## BRIDGE OVER BEAVER CREEK NOW COMPLETE

### Pouring Concrete for Other Bridges on New Strip

Having completed the bridge over Beaver Creek on the strip of highway from Crowell to the Knox county line, the crews of government laborers each now pouring concrete for other bridges on the more than eleven-mile-long strip of road. Completion of the work is expected to take place shortly after the end of the year, according to highway authorities. However, the strip of road will be open to traffic until the entire strip is completed. Work on the road was scattered over the entire strip so that none of it will be passed for cars until after the first of the year. Approximately 25 WPA laborers were working on each of the bridges on the highway. The recent completion of the bridge spanning Beaver Creek ends their biggest bridge on the road. Practically all the grading has been completed.

## C. E. HUTCHISON, FORMERLY OF CROWELL, DIES

### Death Comes Shortly After Crash With Locomotive

C. E. Hutchison of Covina, Cal., former resident of Crowell and Foard County, was killed instantly Thursday afternoon of last week about 2 o'clock as the car which he was driving crashed into a locomotive at a blind crossing at San Dimas, Calif. News of the death of their relative reached Russell and A. Y. Beverly, brothers-in-law of Mr. Hutchison, Thursday afternoon as they attended the funeral services for Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Bell, Mr. and Mrs. Russell Beverly left for California Thursday night to attend Mr. Hutchison's funeral. Funeral services were held at Covina Monday afternoon and burial was made in the Covina cemetery where his father, J. R. Hutchison, and brother, Ode Hutchison, were buried. Mr. Hutchison came to Crowell from Quannah with his father and family in early manhood and resided here for many years. During that time his employment was a varied and included bookkeeping and other clerical work. He was one of the first rural route carriers out of Crowell when the mail was carried with a horse and buggy. On December 18, 1907, Mr. Hutchison and Miss Mattie Beverly were married at the home of her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Joe W. Beverly. In 1911 they moved to Covina, Calif., where they resided (Continued on Page Four)

## FEDERAL COURT GIVES MILLER 10 YEARS, FINE

### Is Under Indictment in Hopkins County for \$10,000 Robbery

Que R. Miller, former sheriff of Foard County, was convicted on a counterfeiting charge by a federal court at Louisville, Ky., and given a ten-year sentence in prison. He was also fined \$300. Miller was found guilty on a charge of passing spurious \$20 federal reserve notes in Kentucky last May. His prison term is to be served in a federal penitentiary at Atlanta, Ga. The notes passed by the ex-sheriff amounted to \$1,100. He made a lengthy plea for mercy, claiming he had "not had my hand on a counterfeit, not for four years." The bills were passed on the day before the Kentucky derby and derby night. Several witnesses identified him as the passer. Other witnesses testified Miller was in New York at the time. Miller is under indictment in Hopkins County, Ky., in connection with a \$10,000 holdup of a wholesale liquor store.

## Burglars Break Into Elevator and Grocery Store Tuesday Night

Two burglaries occurred in Crowell Tuesday night, one at the T. P. Duncan & Son elevator and the other at Old's Grocery. The burglaries were not discovered until Wednesday morning. The robbers broke into the elevator through a window, prized the knob off the safe combination, and opened the safe door. They took about \$16. Approximately \$20 and a pistol were taken from the Old's Grocery safe after prizing open the front door and breaking the combination. Local county and city officer are investigating the crimes. The same elevator was burglarized Monday night, November 5.

## Seismograph Crew Making Survey of County; 13 in Gang

A geological survey of formations is now being taken in the western part of Foard County by a Seismograph crew here from the Seismograph Service Corporation of Tulsa, Okla. The crew of about 15 scientists arrived last week to begin the formation survey here in this section. The tests were started in the southwest part of the county and the geologists are working northward. The extent of the work to be done here is as yet indefinite.

## CHRISTMAS PLANS LAUNCHED BY FARMERS AND MERCHANTS' ASSOCIATION IN MEETING MONDAY; PRESIDENT NAMES COMMITTEES

### Foundation for New Grammar School Started Friday as Order Is Given By Works Progress Administration

Work on the foundation of a new grammar school building was begun Friday of last week as one of two shifts of 25 Works Progress Administration laborers each started digging ditches for the ground work. A tool house has already been constructed and is equipped so that work may continue even during bad weather. The new building is to be east of the high school building, the tennis courts having been moved nearer the football stadium. The present project just began includes laying the foundation for the building, installing the plumbing and building the walls up as high as the windows. The first project in connection with obtaining the new building was the razing of the old grammar school. The first project is nearing completion as two crews with a total of 50 government laborers are now tearing down the walls of the first floor. All above the first floor has already been razed. Many of the employees are working in salvaging the materials of the old building for use in the new one. To obtain the approval of a third project which will carry the new building to near-completion is under way. Orders to start work on the second project were given last week by WPA authorities at headquarters in Wichita Falls. L. I. Saunders is supervisor of the building of the new school for the Crowell Independent School District.

## POUR CONCRETE FOR BRIDGE ON TEXACO ROAD

Concrete for a bridge over Good Creek on the road from the Crowell-Paducah highway to the Texas Company Gasoline plant in the southwest part of Foard County is now being poured. The work on the project, under the Works Progress Administration, was begun during the last week of September. The low-water bridge will be 182 feet long, the center of which will be in the creek bed. Most of the grading has already been completed, the bridge rip-rapped, approaches cut down, and the two crews of 15 WPA laborers are now employed in pouring concrete. The completion of the bridge is estimated at about three months after the project was started. Sponsoring the project are the county and county commissioners J. M. Marr and A. W. Barker. The work lies in both precincts three and four. Trucks, men and cement are being furnished by the federal building agency. The county is furnishing steel, gravel and sand. The county is also providing for a team which is being used in the grading work. Dwight Campbell is supervising the project for the Works Progress Administration. The employees work five days a week, the two shifts alternating.

## Blanks for Social Security Are to Be Returned Saturday

Forms SS-4, applications for employers to fill out in connection with the United States Social Security Act, have been mailed out to approximately 80 employers in Foard County and the blanks are to be returned to the post office not later than Saturday, November 21, according to Alva Spencer, postmaster. The forms are being distributed to the employers through the post office department. Forms SS-5 will be sent out to employees Tuesday, November 24, and they are to be returned to the post office not later than Saturday, December 5. The purpose of the blanks for both employers and employees is to provide the social security board with information so they may be given an identification number. Employers who have not obtained forms are urged to do so at the post office as soon as possible by the social security department. Those who have blanks are also asked to turn them in as soon as possible. All employers who have not obtained a blank are requested to call at the post office for them as they must be returned not later than Saturday, November 21.

## APPLICATIONS FOR PAYMENT BEING SIGNED

### Work Now Practically Complete, Farm Agent Says

Practically all the applications in Foard County for payment for compliance with the federal government's new farm program have been signed, according to John Nagy, agricultural agent. All those who have not signed the applications are requested to do so as soon as possible, he said. Foard County was among the first three counties in the state to present the applications for payment to the farmers co-operating in the farm plan. Archer County was first, Baylor County second and Foard County third in the state to get their crop land measurements complete and turned into the home office of the extension service in Texas A. & M. at College Station. As a result of the rapid work of the local county farm agent and his staff the farmers of Foard County will probably be among the first in the state to receive checks for compliance with the Soil Conservation program.

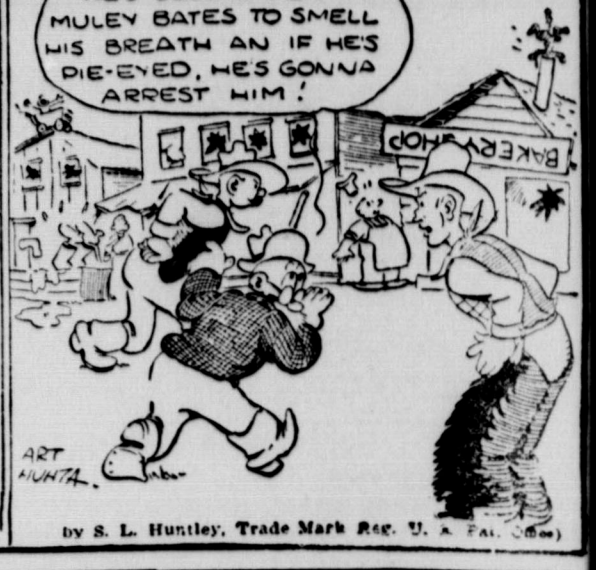
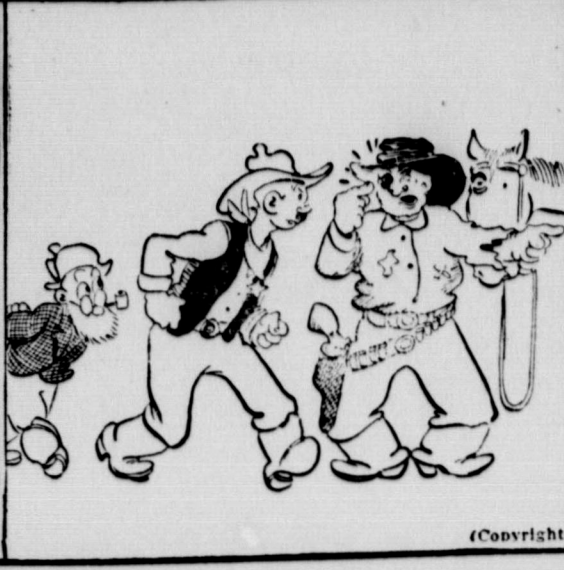
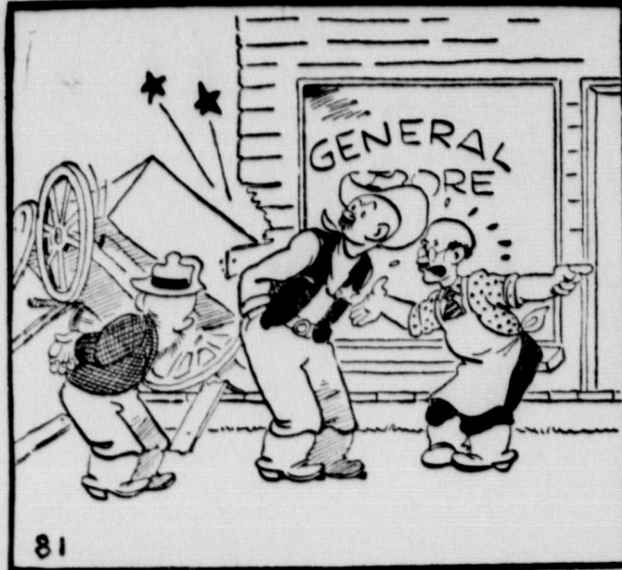

Two Minute Sermon (By Thomas Hastwell) The Christ of the Andes: On one of the highest points of the Andes mountains, between the border of Chile and Argentina, stands a bronze statue of the Christ, erected in 1902 to commemorate the peaceful settlement of a boundary dispute between these two countries. The statue, more than twice life size, stands on a pedestal rough hewn from the natural rock near the summit of Cumbre pass at an altitude of 12,796 feet. The statue was cast from bronze obtained from melted cannon. High up among the surrounding peaks the statue stands above everything else about it. It is a constant reminder to travelers over the pass that these two nations have joined hands in friendship and peace. The rays of the rising sun fall first on the statue of the Christ and the last rays of the setting sun bathe it in its fading glory. What a fitting and a striking lesson to the nations of that continent and to the world—Christ, the emblem of peace and good will, exalted in the light of this continent. What a suggestion to men everywhere that Christ should be exalted in their lives and occupy the first and highest place even as he does on high Cumbre pass among the lofty Andes.
