### Careless Handling of Firearms Caused Many Deaths in 1940

Austin .- A timely and urgent warning against the careless handling of firearms during the hunting season was issued this week Doctor Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"During the year 1940 a total of 179 deaths occurred in Texas as a result of firearm accidents, by far the majority of them due to hunting activities," said Doc-tor Cox. "A hunter's loaded gun when not carried on safety is a menace to himself and to every-

one within firing range. Doctor Cox pointed out that while hunting is one of the nation's most enjoyable outdoor sports, this deplorable toll of human lives goes on annually due almost entirely to carelessness. "Many men go hunting year after year without harm to themselves or their companions because they handle a gun cautiously and with good sense," he declared.

"There is little excuse for the brand of carelessness or clumsiness that kills. If each hunter will use precautions to go through the hunting season without accidental injury to himself or his hunting companion, the death toll in Texas from firearm accidents will be
