## ALL MEN CREATED EQUAL

What was there for Jesus to add? It was a thought more splendid than all which had gone before and it has altered the current of history. He invited frail bewildered humanity to stand upright and look at God face to face! He called upon men to throw away fear, disregard the limitations of their morality, and

claim the Lord of Creation as Father. It is the basis of all revolt, all democracy. For if God is the Father of all men, then all are his children and hence the commonest is equally as precious as the king No wonder the authorities trembled. They were not fools; they recognized the implications of the teaching. Either . sus' life or their power must go. No wonder that succeeding generations of authorities have embroidered his Idea and corrupted it, to that the simplest faith in the world has become a complex thing of form and ritual, of enforced

observances and "thou shall nots." It was too dangerous a Power to be allowed to wander the world, unleashed and uncontrolled.

This then was what Jesus wished to send to all creation, through the instrumentality of his eleven men. What were his methods of training? How did he meet prospective believers? How did he deal with objections? By what sort of strategy did he interest and persuade?

He was making the journey back from Jerusalem after his spectacular triumph in cleansing the Temple, when he came to Jacob's Well, and being tired, sat down. His disciples had stopped behind at one of the villages to purchase food, so he was alone. The well furnished the water-supply for the neighboring city of the Samaritans, and after a little time a woman came out to it, carrying her pitcher on her shoulder. Between her people, the Samaritans, and his people, the Jews, there was a feud of centuries. To be touched by even the shadow of a Samaritan was defilement according to the strict code of the Pharisees; to speak to one was a crime. The woman made no concealment of her resentment at finding him there. Almost any remark from his lips would have kindled her anger. She would at least have turned away in scorn; she might have summoned her relatives and driven him off.

An impossible situation, you will admit. How could he meet it? How give his message to one who was forbidden by everything holy to listen? The incident is very revealing: there are times when any word is the wrong word; when only silence can prevail. Jesus knew well this precious secret. As the woman drew closer he made no move to indicate that he was conscious of her approach. His gaze was upon the ground. When he spoke it was quietly, musingly, as if to himself:

"If you knew who I am," he said, "you would not need to come out here for water. I would give you living water."

#### FUMIGATION

Too seldom do people fumigate their apartments, in these wintry days, when habitations are closed so many hours of the day and night.

Air in living rooms may become quickly polluted. A guest may happen in for an hour's chat. He may have a cough, not enough te proclaim him an invalid-yet he may be what we call a "flu carrier." He may inoculate receptive victims in any house he visits, and de it without in the least being conscious of the act.

One or two fumigations a week does no harm-it's well worth the effort.

Not so very long ago, sulphur candles were burned in rooms that had held contagious diseases. My opinion is, that such an agency is wholly ineffectual. I came against it once in a small pox epidemic. and it proved utterly worthless.

A fumigant must be volatile-capable of being dispersed in the air of the room; it must be effectual against germs. Raving these two properties, you have the ideal agent. I have tested out a solution of FORMALDEHYDE to my satisfaction. If handled carefully, it is safe in the hands of the family. Its pungent irritable odor warns against excessive dose. I use a 40% solution known as "Formalin."

Sprinkled about the linen closets particularly in the clotheshamper containing soiled linen for the laundry; a little here and there about the bedding-enough to "bite" the nose and eyes a little. Keep children away from the keen odor. Its use can be quickly learned: It will leave air pure and will destroy bacteria. I have "isolated" cases of small-pox and scarlet fever by having the air constantly formalized about the patient. Try it for fumigation; use it carefully, and depend on its effect.


