Look To The East

In the Munday area, he was regarded as the "last of the ever-dwindling number of old time working cowboys," who did so much to help carve out the raw prairie into a prosperous and productive land.

Gill Wyatt was proud of his early-day cowboy life!

He knew the freedom of existence first hand, and better than any other person in the world, except that he be an early-day cowboy.

He knew the hardships of "working from dawn to dark" with no company except for his faithful steed as they "split the breeze together" looking after the cattle and guarding against raids of marauding wild animals.

The days and months he spent cowboying in Northwest Texas - at Dozier, in Collingsworth County, just about the dividing line between Collingsworth and Gray counties, were memorable ones for Gill Wyatt.

He was employed on the Albert Lacock Ranch and was the only cowboy to look after the small herd of this aging couple.

We've heard him recount tales of the hard winters in that area. A blizzard had filled all cuts, gullies and ravines to ground level, and it was very hazardous to mount his pony and set out on range chores, not knowing at what moment his mount might step into a ravine, and they couldn't work their way out.

Gill got the fever to "move on" in a few months, and he recalled how this couple, who had learned to love him dearly, stood beside his buggy, getting in between the front and rear wheels so he couldn't move, and with tears in their eyes begged him to stay with them.

"They had no children or other relatives", Gill said, "and that little spread could have been mine if I had just stayed." Yet, he - in true cowboy fashion - moved on.

He worked on the Mürth Griffith ranch near Haskell for a time, then moved back to Gatesville.

Here he met Ina Rogers. World War I came along and interfered with their plans for marriage until Gill had completed his tour of duty. Wedding bells rang on December 13, 1919.

They decided to head west in 1920. Gill was to go on ahead with the wagon, and Ina would follow by train within a few days. "I couldn't see him going off and leaving me behind," Ina said, "so I just crawled into the wagon and came along."

This togetherness existed between Gill and Ina Wyatt throughout all their married life. Except in dire circumstances, they were always together when night came.

Returning to West Texas, Gill worked on the Ferris Ranch, southeast of Munday, and the couple were again enjoying ranch life.

Sometime thereafter, they secured a small farm on the western edge of Munday, and settled down for good. They occupied this farm home for well over 30 years. They joined in together with Munday is a good town, and we are proud to call it home.

Adverse circumstances made it impossible for Gill and Ina to live together alone, so they made the decision to establish residence at the Munday Nursing Center. Thus, they were able to remain together and enjoy the love and companionship of each other, except for trips to the hospital.

We loved and admired Gill Wyatt. We used to enjoy his "yarns" of cowboy life on the range, whether on a fishing trip together, or just sitting around the tables at the domino hall. Gill was a great, jovial and good man, the likes of which were never duplicated.

Our life has been made richer by our association with Gill Wyatt, at church, in his home, at our place of business or just lolling around the domino hall. His life was not lived in vain!

It might have been coincidental or ironic that God called Gill home on the same day of the same month - October 25 - that he came into this world, after a life-span of 92 years!

Industry Selects Munday

David Key, president of the Munday Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, met with officials of General Shelters, Inc. last week at which time an agreement was made that the industry would come to Munday if the property they are interested in could be provided.

General Shelters, Inc. construct portable office and storage buildings. They believe Munday is ideally located as the center of their marketing outlets for their products. Their plans are to move on the scene to begin work as soon as possible.

When they are in full operation they expect to employ at least 15 local people, some of whom will be skilled workers. They expect to purchase several thousand dollars of materials locally since all of the materials used are not purchased in quantity lots. In addition to materials, they will use local welders to construct trailers to move the finished product by trucks.

In making this statement, Key stated, "We are delighted to have the opportunity to have General Shelters, Inc. to locate here. This is a real opportunity for us to work with them, and we shall make an all-out effort to secure the property they desire. We have been in contact with this firm since mid-August and are very impressed with these folks. Our chairman of the industrial committee and the officers of the Munday Industrial Foundation have made every effort to find suitable property for them. They have made their selection and are now ready to move here."

"We urge every citizen in Munday to support the Chamber and the Industrial Foundation in their efforts to secure the property."

Heroism Awards Presented To Two Munday Citizens

At the annual meeting of B-K Electric Cooperative held August 12, 1983, Ray Herring and Karen Longan were presented Certificates of Heroism for saving the life of B-K employee Bill Longan. The presentations were made by Stanton Brown, a B-K Electric Cooperative director.

On Friday, October 28, a plaque was presented to Ray Herring by John L. Grindstaff Sr., president of the Board of Directors. The plaque reads, "Presented to Mr. Ray Herring for his instant and effective action in administering Cardio-pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) to Bill Longan, an employee of B-K Electric Cooperative, resulting in the saving of

human life."

These awards were presented in connection with an accident which occurred on July 6, 1983. Longan, a lineman for B-K Electric, was energizing an irrigation well for Ray Herring at his farm two miles northwest of Goree when he accidentally bumped into the 240 volt under-build. When Longan slumped unconscious into the bucket of his truck, Herring clumbed up the bucket and managed to work the controls to bring it down. He and Longan's wife, Karen, who had ridden with her husband that day, pulled Bill out of the bucket and administered CPR until he started breathing, then drove him to the Seymour Hospital.

At the hospital Longan walked, on his own, into the emergency room. He had no burn marks, nor was he in shock, so medical personnel determined that he could go home. He was back at work in a very short time.

Don Gregg, manager of B-K Electric, said, "On behalf of the directors, management, employees and the Cooperative's consumers, we want to extend our most sincere gratitude and appreciation to Mr. Ray Herring and Mrs. Karen Longan for their acts of heroism in saving the life of Bill Longan. We thank God that you were there and had the knowledge of CPR. We will be forever grateful to you both."

Construction To Begin This Week

North Construction Company of Hurst was recently awarded the bid for construction of nine new apartment units in Munday. The units, to be named the Amerson Apartments, will be used for senior citizen housing.

The construction company's bid of \$221,604 received approval from the Department of Housing and Urban Development, and Mark North was in Munday on Friday, October 28, to sign the contract.

In a ceremony held in the office of Jeanie Carden, administrator of the Munday Housing Authority, North and Frank Jackson, chairman of the Housing Authority board of commissioners, signed the contract for this work.

Mrs. Carden said that initial stages of the work would begin this week, and the construction company hopes to complete the job in 90 days.

Munday Lowered In UIL Classification

In a move expected by local school administrators and coaches, Munday was realigned to Class A for all University Interscholastic League competition. UIL enrollment cutoff marks were Class 5A, 1,305-above; Class 4A, 650-1,304; Class 3A, 275-649; Class 2A, 135-274; and Class A, 134-under. Munday's high school enrollment is 125.

Schools with fewer than 90 students will play six-man football.

Archer City was also classified from 2A to A. Archer City and Munday will move into football District 3-A with Aspermont, Bryson, Chillicothe, Crowell, Knox City, Motley County, Spur, Throckmorton, Valley and Windthorst.

After the exhibition this Friday, Mr. Mix will explain his program, policies and techniques. Parents can then enroll their children in classes.

Moguls Put On Offensive Show To Smother Seymour

The Munday Moguls ran and passed by the Seymour Panthers Friday night for a 55-20 victory. The win gave Munday a 2-2 record in district play and leaves the Moguls in a tie for second place in the district with Haskell and Rotan.

Hamlin took the district championship last week with their win over Rotan and will be one of the teams representing District 4-AA in the playoffs. Haskell and Rotan meet this Friday, and the winner of their contest will be the other team to advance to the playoffs. Munday's playoff hopes are next to impossible, even with a win over Hamlin, because our two district losses have been to Haskell and Rotan. Only if the Yellowhammers and Indians tie in their game and the Moguls defeat Hamlin could Munday advance to post-season play.

The Moguls scored on their first possession Friday night on a 17 yard run around left end by Quincy Adams. The PAT try was no good.

The Panthers came roaring back and scored six plays later on a 36 yard run by Monty Morris. Ernest Curley kicked the

point after. Unable to move the ball downfield, Munday was forced to punt and Seymour started another scoring drive on their own 16 yard line. Morris crossed the goal line for the second time with 7:19 left in the first half and Curley's extra point try was good, giving the Panthers a 14-6 lead.

From that point on, however, it was all Munday, as the Mogul defense recovered two fumbles and held the Panther offense to only 41 yards. Kent Josselot and Dent Offutt each picked off a Seymour pass to aid the defensive effort.

Behind the blocking of the Mogul line, speedy Quincy Adams began pouring it on for touchdown runs of 41, 30, 49, 55 and 12 yards. Adams wound up with 322 yards rushing for the night. The Moguls scored twice more on passes from Dent Offutt to Paul Wright from 15 yards out and 9 yards to Jim Earl Dockins. Todd Thompson ran the extra points in the second quarter to tie the score at 14-14, then Ronny Lowrance kicked four PATs to add to the Mogul triumph.

Seymour's final touchdown resulted from a fumble recovery in mid-air by Russ Green.

The Moguls will play their final game of the 1983 season at Hamlin on Friday, November 4. Several seniors will be playing their last football game for Munday High School and it should be a fine contest. Hamlin is undefeated this year and boasts an exceptional offense centered around the running of back Eddie Bolden. Kickoff time is 7:30 p.m. and local fans are encouraged to make a large cheering section for the Mogul team.

Hospital Board To Study Possibility Of New Building

The October meeting of the Knox County Hospital board of directors was called to order at 8 p.m. Thursday, October 27, by board president Vernal Zeissel.

Members present were Vernal Zeissel, Buster Lowery, Richie Smith and Ray Lynn Hardin. Also present were administrator Richard Wheeler, Randy Abernathy, Dan Powers and Gene Vineyard.

Members absent were Stanton Brown, Bernard Brown and David Perdue.

The minutes of the September board meeting were read by Rich Wheeler and approved as read.

The board then engaged in a discussion concerning the next board meeting. Since the next scheduled board meeting falls on Thanksgiving it was decided to move the meeting up one week to November 17.

It was also decided that, because of daylight savings time, the board of directors meeting should be moved to 7:00 p.m.

Rich Wheeler then gave an overview of the Medicare Survey conducted in the last part of September. It was noted that the staff and administration of the hospital were praised for the great strides they had taken toward improving health care delivery in Knox County during the past two years. The main concern of the survey team is the age and condition of the hospital building.

After a long discussion about the recent Medicare Survey, the condition of the existing building and the ramifica-

tions of acquiring a new building, it was decided to conduct a possibility study, at no cost to the hospital, concerning the acquisition of a new structure.

A financial report of the hospital was then given by Rich Wheeler, followed by a list of September accounts payable to be approved. Richie Smith moved the accounts payable be approved and paid as listed. Buster Lowery seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

With no further business to discuss, Ray Lynn Hardin moved the meeting close. Richie Smith seconded the motion. The motion passed and the meeting adjourned at 9:50 p.m.

Gas Rate Changes In Unincorporated Areas Near Cities

The Railroad Commission has approved changes in gas rates for customers of Lone Star Gas Company in unincorporated areas (environs) near 31 Texas cities, including Munday, Benjamin and Weinert.

The new environs rates are identical to the rates previously approved by the respective nearby city governments for customers inside their corporate limits.

The new rates will be effective on November 5 in the environs of Annona, Kemp, Collinsville, Ladonia, Maypearl, Roxton and Van Alstyne, on November 9 in the environs of Byers, Clarendon, Dublin, Franklin, Lipan, Lone Oak, Munday, Bangs, Fairfield, Granger, Hico, Lewisville, Bells, Benjamin, Lueders, Stamford, Tom Bean, and Wellington, and on November 12 in the environs of Caddo Mills, Harker Heights, Robert Lee, Strawn, Thorndale and Weinert.

Rates in the environs of these cities will increase in different amounts ranging from \$1.22 to \$6.25. Approximately 955 customers will be affected.

The Railroad Commission has the authority to approve rates for gas service in unincorporated areas of Texas. Proposed gas rates for these areas are examined in light of the company's operating efficiency and the rates that have been approved by the nearby city governments.

Then, if she had the time and there was no waiting line at her window, she'd "pass the time of day" with her customer, inquire about members of the family and have them leave with a little brighter outlook on life for having made contact with this pleasant and efficient bank teller.

But this doesn't happen any more, especially with this bank teller of many years standing. Many thousands of dollars have passed from her hands to those of her customers during all these years.

Drucilla Morton decided it was time to retire. She'd talked about it with certain ones of her friends for some time, but didn't reach her final decision until the last day of September, 1983. The void, although quickly filled by another, was being felt more and more by the absence of Drucilla.

She started her banking career on June 16, 1949, after completing six years - 1943-49 - as manager of Perry Bros. store in Munday. Thus she rounded out 40 years of service to the public in Munday on September 30, 1983.

"The main thing I miss at my time of retirement," she said, "is my contact and association with the customer. I like people and I miss seeing and passing the time of day with them since I left the bank job. These many friends will remain as pleasant memories

in my life." Drucilla cited as her reason for retirement at this time as, an opportunity for an improved home life and being able to devote more time to her mother, Ruth Wren, who has been a resident of Munday Nursing Center for a number of months.

So, as we greet new faces at her favorite tellers cage, we entertain the wish that Drucilla's retirement will be more rewarding than she ever hoped it would be.

Gill S. Wyatt, 92, a retired farmer and old-time working cowboy, passed away at 8:25 a.m. Tuesday, October 25, at the Knox County Hospital after a long period of illness.

He was born in Gatesville on October 25, 1891, and married Ina Rogers on December 13, 1919, in Gatesville, after Gill had completed his time in the military service. He was a veteran of World War I, a long-time member of the First United Methodist Church in Munday, and a charter member of the American Association of Retired Persons in Munday.

Because of their advanced age and declining health, the Wyatts have been residents of Munday Nursing Center

for the past few years.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Thursday from the First United Methodist Church in Munday with the pastor, Rev. Don Travis, officiating. Burial was in Johnson Memorial Cemetery under direction of McCauley-Smith Funeral Home.

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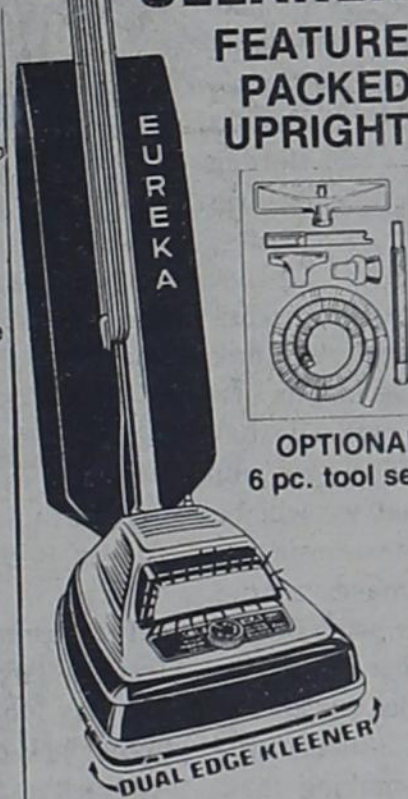


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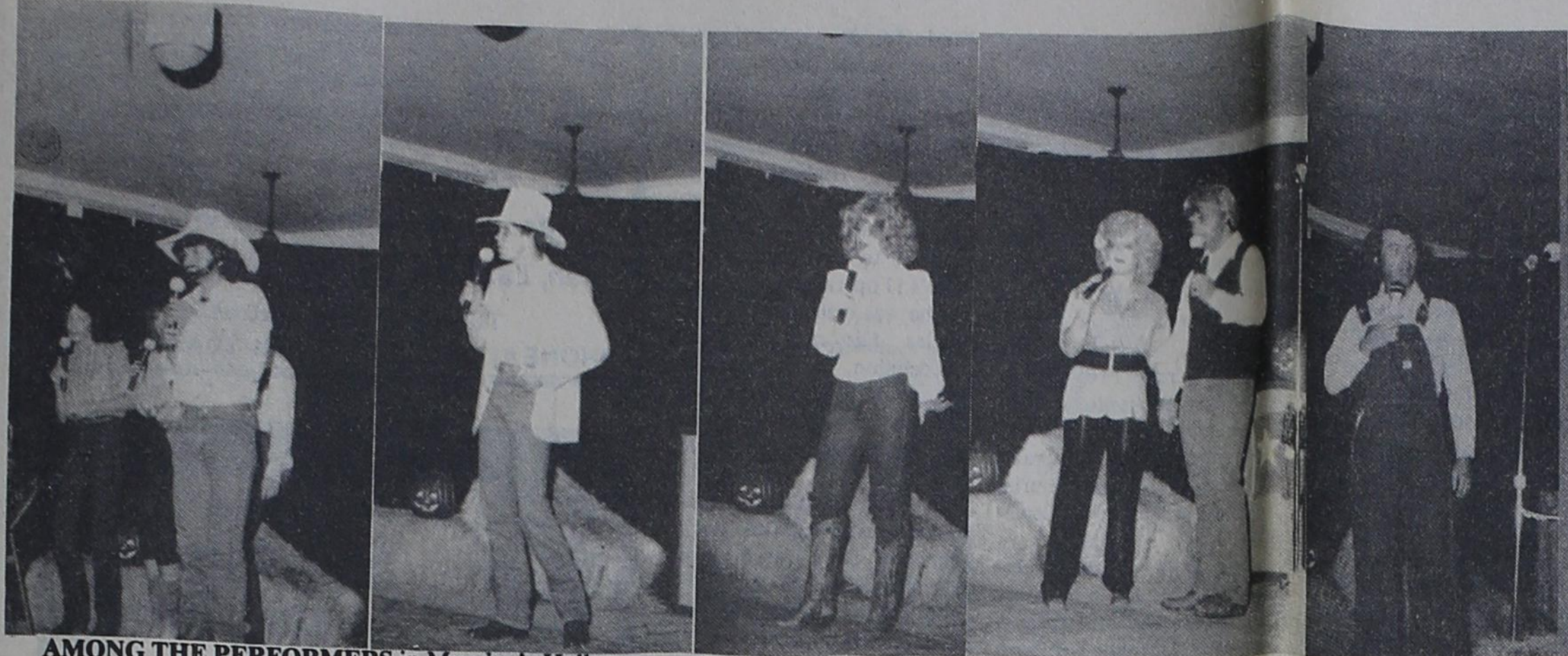

Use Of Wildlife Can Be Difference In Profit And Loss

With many area landowners and operators working hard to make a profit, Jess Jackson Jr. of the Soil Conservation Service in Knox City has a suggestion to consider. Hunting season is approaching and hunting leases for species such as quail sell for as much as \$3 per acre in many parts of the state. This money can mean the difference between profit and loss for producers in years such as this one when weather has ruined crops and slowed grass growth.

It is often easy to use odd areas in cropland and/or small areas in rangeland to produce the cover and food that will increase wildlife production and availability for the hunter without affecting crop or livestock production. The SCS office has many ideas and designs for wildlife feeders, watering facilities, adapted plant species, and much more to help local producers make the most out of their wildlife.

She was preceded in death by a daughter, Lillie Mauryse Howard, in 1937.

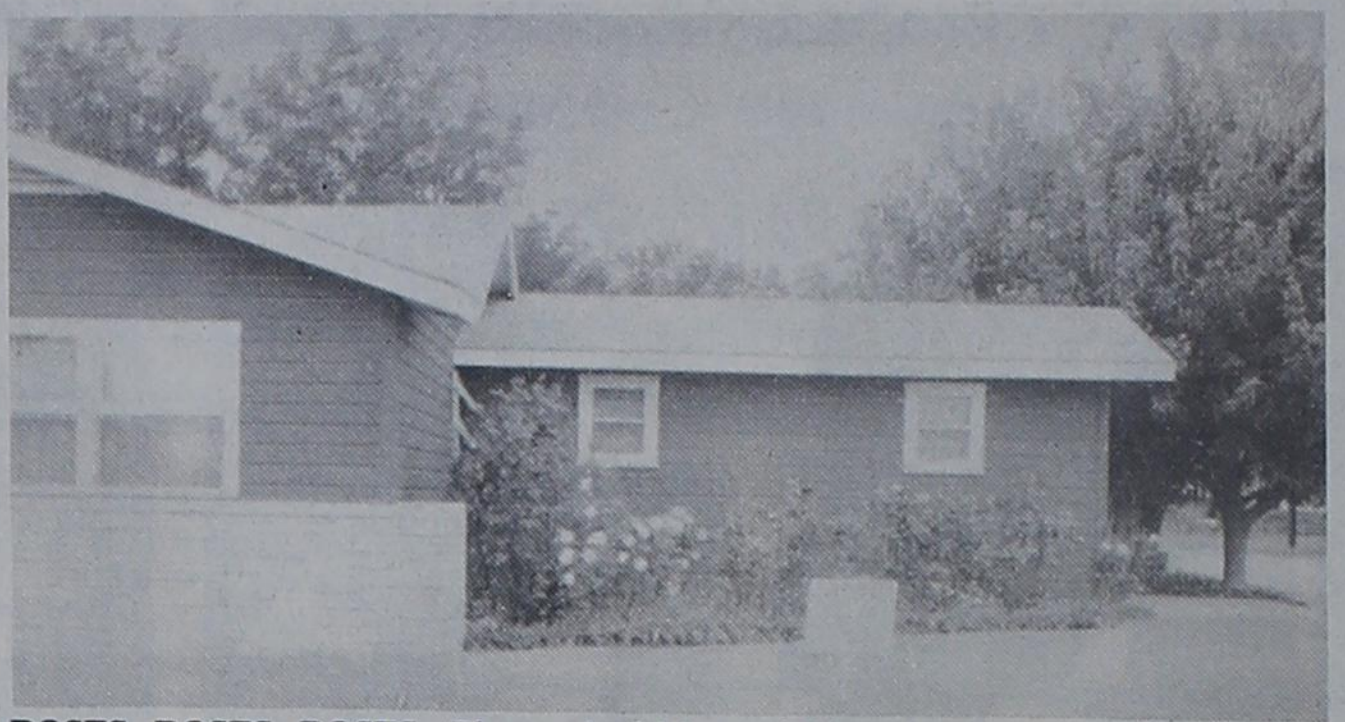
