

CROWELL CAGE TEAM DEFEATS PADUCAH FIVE

Fast-SteppingWildcats Smother Dragons by **Score of 56-28**

The Crowell Wildcats swamped the Paducah Dragons 56 to 28 in their practice tilt played here in the Crowell gymnasium Tuesday

With the opening whistle, the Wildcats launched a fast, dazzling offense that kept the invaders in a whirl throughout the game. Crowell's effective, quick-forming defense, aided by Paducah's fast, uncertain passing, accounted for the Dragons' comparatively low score. The Dragons vainly tried to keep pace with the fast-stepping Wildcats.

The Crowell regulars ran amuck over the Dragons for three quarters and then turned the game over to the second stringers, who continued the fast brand of basketball displayed by their first string teammates. The second string teammates. The second stringers played the Dragon quin-tet on a little better than even terms during the time they were in the scrap, scoring 12 points to their opponents' 11 during that

The Crowell cagers grabbed the lead early in the game and in-cressed it consistently during the first three periods. Wildcat sharpshooters rang up sixteen points and allowed the Dragons five during the first period and the half time score was 30 to 12 in favor of the Crowell lads. Continuing in the third period, the Wildcats boosted their lead to 44 to 17 and then retired to give their squad mates a chance to finish the kill, which they did splendidly.

The game was fast and com-paratively rough with sixteen peronal fouls being committed. Nine of these fouls were called on the Crowell team and the remaining seven against Paducah, Merrill, Paducah guard, was the only player to foul out of the game and he retired late in the last quarter. 

According to Mr. Bobbitt, the program contemplates the improvement of 905.7 miles of the major arterial highways of Texas on the Federal Aid System. also provides for the construction of pavement on 640.5 miles of highways. In commenting on the proposed

reduction and its effect on Texas nighway development Mr. bitt said: "If the President's proposal is adopted it will mean that no funds will be available during 1939 for this program. The phenomenal progress of peanuts in recent years from an item connected with circuses to an important industrial product is a noteworthy event. Peanut oil is responsible for this upward trend of the goober clan, since the sumption of this oil in the United States was reported as being ten times as great in 1936 as in 1935. In Texas over 99,120.000 pounds were harvested in 1936, with a value of \$3,073,000.

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


