Use as filling for a 9-inch pie. For cherry pie use 4 cups fresh cher-ries, 3½ tablespoons quick cookng tapioca, 1 cup sugar. Start baking berry pies in hot oven,  $(450 \circ F)$  for 10 to 15 minutes, or until crust is slightly brown then reduce heat to moderate (8501/2F) and finish the baking, about 1/2 hour longer.

If, when you are "doing up" silk dresses, blouses or slips, you will use a little gum arabic in the last rinsing bath, the "body" or sizing will be restored and they will look and feel like new. Dis-solve a teaspoon of the gum arabic in a little hot water and strain into sufficient water to thoroughly saturate the article. Wring and roll in a bath towel and allow to stand for about two hours and iron on wrong side.

Try this with carrots to be used for salads: Drop them into boiling water for a few minutes, and the skins will come off easily.
