## Population of Businesses in County Up 11%

This week, A. J. Hemphill, district manager of the Fort Worth office of Dun & Bradstreet Inc., announced statement requests were mailed to 51 businesses in Foard County. He said figures obtained from a physical count of the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book for January, 1963, totaled 51 manufacturers, wholesalers, and retailers in this area as compared with 46 in January, 1962—an increase of 11 per cent for the period.

During the past year, Hemphill added 40 changes were made in the listings of Foard County businesses, including 11 names added, 11 names deleted, and 18 changes in the ratings of continuing businesses. The changes occurring in Foard County are about even with the rest of the country where a change of business significance is counted about every five seconds.

In the breakdown of figures announced by Dun & Bradstreet, Thalia showed a 67 per cent increase by adding two new businesses to bring a total of five business in that town. Crowell showed a 7 per cent increase by adding three new businesses to its total of 43 last year.

## Deposits at End of 1962 Total \$3,141,598.28

Deposits in the Crowell State Bank at the end of business on December 28 were \$3,089,712.25, after the National Comptroller of Currency and the State Banking Commission issued a call for the condition of banks at the close of business on that date.

Deposits at the local bank on December 31 were \$3,141,598.28, a \$51,886.03 increase over the report three days earlier.

Bank deposits were down \$418,748.10 from the report of \$3,590,346.38 made on December 31, 1961. Deposits on Sept. 28, 1962, were \$3,402,823.39.

## County Gins Total of 528 Bales During Past Week

The four gins operating in Foard County turned out a total of 528 bales of cotton last week to bring the season's total up to 4,384 bales. A total of 3,856 were ginned up to last week.

With continuing favorable weather, cotton harvest should be concluded in a short time.

## V. F. W. National Official Visits in Crowell Last Week

Ezra H. (Babe) Meeks of Abilene, national post activities director of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States, spent from Thursday until Sunday in Crowell to assist the local V. F. W. post in stimulating its community service, youth activities, membership and other programs and to tell "The V. F. W. Story" to residents of this area.

Meeks is an appointee of Commander-in-Chief Byron Gentry of Pasadena, Calif., and operates out of national V. F. W. headquarters in Kansas City, Mo.

He has traveled thousands of miles spreading the "gospel" of the 63-year-old, 1,800,000-strong organization of veterans of overseas war-time service, at the same time assisting local, district and state officers of this "Good Outfit," as it is familiarly known, to reactivate weak posts, reactivate dormant posts and build heightened participation in VFW's varied activities on behalf of the veteran, the veteran's dependents, and the nation.

His particular interest, Meeks said, lies in VFW sponsorship of an increasingly larger number of civic projects. Last year, he said, the Veterans of Foreign Wars initiated and carried out some 600,000 community service works in more than 10,000 different localities across the nation. They ran the entire gamut of life in free America. At the same time, he said, VFW fostered no less than 280,000 well-organized and directed youth activities projects providing boys and girls with wholesome, constructive outlets for their leisure time.

"Through our community service and youth activities projects," said Meeks, "we give true emphasis to our motto, 'We honor the dead by helping the living,' at the same time that we vividly prove the truth that we of the Veterans of Foreign Wars are not a selfish group, one concerned with the welfare of the veteran alone, but, rather, men consecrated to doing good for all our fellow-citizens."

He said the VFW's ownership and maintenance of its national home for the widows and orphans of its members, at Eaton Rapids, Mich., further evidences the organization's humanitarian ideals. VFW is the only veteran organization owning and operating such a home, Meeks said.

Humble Oil & Refining Co., has finished its No. 14 John A. Marr in Foard County's Raspberry (6100 Caddo) Field, 10 miles northwest of Crowell, section 24, block A, SPRR survey.

During a 24-hour test, the well pumped 59.96 barrels of 40.4 gravity crude, plus 25 per cent water, from perforations at 5969-70 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 300-1. Pay was acidized with 1,000 gallons.

The two and 7/8 inch production string was run to 6135 1/2 feet after hole was bottomed at 6138 feet.

### Five Arrested in Farm Break-Ins in Two-County Area

Cooperation between Wilbarger and Foard County sheriffs' departments led to the arrest last Thursday of five youths in connection with at least three rural burglaries and several other thefts in the two counties.

Charged with burglary in Wilbarger County are three brothers who reside in Thalia, a youth from Margaret and a Vernon resident. Two of the Thalia residents are juveniles, aged 14 and 16.

District Attorney Curtis Renfro said no charges have yet been filed in Foard County. He said each of the five has signed a statement admitting the burglaries and other thefts.

The quintet was arrested Thursday afternoon after Wilbarger County officers compared notes with Foard officials on recent rural burglaries in the counties.

Wilbarger Deputies Wayne Hendrix and Laudy Lambert, along with Foard Deputy L. D. Cates, first questioned the Vernon man. Officers said he admitted the burglaries and implicated the four Foard County youths.

The investigators then apprehended the four and after questioning they also admitted the break-ins, and signed the statements.

Burglaries took place on a farm 2 1/2 miles southwest of South Lockett High School, a farm three miles southeast of Thalia, and a farm 1 1/2 miles east of Thalia.

Officers said they admitted taking gasoline, tools, batteries and various accessories from tractors, cotton pullers and cars in both counties, both in conjunction with the burglaries and in separate incidents.

Much of the loot was recovered by the deputies.

**Naked Force Gains Monopoly in Diplomacy**

Writing in the Oregon Voter, Ralph T. Moore observes: "It seems incredible but it's true, that the United Nations, now in session, was founded 17 years ago to 'practice tolerance and to live together with one another as good neighbors.' But, how little the actual progress has been made toward this noble end. Instead, the U. N. has served as an instrument to screen Russian aggression and to defeat the tolerance expressed in its charter. The same old nationalistic prejudices and

ambitions prevail with even greater strength than before. Nor is there any perceptible gain in the efficacy of the given word among the Communistic bloc who scorn it as a sign of weakness. It still remains a truism that you can't do business on any basis with those who will not honor their signatures nor act in accord with their binding agreements. If anything, it would appear that naked force has gained a monopoly in diplomacy and is now the only means to achieve world peace."

## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

Austin, Tex. — Governor-elect John Connally has picked seven men to fill key appointments in his administration. Oldest of the seven is Crawford Martin of Hillsboro, who will be Secretary of State. And he is only a year older than the 44-year-old future governor.

Youngest appointee, 27-year-old Larry Temple of Austin, will be an administrative assistant. Teamed with Temple are 32-year-old Bill Fowler of Dallas, 38-year-old Frank Miskell of Austin, and 34-year-old Scott P. Sayer of Fort Worth.

Howard Roe, 32-year-old Midland attorney, will be Connally's executive assistant.

Bill Cobb, 38, will be budget director. He's an Austinite.

Two of the appointees are carry-overs from the Daniel administration, to some degree. Martin served as state senator from Hillsboro for 14 years—through 1962. Cobb was chief examiner for the

### Flood Control board.

Jack Douthitt of Sterling City, Dale Leddy of San Angelo and L. T. Youngblood of Bronte were re-appointed to the Upper Colorado River Authority; J. W. Mullins of Coleman and Isaac S. Pate of Voss were named to the Central Colorado River Authority, and O. L. Cheaney of Santa Anna reappointed.

Mrs. James P. Hart of Austin (wife of the former chancellor of the University of Texas), W. R. Beaumier of Lufkin, and Vann M. Kennedy of Corpus Christi were named to the Texas State Historical Survey Committee.

**TURMAN SEEKS POST** — James A. Turman, who ran for lieutenant-governor last year and lost, wants to return to his favorite field—education.

The 35-year-old Speaker of the House quickly advanced in the field of education before he became a legislator eight years ago. He earned a doctorate in education, then became assistant professor of education and assistant to the president at Texas Woman's University.

He has asked the Texas Commission on Higher Education to consider him a candidate for its post of executive director.

**SCHOOL FUND STILL GROWING**—The Permanent School Fund that provided more than \$21,000,000 of non-tax money for use in public schools in 1962, now consists of investments totaling more than \$477,000,000.

Furthermore, it should continue to grow, since the current rate of return on corporate securities, treasury bonds and municipal bonds has increased from 3.38 per cent to 3.51 per cent.

In the past 25 years, the Fund has earned more than \$162,000,000 in interest through investments made by the State Board of Education.

**WEATHER WOES CUT PRODUCTION** — Weather played havoc with almost every major crop in the state in 1962 and caused crop production to hit its lowest point since 1957.

U. S. Department of Agriculture reports that the 1962 crop index fell nine per cent below the 1961 level to 127.0. All-time high of 145.0 was set in 1939, and the 1961 level was second highest.

Crops hardest hit were: wheat, down to 43,700,000 bushels or 49 per cent below 1961; citrus, down to about six per cent of 1961 production; sorghum, down 12 per cent; cotton, down 106,000 bales—to 4,680,000 bales.

Production of corn, peanuts, soybeans and rice was down. However, yield per acre was up over the previous year.

Weather's costly whims cut the total value of 1962 crops to \$1,400,000,000—or eight per cent below the 1961 value. Cotton lint and cottonseed accounted for 57 per cent of the total; sorghum grain, 14 per cent; and wheat, six per cent.

**RETURN OF DIGNITY** — Speaker-elect Byron Tunnell of Tyler said he's going to restore dignity to the House, where legislation frequently resembles a trading boom at the New York Stock Exchange.

He warned legislators that they can no longer have secretaries work at their desks, and relatives will not be allowed to sit with them, except on very special occasions.

**SCREW WORM ERADICATION SHORT**—The Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program—which succeeded in cutting screwworm cases by 75 to 90 per cent in less than a year—will be halted March 31, unless livestock producers raise another \$1,000,000 by that date.

Charlie Scruggs, president of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, made that announcement on behalf of SWAHRF's board of trustees.

The three-year eradication program, initiated last January, cost an estimated \$12,000,000. The federal government was to pay \$6,000,000, the livestock producers, \$3,000,000, and the State \$3,000,000.

But so far the farmers and ranchers have donated only \$2,000,000.

Scruggs said, "The plan was based on 100 per cent participation, and this has not been the case, although there have been commendable contributions in some counties."

**ECONOMIC HEALTH**—Texas bank deposits are continuing to set records almost everywhere.

A survey of major cities was made after the state banking com-

missioner and the U. S. comptroller ordered condition reports as of December 28.

The December 28 date caught many banks by surprise. They were anticipating the call date to be December 31.

Some bankers said the difference in dates prevented them from reporting even higher figures. Last day of the year usually is a high mark for bank deposits.

**TARGET FOR NEW A. G.** — Texas' new attorney general has pledged a positive campaign against juvenile delinquency as one of his major projects.

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr addressed an overflow crowd at his swearing-in ceremonies in the Courts Building.

He said that delinquency is neither normal nor universal among our juveniles. "On the contrary, a respect for the law is far more common among young people than is disrespect," Carr stated.

Carr also pledged to "continue vigorously" investigations begun by his predecessor, Will Wilson, into the East Texas slant-hole oil well scandal and the Billie Sol Estes case.

Although pledging no encroachment on local responsibility, Carr warned that in any instance where local officials "fail in their trust to this state," he will not hesitate to step in "to correct the situation within the boundaries of power and authority."

**TAX TAKE GROWS**—Receipts from sales of cigarette, liquor and wine stamp sales totaled \$8,414,358 during December, State Treasurer Jesse James reports.

Receipts totaled \$7,300,000 from cigarette stamp sales; \$1,000,000 from liquor stamp sales; and \$91,414 from wine stamp sales.
