I was notified today ,by Judge Burk, that a Board of Health had been appointed for your town and the town incorporated for sanitary purposes only, hich I am glad to note.
I am enclosing, under separate cover, three copies of the Proposed Sanitary Code, which I hope
your Board will read over carefully and let me know at carehat ordinances therein'you think advisable to adopt to suit local conditions. I think it would be well for one of your doctors to assume the duties of city physician, with whom I could correspond and keep in touch with as to contaBand theme ans then ilie
It has been customary in most such incorporated towns to require all parties to put in box at regular intervals, and a from 50 c ro 75 c charged. If this ordinance is enforced and the scavenger appointed is a pretty sensible fellow, you ought not to have any trouble in collecting a sufficient amount of money to pay him well for his trouble, and he should also be required to Board of fees collected, so that you would have some idea of the revenue and as time advanced increase his duties by making : him put on a wagon for the purpose of cleaning up garbage, trash and the like about the streets at stated intervals. ## PROSPEROUS FARMER FROM MOTLEY COUNTY

J. N. Dillard, the subject of his sketch was born and raised in Johnson county, Texas, on Nolan's river, northwest of Cleburne, ,his father, Uncle Joe Dillard, having located there in the early 40's. J. N. Dillard moved from there to Motley county some 60 miles west of Benjamin, 17 years ago, where he has since become a prominent stock raiser and farmer. In the beginning we wish to state that Mr. ning we wish to state that Mr.
Dillard is one of the most highly Dillard is one of the most highly
respected and well to do citizens respected and well to do citizens
of Motley county and a reputation for honesty, truth and veracity that is above reproach.
In speaking of his success as a farmer, among other things he stated to a reporter as follows He raised his first cotton in that county 14 years ago and, as gins and markets were scarce articles in these parts about that time he was compelled to haul his entir erop to Munday in order to get it ginned and from that point to Seymour, in Baylor county, to find a market. This placed him more than 106 miles from home and the round trip carrying him over 212 miles.
Since that time Mr. Dillard has not missed a single cotton crop in 14 years and has not made a single failure on cotton, grain or feedstuff. In all these years his cotton crop has averaged more than "one half bale per acre.
Mr. Dillard's 1907 erop of cot ton consisted of 32 acres, and from it he marketed 18 bales bringing him in all over $\$ 1000$ Eight bales of this crop were sold by him in Benjamin last week. having driven more than 60 miles to this market.
Land in his section is selling from $\$ 8$ to $\$ 25$ per acre and it can easily be seen by these fig. ures that one crop will easily pay for the land even at the highest price, while at the former price one acre of cotton will easily pay for eight acres of land.
People unacquainted with conditions of this country may yell drought all they please but these and many more like them are facts that can't be downed. It matters not what you may think. farmers in our section just keep thing else they and most anything else they want and your
