'Talking Sound' Gives Voice to Saw

sound can be transmitted through vocal chords by use of "talking sound," which he has invented. Two "buzzers," the size of head-set receivers, are held on both sides of the neck of Mrs. Wright. As Mr. Wright saws through the board, the sound is picked up by a microphone and vibrates the vocal chords in his wife's throat. In this demonstration the tone was provided by the sawing, and Mrs. Wright formed the words without uttering them. The invention is based on the two fundamentals of speech, the tone created by the vocal chords and the movements of teeth, tongue and lips.
