

#### **Athletes Using New Weight Room**

The completion of Munday High School's new addition to its athletic complex was celebrated Saturday night with a cookout at the facility.

## **Rhineland Water Group Applies For FHA Grant**

Efforts are underway to obtain a water system for the community of Rhineland and surrounding area. In May, 1983, the Rhineland Water Supply Corporation was chartered as a non-profit corporation. The corporation was formed for the purpose of furnishing water for general farm use and domestic purposes to individuals residing in the rural community of Rhineland, Texas and the surrounding rural areas.

Bernard M. Brown, president of the corporation, announced Friday that a grant has been applied for from the Farmers Home Administration. In order to be eligible for the grant, the median income of the people in the area to be served can- dential. No one involved in the not exceed the median income for the non-metropolitan rural areas of the State of Texas.

Brown stated that the Community Resource Group of Springdale, Arkansas will conduct an income survey of the Rhineland community and surrounding area. This organi-



zation assists rural areas in obtaining water and sewer facilities and is financed by the Federal government. There will be no charge to the participants in the survey. Within the next few days, each

prospective household will receive a survey form to be filled out, along with a postpaid envelope addressed to Community Resource Group in Springdale, Arkansas.

Brown said, "We need as many persons as possible to participate in this survey in order to have a reasonable chance of obtaining the grant. We can assure each and every person who participates in the survey that the information as to their incomes will be completely confi-Rhineland Water Supply Corporation will ever see the information which is furnished because the form will be mailed directly to Arkansas and evaluated there by the staff of Community Resource Group. I strongly urge everyone's participation in order to accomplish what we believe is a very worthwhile purpose.'

Brown reported that a large number of residents of the Rhineland area have expressed a great deal of interest in the project. There is also a strong possibility that the Vera area will be included in this project, and a number of Vera residents have met with the board of directors of the Rhineland Water Supply Corporation.

In addition to Brown, the other members of the board of directors of the corporation are Marvin Zeissel, Dayle Kuehler, Bobby Moore and Francis Birkenfeld.

# **Become Priest**

Brother Jeremy Myers, now a deacon at Subiaco Abbey in Subiaco, Arkansas, will be ordained to the priesthood at Subiaco on April 28, 1984, by Bishop Andrew J. McDonald of Little Rock, Ark.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Billie Jake Myers of Rhineland, Brother Jeremy was born in Rhineland on July 15, 1956, and attended the St. Joseph Parish elementary school there. He did his high school studies at Subiaco Academy, graduating in 1974, and attended St. Joseph's Seminary in St. Benedict, Louisiana, receiving his bachelor's degree in psychology from that institution in 1978.

He entered the novitiate of the abbey in the fall of 1978 and made his first profession of religious vows September 14, 1979, and final vows three years later. In 1980, he entered the St. Meinrad School of Theology at St. Meinrad, Indiana, completing his theology studies there. The degree of Master of Divinity will be awarded on May 3.

Last spring he was ordained to the diaconate and served in that capacity at St. Boniface Church in Fort Smith, Ark., during the summer. He returned to St. Boniface in January, and will continue to serve there until Easter, just before his ordination to the priesthood.

The ordinand has been a frequent contributor to the Abbey Message and has written for other publications. He was a leader in activities at both seminaries and has been active in Camp Subiaco.

The new priest will celebrate a Mass of Thanksgiving at St. Joseph's Catholic Church in Rhineland at 4 p.m. Saturday, May 5. A parish dinner will follow. After family and parish celebrations, he will return to the abbey for assignments.

Mr. and Mrs. Myers and their family plan to travel to Arkansas to be a part of their son's ordination.

**County Voters Pick** 

Maurine Reeder of Knox City were elected to the Knox County Hospital District board of directors in a county-wide election Saturday. Zeissel, an incumbent, won 587 votes to Mrs. Reeder's 513.

The other incumbent, Richie Smith of Munday, received 487 votes for third place but lost his seat on the board of directors. Ernie Eaton of Benjamin had 227 votes. Write-in votes went to Dr. Newton Neufeld, Gaylon Scott and Weston Parris, each of whom got one vote. Results of other city and school elections in Knox County follow.

#### **Goree School Trustees Elected**

Incumbents Leroy Russell and Tommy Decker were returned to the Goree Independent School District board of trustees by voters in Saturday's election. Russell led the race with 62 votes while Decker followed with 41. Darrell Patterson received 36 votes out of the total 74 ballots cast.

Margie Allen and W. D. Robinson, incumbents, and Bob Presnall won seats on the Goree City Council with 61, 55 and 60 votes, respectively. 67 persons voted in the city contest.

#### **Benjamin Voters Pass Ordinance**

An ordinance to abolish junked or abandoned vehicles in the City of Benjamin was passed by voters by a 31-23 margin. This proposition was voted on in conjunction with the city and school election.

Homer Rolston led the ticket in the school board race with 110 votes. Others winning trustee spots were Trenna Patterson with 95 votes and Steve Wilson with 77. Janice Tolson received 74 votes and Raul had 22 write-in votes, and W. T. Cartwright and Kenneth Carroll had ty. one each.

Buddy Tolson, Bertha Driver and

Vernal Zeissel of Munday and Sarah Meinzer captured the three city council seats with 82, 82 and 52 votes, respectively. Others in the race were Lucille Moorhouse, who received 48 votes, and incumbent Weldon Gideon, with 46. C. W. Benson garnered 14 write-ins, Richard McCanlies had two and Bud Conner and Tracy Cartwright received one each.

#### **Absentee Voting Rules** Explained

Gloria West, county and district clerk, has announced that absentee voting for county and state elections will begin Monday, April 16, and continue through Tuesday, May 1.

Residents of Knox County who are under 65 years of age must vote absentee in person at the clerk's office at the courthouse in Benjamin. Ballots cannot be mailed to these persons unless they are in the hospital and cannot go to Benjamin. Persons who are 65 years of age or older may request ballots by mailing a letter asking for an absentee ballot to the clerk, and the ballot will be sent to them.

Persons who live outside Knox County but are still registered to vote here may vote by mail. Mrs. West said those persons must mail her a letter asking for an absentee ballot, and the letter must be postmarked outside Knox County. She will then send the voter an absentee ballot and he should mark his choices on the ballot and mail it back to the clerk's office. The ballot must also be postmarked outside of Knox County.

There is always a great deal of confusion concerning this issue, and voters should be reminded that they cannot request an absentee ballot by telephone or pick one up for another person. ## **Parallel Terraces Control Erosion In Cropland Soil**

According to Clint Jones, conservation technician with the Soil Conservation Service in Knox City, erosion may reduce soil productivity if it occurs faster than the top soil can be replenished through natural processes. Many cropland soils, including some of the most productive, have been severely eroded in this country.

As a rule of thumb, on deep soils commonly used for cropland, five tons of soil per acre can be lost annually without damaging the soil's productive potential. Holding erosion within these rates permits indefinite use of the soils. If you can see erosion taking place on your cropland under normal rainfalls, then more than five tons of soil are being lost. In most cases it would take terraces to cut soil erosion down to an acceptable level.

Terracing the land is a practice that gained popularity back in the late 1930's when soil erosion first came to the attention of farmers. Terraces in those days in this area were run on the contour. This meant that you could not farm with the terraces because they were not parallel. This made terrace maintenance a problem and farming more difficult (especially

to an acceptable level. This means that terraces will be designed to fit your equipment so you can farm with when planting row crops). Today, equipment is bigger than ever, labor costs are much higher and fuel cost is always going up. This means that you, the farmer, want to get over the land as quickly as you can to keep cost per acre to as low a figure as possible. Today the Soil Conservation Service recommends

parallel terraces for ease of farming and for production

the terraces rather than farming over them. There will be some land that will be too rough to parallel and there will be some odd areas on some fields that cannot be paralleled. Nevertheless, having an S.C.S. technician make a contour map of your field will result in a good terrace design that you can live with and still control erosion.




#### Dye Easter Eggs - Naturally

The first Easter trail Peter Cottontail hopped down was in Pennsylvania, and that first trip took place in 1728, long before commercial egg dyes became popular. Back then many Pennsylvania Dutch children used natural dyes from herbs and foods to dye the eggs which were then exchanged as tokens of good times to come.

This Easter your children might enjoy making their own dye (with your help) as well as coloring the eggs. They might even learn something about the many uses of foodstuffs along the way.

For softer, lighter shades, prepare the dye and strain it to remove the herbs, roots or foodstuff used to obtain the color. Then, dip and turn precooked eggs in the dye until you get a pretty shade. To create a deeper shade, simply make the dye and cook the eggs at the same time, allowing the eggs to simmer for as long as 20 minutes to reach the deepest hues.

Another method of dyeing eggs is to wrap raw eggs in bits of the dye-making plant



or food, and then tie them in cheesecloth. When the eggs are boiled the dye is transferred directly to the eggshell, leaving a unique mottled effect.

Adding vinegar or alum to the dyeing mixture will increase the strength of the dye.

Here are some "recipes" for various colors: For yellow dye use chamomile tea or dandelion blossoms, pour boiling water over the tea or blossoms, cover and let stand for half an hour. Strain the liquid and add a teaspoon of vinegar and the dye is ready.

Make gold dye by simmering two tablespoons of tumeric for 20 minutes. Add a teaspoon of vinegar before dyeing eggs. Since tumeric does not dissolve, the coloring will be slightly marbelized. A brass-brown shade results from onion skins, even red onion skins. Place the skins in a pan of water and simmer until the desired shade is obtained. Strain the liquid and add a teaspoon of vinegar and the dye is ready.

Lavender-blue eggs can be made with blueberries or grapes. Crush the berries or grapes by hand or in a blender. Add water and simmer for a few minutes. Strain the mixture and add a teaspoon of vinegar to complete the dye. Use a similar method to make robins-egg blue from cabbage.

Mint leaves will make pale. green Easter eggs. Pour boiling water over mint leaves, cover and let simmer for half an hour. Strain the mixture and add a teaspoon of vinegar to complete the dye.

Any of the dye-stuffs can be wrapped around or folded against a raw egg and enclosed in cheesecloth and then boiled to obtain unusual patterns of color on the egg.

You are only limited by your imagination! I hope you will try some of these.
