Daily Times Editorial Discusses Moffett Amendment for Limiting Representatives

An amendment to the Texas State Constitution to be voted on in the general election in November, written by George Moffett of Chillicothe, has recently been endorsed by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. The following editorial published by the Daily Times at Wichita Falls is informative as well as argumentative in its treatment of the amendment:

THE MOFFETT AMENDMENT
One of the amendments to be voted on by the people of Texas in November is the so-called Moffett amendment to limit the number of representatives in the state legislature from any one county to seven.

Foard Delegates Are Asked to Attend Wichita Meet

Farmers of Foard County are urged to attend and participate in the district-wide Farmers' meeting to be held at Wichita Falls on September 11 and 12. This meeting is one of 12 to be held in Texas during the latter part of August and through September, under the auspices of the Texas Agricultural Association and through the co-operation of the A. & M. College Extension Service.

Purpose of the meetings is to further acquaint farmers and their wives with the national agricultural program, to discuss the importance of stronger farm organization and legislation affecting agriculture and to sell more thoroughly, business and professional men on the value of an adequate agricultural program to business as well as to farmers.

A truck belonging to Clint White of Crowell and a load of household furniture belonging to Clyde King were consumed by fire Saturday morning about ten miles west of Paducah on the Paducah-Matador highway.

Value of Home-Raised Vegetables in Foard Amounted to \$4,806.00 in 1934

One hundred and eighty-three farms and ranches in Foard County valued their vegetable products raised in 1934, exclusive of Irish and sweet potatoes at \$4,806, according to the latest report of the Department of Commerce giving the 1935 farm census.

For the same year only one farm in the county reported having raised cabbages for commercial purposes. This farm reported five acres planted in cabbages which were being raised for sale. Five farms reported ten acres of land devoted to the production of watermelons for sale. These were the only two crops on which census figures were available which were produced in this county. Only two farms reported five acres devoted to vegetables other than Irish or sweet potatoes, beans, corn and tomatoes for commercial purposes.

(Continued from Page One) accordance with the 1930 census Harris County would have nine representatives and Dallas County eight.

In the first place geography and economic groups should have representation as well as population. Harris County having 1,654 square miles and having more or less common economic problems now has five representatives and will get many more if the present method is followed.

George Moffett of Chillicothe, representative from the 114th district, is author of the resolution submitting the amendment. It is endorsed by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

It does seem like it ought to be enough for the voters in Harris or Dallas or Bexar or Tarrant county to vote for seven representatives while the voter in Archer or Baylor or any other West Texas county votes for only one.

There are 3,075 counties in the forty-eight states. So far only three of these have failed to ask for federal aid or federal relief funds.

LOCALS DRUB QUANAH NINE HERE SUNDAY

Schedule for Cotton Belt Ends With Game Sunday

To wind up the official schedule of the Cotton Belt baseball league Sunday Crowell, on their own diamond, trounced the Quanah nine decisively 8 to 1 in what was probably Crowell's best performance of the year.

Pounding the pellet steadily for the full game and playing near 100 per cent perfect defensive baseball, Manager Hollingsworth's lads emerged victorious for the league's final.

Jack Rogers, little Crowell right-hander, drew the pitching assignment, turned in his best performance of the season allowing only 7 singles scattered through 7 innings. In no inning were the visitors able to get to Rogers for more than one hit.

One Bad Inning To start off with a bang, the Foard County nine retired the side after allowing the invaders a walk and a single and jumped on the S. Edmondson, starting hurler for Quanah, for three scores on four hits to take the lead and never relinquished it.

Split Pair The game Sunday evened the series with Quanah, the Harde- man County nine drubbing Crowell a week previous 7 to 4. The play-off between the four leading teams is scheduled to start Sunday.

Quanah managed to eke out one tally on one single for their only score of the afternoon. After the first inning, in which he faced five batters, Rogers retired the sides after facing not more than four men each inning.

Home Run L. Duckworth pounded out a four-bagger in the third inning for another score to bring the locals' total to four. Two other singles in that inning failed to produce runs.

There was no more scoring until the sixth inning. Green, first man up, reached first on a Quanah bobble to start the enemy's undoing. Singles by E. Duckworth, Ashford and L. Duckworth, accompanied by two ground outs by Graves and Norman, drove the three tallies across the plate.

A walk, a sacrifice fly and an error allowed Mints to score Crowell's final run in the seventh inning without a hit.

Individual honors, both defensive and offensive, went to "Big" Duckworth in centerfield. To star defensively he made a perfect peg from center to home to cut down an over-ambitious Quanah base runner by feet. In the bombarding department he was credited with a home run, a triple and a single to capture unquestionably the batting honors. He was the only player on either squad to garner as many as three safeties and was the only man to be credited with extra base hits.

To mar an otherwise perfect day Rogers dropped a pop fly right into his hands to make the only bobble by the local squad. H. Price made the two official errors for the visiting players.

Low Interest Rates
Interest rates of 5 1/2 per cent are charged for the loans. Loans will not be made to the farmers unless it is impossible for them to obtain loans any where else, Mr. Hogan said. They must not be in any other government loan agency to qualify for the loans.

A first lien on the next year's wheat crop must also be given before loans will be made. All other mortgages and liens must be waived in favor of the mortgage held by the Farm Credit Administration. Payment of the loans will be due August 31, 1937, the supervisor said.

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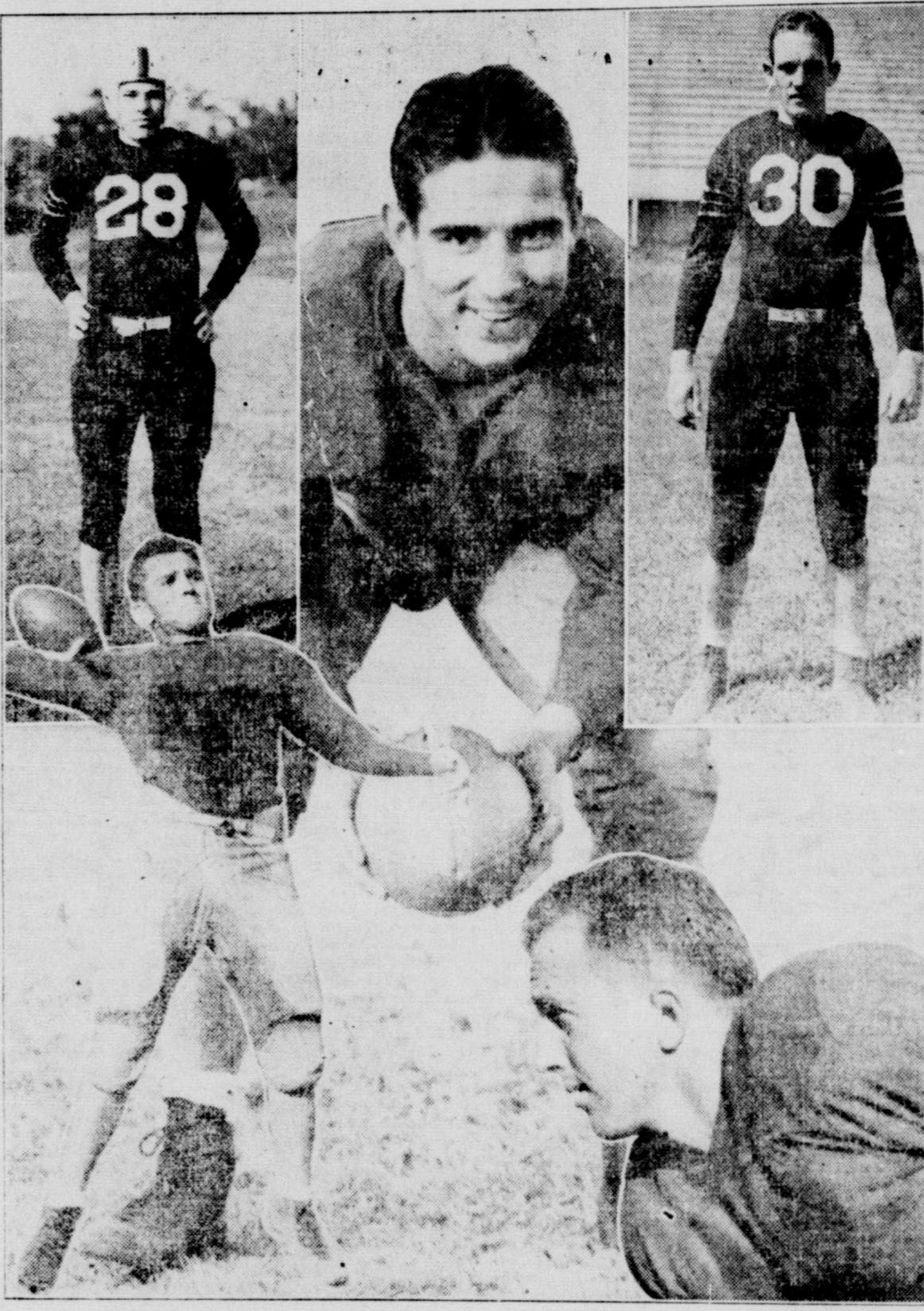

'Trench Mouth' Can Be Serious Disease if Not Treated Early

Austin. - "Trench Mouth," known scientifically as "Vincent infection" of the mouth, is a general disease and highly infectious. It became so common during the World War and incapacitated many soldiers as to have earned the name "Trench Mouth."

"This disease is transmitted in the same manner as a cold, is, by direct contact person to person who have the disease," says Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer.

While 'trench mouth' may occur as a mild infection, it can, often does, develop into a serious condition. Neglect of the hygiene of the mouth and teeth makes the mucous membranes of the gums and throat a favorite breeding ground for the organisms causing this disease.

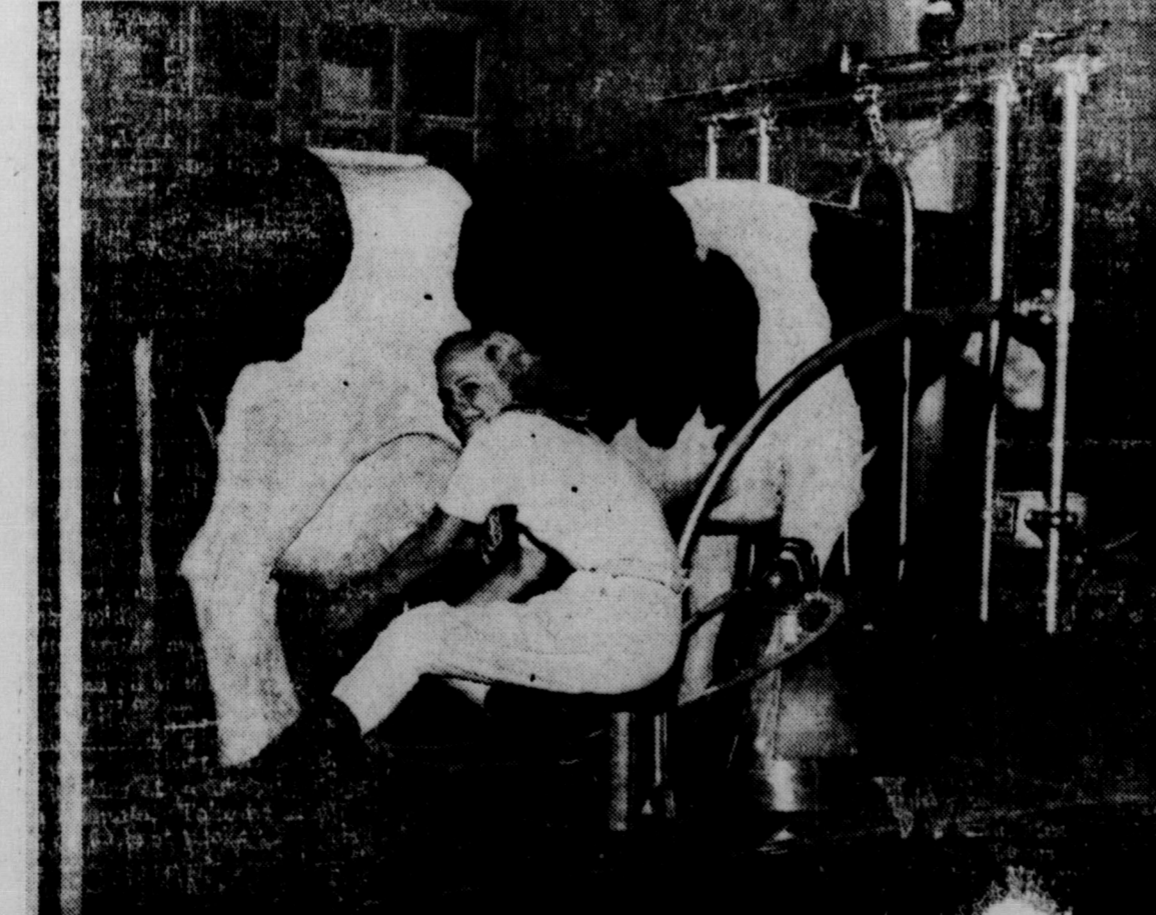


Rowland C. Sheldon, who was the moving spirit behind the formation of the newly-organized National Crime Prevention Institute, with headquarters in New York.

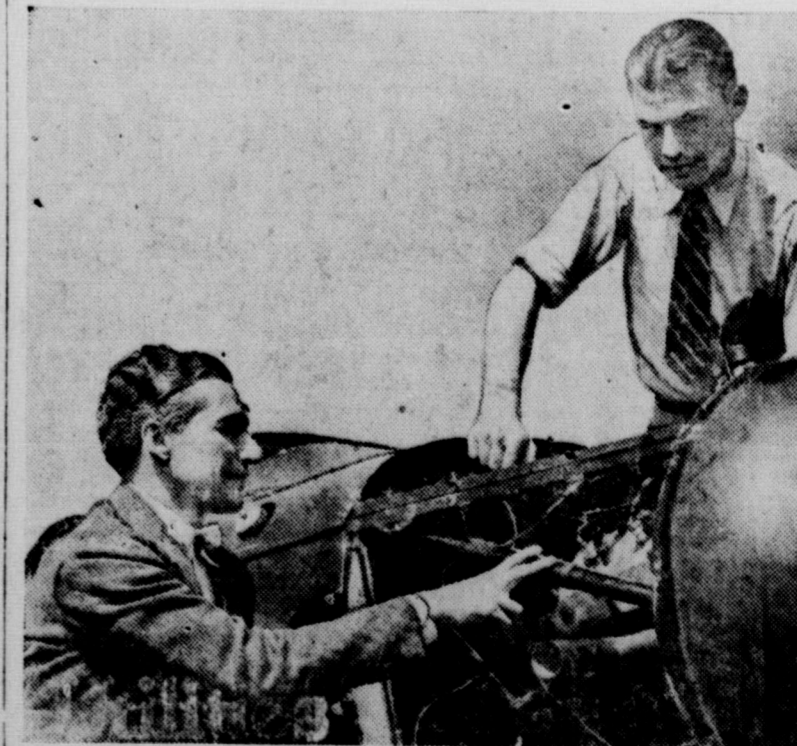
