Weldon P. Herman, secretary of the County Agricultural Con-servation Committee, makes the following explanation of how these payments are made.

Conservation Payments

Conservation Payments The conservation payment is 2 cents a pound on cotton, 17 cents a bushel on wheat, and tentative-ly 93c an acre, adjusted up or down according to the farm's pro-ductivity index, on general crops. The rates on cotton and wheat apply to the normal yield of the farm's cotton or wheat allotment, however the case may be. It is figured by multiplying the pay-ment rate, times the normal yield established for the farm, times the acreage allotment. For example, if a farmer has a
