



Soil Conservation News of District

Lower Pease River Soil Conserva-tion District, Lower Pease River District Board: W. C. How-ard, Grady Halbert, O. T. Holmes, O. H. Brandon, H. L.

Farmers of the Lower Pease River Soil Conservation District are planning to plant many acres of Austrian winterpeas and vetch his fall for winter cover crops. These legumes can also provide winter grazing and serve as a green manure crop.

Vetch and peas can be sown by a common grain drill or plant-ed in rows. About 20 pounds of vetch should be sown per acre r about 6 pounds when it is planted in rows. When drilling Austrian winterpeas, about thirty rounds per acre should be used or 10 pounds when they are planted in rows.

Both vetch and Austrian winterpeas should be inoculated before planting because inoculated produce a more vigorous plant which is more beneficial to the soil than a plant produced by non-inoculated seed.


