Few Poll Taxes Paid The report showed that only 604 citizens of the county had paid their poll taxes Tuesday afternoon. There have been 1,861 poll taxes assessed for 1940 and this means that 1,257 voters should pay the fee during the next five days. A total of 1,257 voters cast their ballots in 1938.

Many Important Elections The above figure is expected to be exceeded in the 1940 elections as candidates for many important offices will be voted upon, which includes the presidential election.
