





Senator George Moffett, Chillicothe, who represents this district in the State Senate, left for Austin Sunday to attend the special session of the Legislature which convened on the 9th. He has informed The News that he thought and hoped that the session would be short, perhaps not over ten days, as there has been only one subject submitted by the Governor, and the latter has firmly declared that he will not submit additional subjects.

Senator Moffett was confident that the burden of the county road bonds, where the money has been spent on State highways, would continue to be assumed by the State as it has been for nearly ten years, and that there would be very little controversy over this particular point, for not to do so, would throw a very heavy burden of additional taxation upon county taxpayers, which they are not able to bear. He further stated that there possibly might be some extended discussion concerning the disposition of the surplus remaining from the one cent of the gasoline tax, after the county bonds had been taken care of, but even if there were, the whole matter ought to be disposed of in ten days, and the Legislature adjourn by that time, thus setting a record for dispatching business in a hurry.



Texas Boys in CCC Lead the Nation

In June there were 16,437 Tex-as boys in the Civilian Conservation Corps Camps—8,592 in Tex-as and the remainder in Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado and Wyoming. In that month these boys returned to their families over \$230,000 and the Government estimated they earned real wages in the amount of \$986,197.

Pennsylvania ranked next to Texas, having 13,006 boys in camps; Arkansas third with 10,-403 and Oklahoma fourth with 9.941.

With recent changes made in rules and regulations, boys are sent to camps every month, and in many instances, when camps are near, every week. Training in national defense work has been increased and all enrollees have greater opportunities to prepare themselves for employment in private industry than ever before. CCC men are given first consideration by employers for they are already trained in good work habits, are healthy and make willing employees.


