A WEEK of the WAR

Price Administrator Henderson issued a general price regulation placing rigid Government controls over retail and wholesale prices for the duration of the war.

Beginning May 11, manufacturer and wholesale prices may not exceed highest March 1942 levels for each individual seller. Beginning May 18, retail prices may not exceed highest levels charged by each seller during March.

The OPA announced appointment of 60 specialists to OPA offices throughout the country to serve as technical aides in handling problems arising from the sugar rationing program.

Agricultural commodities are excluded from the order. Various other items which do not conform with the price control act's definition of a "commodity" are exempt also.

President Roosevelt said the cost of living has advanced about 15 per cent since the autumn of 1939, and "we must now act to keep it from soaring another 80 per cent or 90 per cent during the next year or two."

The Office of Price Administration said five different gasoline ration cards will be distributed during registration in 17 states and the District of Columbia May 12-14.

War Labor Supply President Roosevelt said plans to register women for war work have been abandoned for the present because there are more women workers now than want jobs than there are jobs available.

Army and Selective Service The War Department established an Eastern military area, including all of the Atlantic Seaboard.

LESS SUGAR WON'T HURT College Station.—With rationing of sugar in the offing, many housewives will have to manage well to have enough for the week-

end breakfast, dinner and supper. According to Hazel Phipps, specialist in food preparation of the A. & M. College Extension Service, people can get along with less sugar and still have tasty, nutritious meals.

Prepare only the amount of sweetened food needed for each person, Miss Phipps suggests, and avoid waste by thoroughly stirring the sugar in ice tea and coffee.

Fresh fruits, which carry their own sugar, make nutritious desserts and dried fruits are a good source of natural sugar.

When substituting honey, use approximately the same quantity.

as the sugar called for in the recipe. But on account of the extra water in honey, decrease normally required by one-fourth cup for each cup of honey used.

It takes about one and one-half times as much sorghum molasses to give the same sweetness as the sugar the recipe calls for.

Miss Phipps cautions that baking temperature should be lowered when honey or molasses is substituted for sugar.
