MOST DAMAGING OF YEAR HERE

House Owned by E. H. Scales Gutted by Flames

Crowell suffered its most damaging fire of the year when the house owned by Ebb Scales and occupied by Joe Eddy one block west of the Crowell Methodist Church was gutted by fire Monday night shortly after 10 o'clock.

The flames were discovered by Mr. Scales as he returned to his home nearby but praciteally all of the interior of the house and its contents were in flames before the fire department arrived. The cause of the fire is unknown.

According to the report of Fire Marshal W. O. McDaniel, the house was insured for \$750 and the furniture for \$750. The fire marshal estimated that about \$500 in damage was done to the iouse and reported that the furniture was a complete loss.




