



content. At mid-afternoon one farmer's wheat tested 15.8 - just one point too wet to be accepted. Doubt was expressed that moisture would drop enough for cutting Sunday afternoon.

A heavy dew during the night Sunday prevented early wheat cutting, but with continued sunshine and wind, combines got started around noon.

It will be "busy times" from now on for combine crews, wheat haulers, elevator operators and wheat farmers until the golden grain is finally out of the fields. Combines are being fire up as soon as early moisture is burned off, and they continue to run on into the night until the grain is again to wet to be accepted by elevators.

Joe Decker of Knox Prairie Seeds, Inc., stated Monday they received their first wheat on Wednesday, June 6, when Roy Day Jr., who farms near Knox City. brought in some five or more loads. Additional wheat was received Sunday, and more

came in Monday.

Decker said the first wheat tested okay, but later loads contained more moisture. These smaller amounts were accepted, and the grain dried out at the elevator.

## Big Slice Of Sales Tax Paid

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday said individual Texas consumers pay about 38 percent of all sales tax collected in the state.

Bullock said while the legal impact of the sales tax clearly falls on retailers who make the actual tax payments to the state, the portion of sales tax paid by individual consumers has remained fairly constant

during the past four years. Bullock's comments were included in "Fiscal Notes," a monthly financial report published by his office.

The estimates were based on an analysis of combines sales tax collections. He reported that businesses pay about 58 percent of all sales taxes and nearly 5 percent of the sales tax coming into state government is "exported" to consumers from other

If God is God, His rightful place is at the very center of our existence. This rejection of God as God is behind all moral and spiritual permissiveness. When God is no longer honored as God, evil and moral degregation ceases to

be evil and sin. It is imperative that Dads teach and live their lives in such a way that their children admire and desire a life style that is in accordance with the Suppreme Authority, God. Dads, it is possible to impart to your children through God's Word, the Bible and your teaching a wisdom that

will mature your children and moral absolutes, if obeyed, that will result in a good and satisfying life.

Dads teach your children to believe in God. Teach them to work, the Bible says, "If you don't work you don't eat." Teach them patience and persistence. Teach them to be decisive and how to discipline their lives. Teach them to cooperate, the ability to work with others. Instill in them a respect for authority at home, school, law and God.






