

Filling stations will no longer purchase scrap rubber at a cent a pound, but may still be avail able as permanent depots for donations of all scrap, metals and rags as well as rubber. "Rubber collection shall con-

tinue as a part of the Salvage Protinue as a part of the Salvage Pro-gram, and, if anything, the drive for rubber should be intensified from now on by our salvage com-mittees and thoir cotoperating agencies, because there is as much need as ever for this material and the farm consists of 222½ acres. 
Just as the A. R. W. Service was about completed Crowell was visited by one of the most devastating cyclones that has ever hit Texas, which also added many extra duties to this office.




