized mechanism in the bank. He punched a few "typewriter" keys, and there appeared our name on the screen, giving our name, our account number, the amount on deposit at that very minute, the number of certificates we had, and a "related" account, which he explained was probably our wife's account.

"I don't want to have anything more to do with that thing," we jokingly told Gary. "It'll flat tell everything it knows!"

Not many days followed when the telephone rang again. The male voice wanted to send somebody by to explain that his insurance was better than anything we had, and suggested that we drop some of the old policies and take out his new one.

We got rid of him with as much diplomacy as we could muster.  
Time passed for several hours, when the quietness of our home was interrupted by another telephone call. This time it was a female voice. She wanted to install storm doors and windows in our home.

We told her we were already fixed up in that department, thus ending that conversation.

What we're leading up to is:  
As we're all well aware, June has been referred to as "National Dairy Month" for several decades. During this month we're supposed to better our health by drinking and eating more generous portions of dairy products, such as milk, ice cream, butter and cheese.

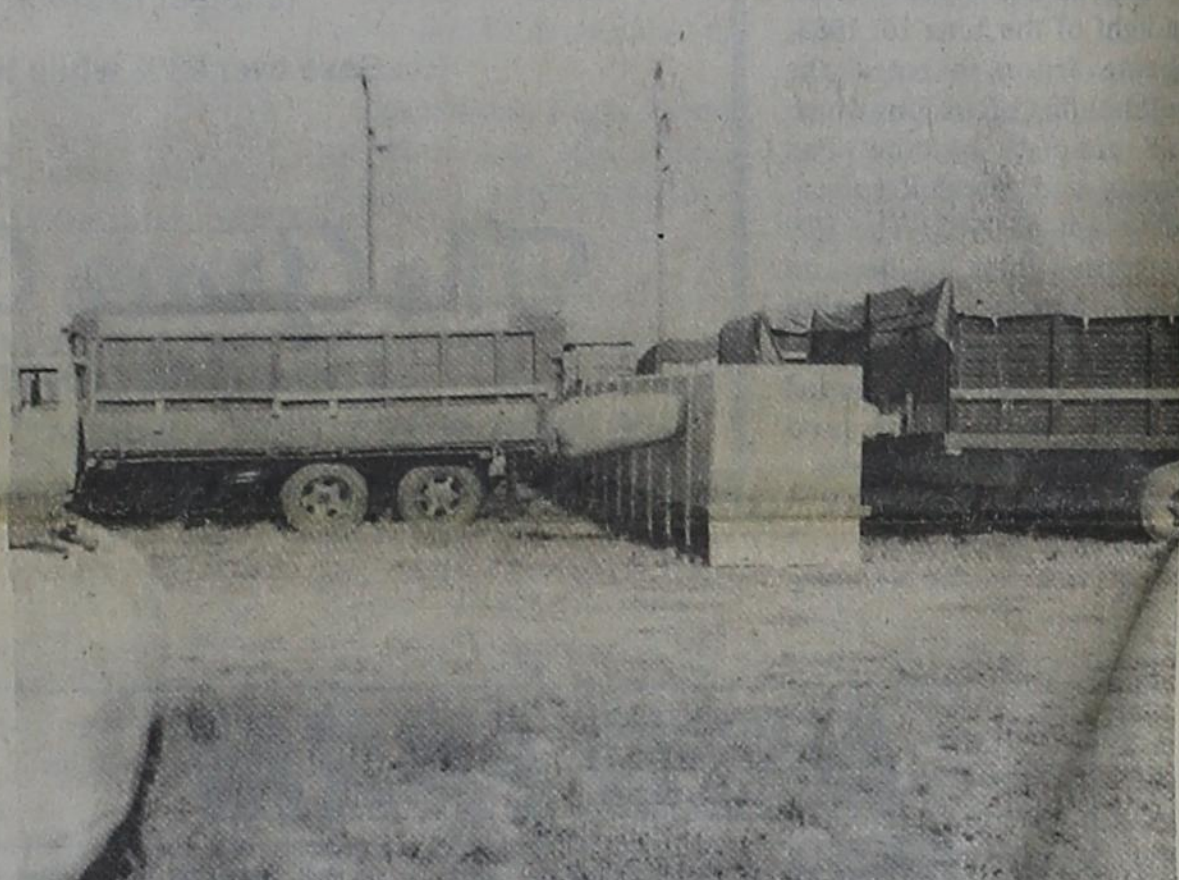

The "waiting period" for people of this area - especially those engaged in the harvest and other related farm activities - ended last week with the arrival of "fit-ten" weather for this type of work.

Wheat harvest crews who had been able to just "snatch a day or two at a time" since the wheat became ready for harvest, found themselves busier than anybody when drying weather came into its own last week.

Heavy dews kept the harvest crews out of the fields until near noon for several days, then combines would continue operating until well into the night. This kept the elevators busy as long as combines were operating.

Reports circulated last Monday were to the effect that wheat harvest is in its final days unless halted by wet weather again. One elevator operator expected the harvest to be over for him by mid-week. "The yields this year will be about as much as last year," he said, "despite the reduced acreage brought about by the PIK program."

Harvesting of the largest onion acreage ever planted in the Munday area got under way around June 12, with some 250 harvest hands working toward an early completion of the harvest. It was quite a sight to many people to see so many hands engaged in this activity.

According to grapevine reports, those engaged in onion production are well pleased with this year's result of their efforts, although there was a big drop in prices last week.

The potato harvest, which was also delayed by rains earlier, got into full swing this week, as operations were going on at all potato processing sheds. This operation is expected to continue at a rapid rate for a period of several

## Council Holds Public Hearing

The City Council of the City of Munday, Texas met in special session on June 14, 1983 at the Munday City Hall to hold a public hearing in regard to the 1983 proposed seal coat project at Munday Municipal Airport.

Members present: Mayor James W. Reid and Aldermen Jessie Tucker, Bobby D. Burnett, Doris Dickerson and Von Marr.

Members absent: Bob Therwhanger. Mayor Reid called the meeting to order and asked if anyone present wished to make a statement in regard to the proposed 1983 seal coat project at Munday Municipal Airport.

No one was present other than Council members, and the Mayor closed the hearing.

Burnett moved that the bid for the proposed work be coordinated with Texas Aeronautic Commission and the proposed bid date be tentatively set for July 12, 1983 at 1 p.m. at Munday City Hall. Approximate cost of the work is \$35,500. Motion also states that City funds on hand in the amount of \$9,000 be made immediately available to pay Munday's part of construction cost. Dickerson seconded the motion. Voting for were Burnett, Dickerson, Tucker and Marr. Noes, none. Motion carried.

## City Sales Tax Receipts Declining In Knox County

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$43.8 million in local sales tax payments to 974 cities that levy the one-percent sales tax.

"The cities who lean most heavily on oil and gas for their local receipts are still suffering, but the rest of the state is beginning to make up for the drops in revenue we saw earlier this year," Bullock said. So far this year, local sales tax cities have received \$353.5 million, less than one percent behind the \$354 million total paid by this time last year.

Munday received \$2,063.39 for this period. Our payment for the same period last year was \$2,859.40. The city has been paid \$23,171.94 thus far in 1983, which is 1.28% more than the amount collected by this time last year.

Knox City is still leading Munday by a small margin in sales tax receipts, although their rebates for the year are 10.32% down from 1982. Knox City received \$2,486.62 for this period, compared to \$3,696.48 last year.

Goree and Benjamin did not receive rebate checks this month. For the year, Goree is up 2.84% over last year's rebates, while Benjamin shows a 8.66% decrease in rebates since 1982.

The city sales taxes are collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.

The June checks were for taxes collected on sales made in April and reported to the Comptroller by the end of May.

## KNOX COUNTY INCLUDED Figures Released For Oil And Gas Production

Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association reports that an 11th consecutive year of production at the maximum effective recovery rate in nearly all of Texas' oil fields kept 1982 petroleum production in the state above the 900-million barrel figure. Avery Rush Jr., chairman of the Dallas-based association, said that figures compiled by its staff show the total petroleum output of 901,910,343 barrels included 871,780,379 barrels of crude oil and 30,129,964 barrels of condensate from wells in 214 of Texas' 254 counties.

Crude oil and condensate production last year was 26.8-million barrels below the 1981 figure, a drop of 2.9 percent. This compares with

## Vegetation Is Good For Soil

Jess Jackson Jr., range conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service in Knox City reminds area ranchers that vegetation on the land can have an affect on runoff.

The foliage and litter on the soil surface affects erosion and infiltration in at least four ways. First, raindrops have an impact of 500 pounds per square inch and can compact and seal off the soil, but vegetation reduces this problem. Second, if vegetation is present, runoff is slowed and more water can soak into the ground to be used later. Third, plant roots help keep the soil loose and allow water to penetrate the soil more easily. Fourth, every piece of vegetation or litter acts as a small dam, slowing runoff and slowing down erosion.

Vegetation and litter can be important to range managers in helping to build or maintain the soil in good condition. If the soil is in good condition it can grow more grass, and more grass means better growth of livestock and more profit.

## IRS Grants Extension On Tax Withholding

The Internal Revenue Service is granting to all payors of interest and dividend income an automatic 1-month extension of the requirement to withhold tax scheduled to begin July 1, 1983. The automatic 1-month extension is being granted to alleviate any undue hardship to payors.

This action is being taken in light of the June 16, 1983, Senate action to repeal the withholding provisions which are enacted by the Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act of 1982. The IRS noted that there has been no final action concerning repeal. The Congress continues to consider expanded backup withholding and other compliance measures.

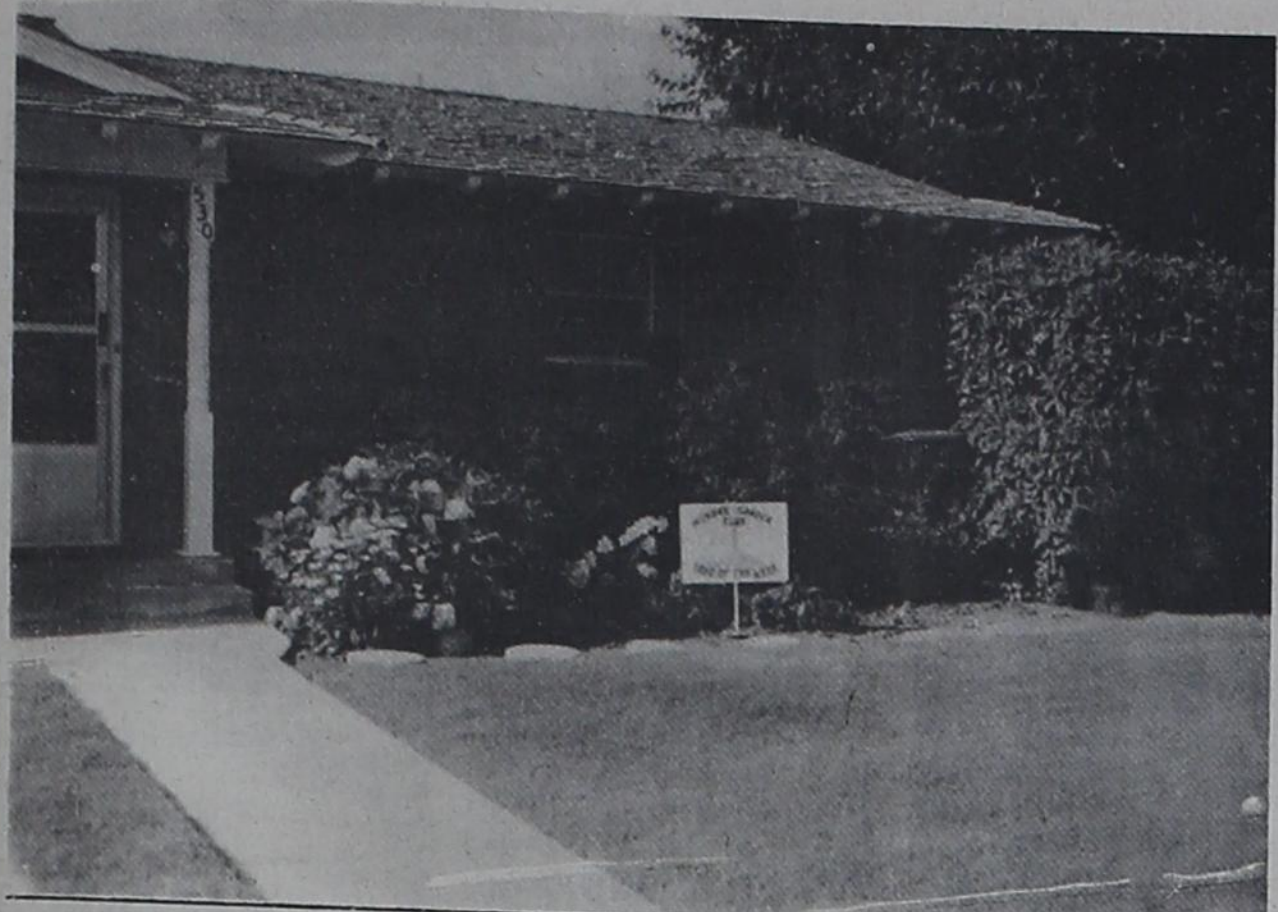

### Ranchers Roundup Unique Opportunity

Over one hundred of the ranching industry's key policy makers and leaders will be in West Texas this summer to speak during the most extensive and educational conference ever developed for southwestern ranchers. They'll all be gathering for the International Ranchers Roundup, which is set for August 1-5 at the San Angelo Convention Center. Those attending have the opportunity to participate in a variety of different sessions featuring many of the top agricultural minds in the world.

"Innovative Ranch Management" is the '83 theme which carries through a general session and three days of concurrent sessions. The six concurrent sessions feature beef cattle, range management, sheep and goats,

wildlife, marketing, business management for the ranch family, and a computer seminar. All concurrent sessions will be going on at the same time, so producers may attend talks in any of the sessions. Several sessions will be repeated.

Headline speakers for the opening day general session include National Cattleman's Association president Dub Waldrip, U.S. Congressman Tom Loeffler, Noted South African rangeman Cas Maree, Texas A&M University System Chancellor Arthur Hansen, and University of Wyoming Ranch Management Department chairman Fee Busby.

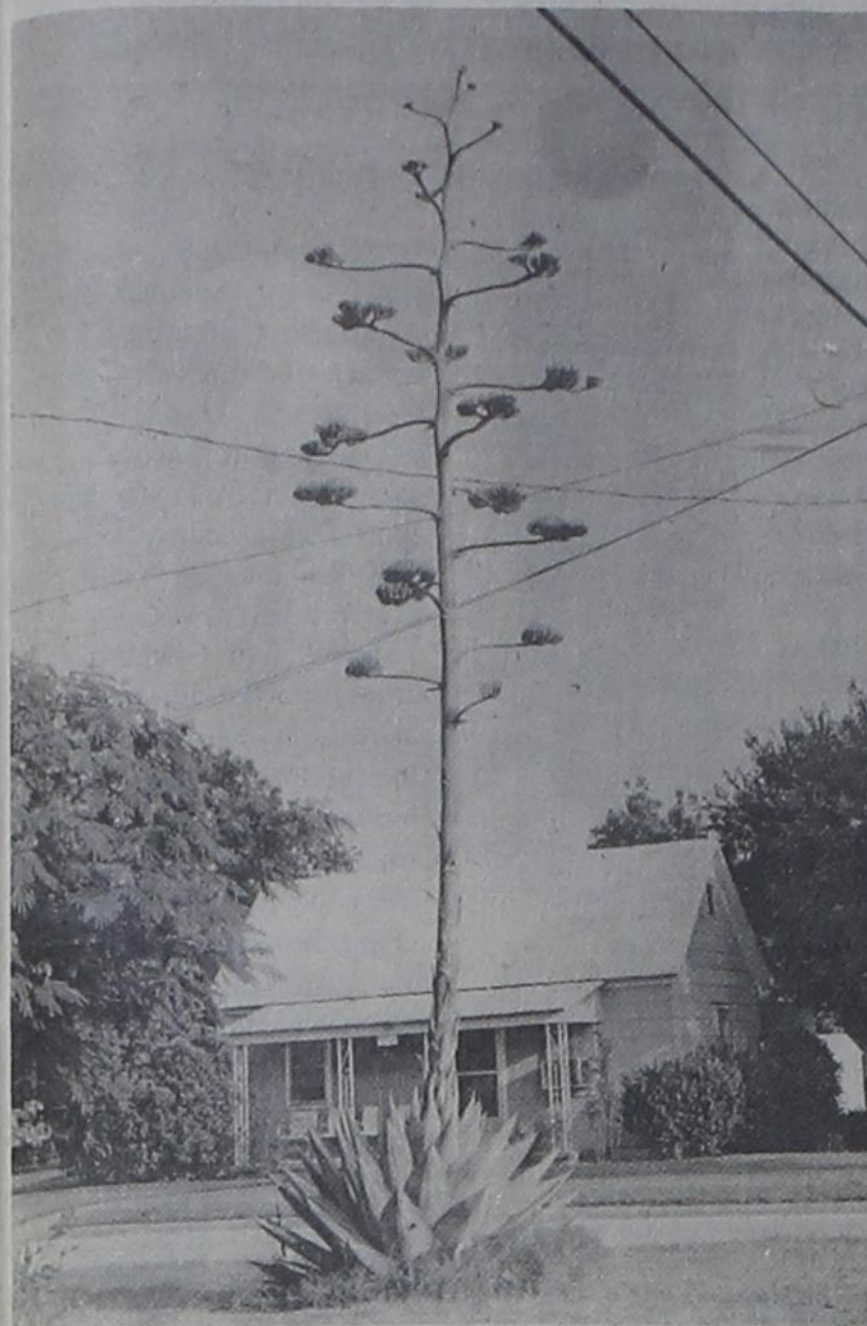

## National Farm Groups Resist Target Price Freeze

Grain Sorghum Producers Association has expressed opposition to a proposed freeze of 1984-85 target prices. The Agricultural Act of 1981 set annual increases for target prices to offset the increases in the cost of production. Secretary of Agriculture John Block has asked Congress to freeze targets at the 1983 level.

Grain sorghum targets for 1983 are \$4.85 per hundred-weight and, as currently set in the law, will be \$5.14 in 1984 and \$5.40 in 1985. Corn will increase from \$5.11 cwt. in 1983 to \$5.41 in '84 and \$5.68 in '85 if the current law is allowed to stand.

In letters to members of the Senate and House Agriculture Committees and other members of Congress, GSPA Executive Director Elbert Harp pointed out that the 1984 grain sorghum target prices, as they now stand, are still 22% below the national average cost of production. Target prices are the only real price protection farmers have under the present program. Secretary Block has stated that the target prices are too high and will encourage overproduction and increase government cost.

Harp contends that low prices encourage more production through expanded acres, heavy fertilization, double-cropping, etc., as farmers try to produce more

to offset low prices. He pointed out that if USDA will operate the farm programs in a way that will hold market prices above the target levels, then government cost in the form of deficiency payments will be totally eliminated. "Nothing would make farmers happier," Harp said.

The National Farm Coalition, a national group of twenty farm organizations with Harp as vice-chairman, has also issued an appeal to Congress to resist the proposed freeze of 1984-85 targets. "Grain Sorghum Producers Association and the National Farm Coalition are encouraging farmers across the nation to let their congressmen know their views," Harp said.

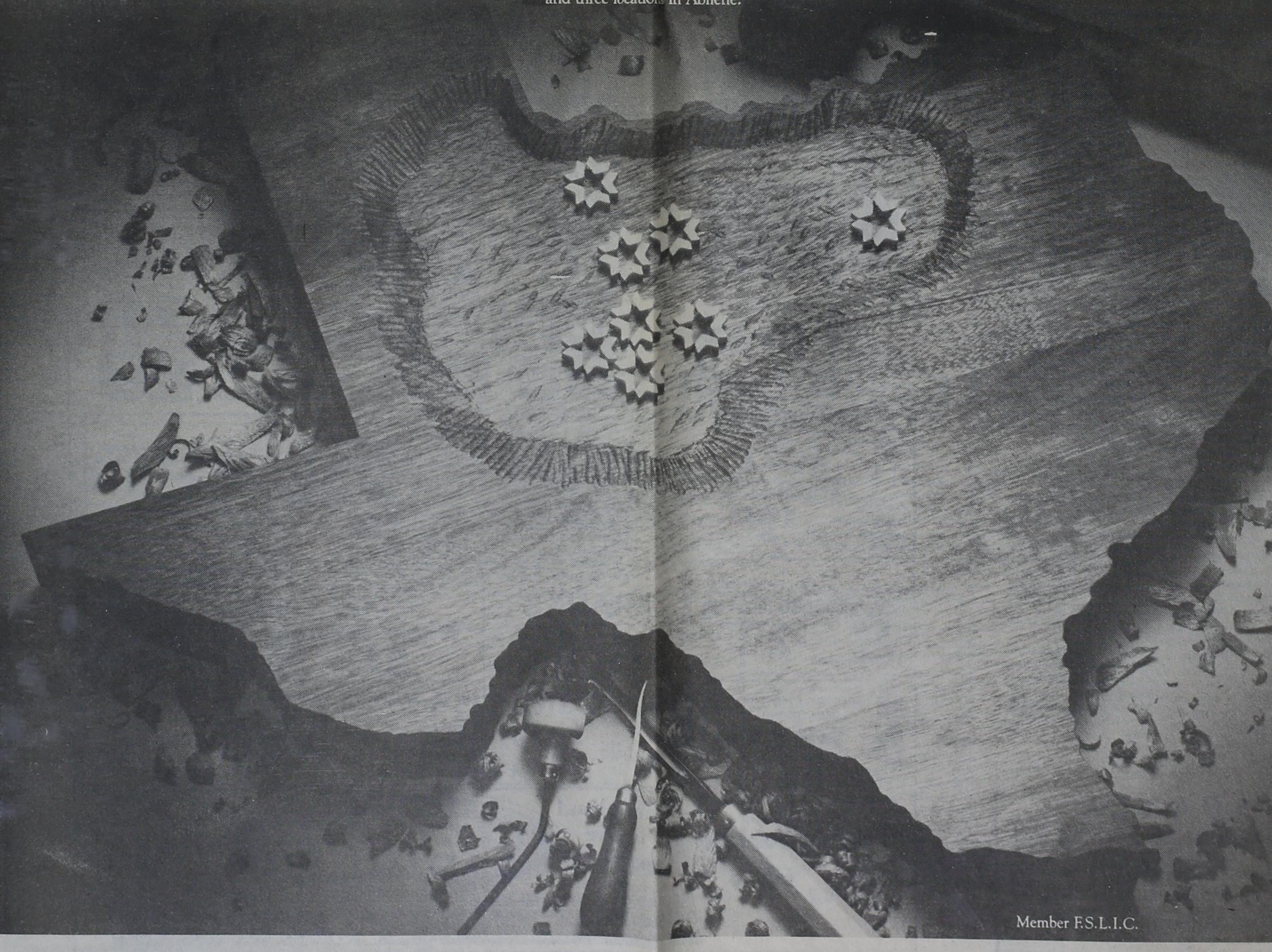

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
