All schools in Foard County were classified for the year 1941-1942 at a recent meeting of the County Board of School Trustees under the eight and twelve-grade plan, according to County School Superintendent Leslie Thomas.

The 1941 wheat harvest in Foard County entered its last stage this week and accurate reports from the elevators Wednesday afternoon showed that only 259,644 bushels of new wheat had been delivered at that date.

Over 549.750 bushels of wheat had been delivered to the elevators at this time last year. s a decrease of 290,106 bushels mparing the crops of 1940 and 1941. Last year an average crop was harvested and it is ex-pected that the crop this year will be but a little more than half of last season's. A little more than 600,000 bushels of wheat were harvested in 1940.

According to figures released from the county agent's office, there were 51,000 acres of land planted in wheat this year, and two months ago wheat men were predicting an average of 20 bushels per acre which would have placed the county's yield at 1,-20,000 bushels. Now there are many fields in which the grain can not be harvested.

At the time the above predictions were made wheat prospects were as good or better than ever seen in Foard County before, but army worms, wind, hail and excessive rainfall have damaged the grain until the yield is very low and the grade of wheat is also greatly lowered. Wheat, on an average, has been testing be-tween 50 and 55 pounds per bush-



HE labor unions have made their demands upon the railways of the United States - and through the railways upon the PUBLIC. These demands are vastly larger in proportion than any they have ever made. The economical and efficient operation of the railways is vital to the nation's defense effort. Therefore, the Western Railways present to the public the following facts:

The labor unions representing engineers, firemen, conductors, brakemen and switchmen are demanding a 30 per cent increase in wages, amounting to 190 million dollars a yearalthough their present rates of pay are the highest in history.

The situation, then, is this: The total cost of complying with all the demands made would be approximately 900 million dollars a year!

The average weekly earnings of railway employees are now 15 per cent higher than in the peak year 1929, while the cost of living is 12 per cent less.

The demands of the railway labor unions are being made when the entire nation has just been asked to make a supreme effort for National Defense.

The railways cannot meet these demands without a great increase in the cost of transportation. They exceed by more than 700 million dollars the income that the railways had left after paying their annual expenses, taxes and charges in 1940.






