



The government of Brazil aban doned recently its 31-year-old pol-icy of limiting the export of coffee to world consumption for the purpose of maintaining a uniform price, and will adopt instead, the dog eat dog method of unrestrained competition with coffee producers of other countries. Production is not only to be unlimited but the export tax of \$2.70 per 132 pound bag was reduced 75 per cent. Under the export limitation plan the money received from this export tax was used to purhase the unexported surplus, which was destroyed.

The plan worked with a reasonable degree of success until growers, taking advantage of the assured price, produced larger and larger crops of coffee. This threw such a burden upon the government in he matter of purchasing and destroying the constantly growing surplus that dissatisfaction arose and the demand was made that the righteousness, plan be abandoned.

### Cash Benefits to Be Paid Qualified

Unemployed Jan. 1

Austin, Dec. 3.—Cash benefits to the qualified unemployed will become payable on January 1 from a reserve fund built up by Texas employers since the estab-lishment of the Texas Unemploy-

aiding its unemployed. Soon after the Act was signed, the Unemployment Commission was created. A reserve "Jobless Fund" has been built up and is now on deposit in Washington. This fund will be drawn on after January 1 for cash payments to the unemploy-

The Texas State Employment Service, a division of the Commission, has offices throughout the state which will handle the problems of the employee. Here he may come, when out of work, his record will be gone over, and he mediately, after a "waiting period" of not less than two weeks, he will be paid benefits based upon his work record for the pre-

vious nine quarters.
"Benefits" or cash payments,
will be paid for not more than sixteen weeks in any calendar year to the unemployed man whose previous work record will qualify him. The maximum benefits per week is \$15, the minimum, \$5 or three-fourths of his weekly sal-

ary, whichever is the lesser.
