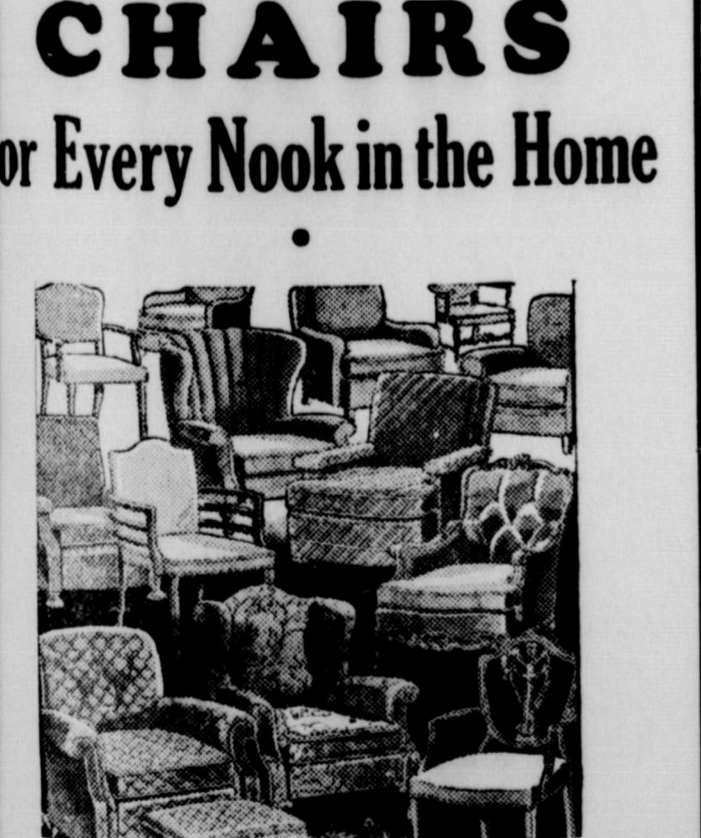

Sub-juniors will meet from 10 until 10:45 o'clock and the juniors will declaim from 10:45 until 11:30 o'clock. Senior declaimers will compete from 11:30 to 12 o'clock. The events for the junior boys are chinning, 50-yard dash, 100-yard dash, 440-yard relay, running broad jump and running high jump. Field events for the senior division are running high jump, running broad jump, discus throw, javelin throw, and the 12-pound shot. Track events scheduled are, 120-yard high hurdle, 100-yard dash, 880-yard run, 220-yard low hurdles, 440-yard dash, 220-yard dash, one-mile run and one-mile relay. No school will be allowed to enter more than three contestants in any one event, except the relay and only one relay team may be entered by a school. No contestants may enter more than five events and not more than five altogether, including field events. No contestant may enter more than one of the following events: 440-yard dash, 880-yard run, and the mile run. The final scoring of the game was made when Eddy completed Rasberry's pass for the extra point. The final frame was played on fairly even terms with neither team threatening to tally. Charles Branch performed the larger portion of the ball carrying for the rookies from the quarter-back position and gained practically all of the yardage for his team blocking and on occasions flashed good form in carrying the ball. His performance in the left half-back position was pleasing to local fans. Ed Gafford and Leroy Gibson took the burden of blocking in the backfield from their fullback and halfback positions. These two boys were instrumental in paving the way for many of Branch's gallops. Charlie Clark and Reid Thompson were the wingmen for the rookies and did some nice work in these positions. Clark bobbed through the line on many plays to drop opposing backs. The tackle positions were capably handled by Whitley Mitchell and Jack Bailey. These two lads were in the thick of every play and their offensive play contributed directly to two of the rookie scores. Frank Dunn and Murphy Sollis turned in performances that made fans wonder just what they could do next fall after they have added a few pounds to their already tough bodies. Goodyear Tire Demonstration to Be Held at Vernon

An unusual treat is in store tomorrow for local residents who are interested in highway safety, when they will have an opportunity to witness just how a tire reacts when it blows out. The demonstration will occur during a safety show sponsored by Crowell Service Station and Goodyear, which will take place at 1 p. m. Friday at Vernon on Texas Street. During the course of the show, to which city officials and others interested in reduction of highway accidents have been invited, a tire equipped with a regular tube will be blown out by use of dynamite. This demonstration will be made at slow speed, in order that spectators may see for themselves just what happens to a tire when it suddenly loses all its air. Another part of the safety show will feature the blowout of a tire at high speed, but on this occasion the tire will be equipped with a Goodyear Life-Guard, a new safety achievement which turns a tire failure into a slow leak. The Life-Guard, which takes the place of the conventional tube, has been hailed by police and fire officials, and heads of safety organizations throughout the U. S. as one of the most remarkable contributions to highway safety in recent years. In reality, the Life-Guard consists of an inner tire inside an outer tube, both being joined at the base. Air passes from the inner tire (which is built up of fabric plies) to the outer tube through a single tiny vent. When a tire failure occurs, air escapes from the outer tube instantly, but can escape from the inner tire only through the single tiny vent. This means that in event of failure, the tire drops down to ride on the inner tire, allowing the driver to bring the car to a safe stop.
