#### Only Veterans Will Be Allowed to Receive Valuable Letters

Adjusted service bonds for vet-erans of the World War in this county will be mailed from Dallas Monday, June 15, and will probably reach Crowell on the afternoon train of that day, Alva Spencer, postmaster, said this

Mailing of the bonus bonds will start at 12:01 a.m. Monday morn-ing of the fifteenth, he said. "Delivery to Addressee Only" will be marked on the envelopes carrying the bonds, and only the veterans themselves will be allowed to receive them.



### CELSIUS THERMOMETER IS NAMED FOR ITS INVENTOR

400 degree oven for 10 to 12 min-

The Celsius thermometer - after its inventor, Anders Celsius. Swedish scientist-is more commonly known as the centigrade. The Reaumur scale is one used to some extent in Europe.

Fahrenheit temperature readings may be converted into centi-grade by subtracting 32 degrees and multiplying by five-ninths. thus, states a writer in the Cleve-land Plain Dealer, three degrees below zero. Fabranheit is 19 40 below zero, Fahrenheit, is 19 4-9 below zero on the centigrade scale. Centigrade becomes Fahrenheit by multiplying by nine-fifths and adding 32.

Reaumur readings may be converted into Fahrenheit by multiplying by nine-fourths and adding or into centigrade by multiplying by five-fourths. To convert Fahrenheit into Reaumur subtract

32 and multiply by four-ninths. The Celsius zero is at the freezing point and its 100 degrees at boiling point of water (under 760 mm. barometic pressure). The Reaumur scale has its zero at the freezing point, and the boiling point at 80 degrees. Fahrenheit places his zero at the lowest tem-perature he could produce, achieving it by mixing snow and salt. On his scale the freezing point is at 32 and the boiling point at 212.




