"WHY NOT INCORPORATE" IS THE VITAL QUESTION

Among the reasons advanced why Crowell should not be incor porated are that the expenses of city government at present will be too heavy, the depot has not yet been located and we should wait until that time and take it in, then the boundry lines will meet the objection of those a part of whose acreage property they include if established as pro These conditions might be easily remedied.

In the first place, a very small er cent of the city officers' time would be demanded to excute the laws and enforce regulations for sanitary purposes. The taxes, therefore, should be no more than the actual expenses of cleaning the town and keeping it so.
As to the matter of the depot,

it appears foolish to postpone corporation until the depot is located simply in order to include it within the corporate limits. It is not supposed that if the town incorporate at present that its boundry lines would be established for all time. Then the depot could be taken in later unless it is placed out in the try, which is altogether improb-

The settlement of the boundry lines ought to be a very small matter. It is preposterous to grant that a town could not, with sonable satisfaction to all, decide

upon boundry lines.

The News does not expect everyone to see this matter as we see it, but the opposition, if strong enough to defeat the movement for incorporation, will find the News a pupil willing to be taught the soperior merits of a system that might be inaugurated to produce desired and needed results in our town. We fell safe in capitalizing the statement that Crowell will make little headway towards adopting and enforcing sanitary regulations until it has

a government for that purpose.

As to what the commissioners' court can do, they may appoint boards. These may recommend measures and advise each home to keep its premises cleaned, but it will be interesting to see how they will grade streets, fill guljies, gether the waste paper from mesquites and burn it. In short, we don't see how they are going to give the town a general cleaning and then keep it cleaned.

Why PROSPEROUS FARMER FROM MOTLEY COUNTY

J. N. Dillard, the subject of this sketch was born and raised in Johnson county, Texas, on Nolan's river. northwest of burne, ,his father, Uncle Joe Dillard, having located there in the early 40's. J. N. Dillard moved from there to Motley county some 60 miles west of Benjamin, 17 years ago, where he has since become a prominent stock rai-ser and farmer. In the begin-ning we wish to state that Mr. Dillard is one of the most highly respected and well to do citizens of Motley county and a reputation for honesty, truth and veracity that is above reproach.

In speaking of his success as a farmer, among other things he stated to a reporter as follows He raised his first cotton in that county 14 years ago and, as gins and markets were scarce articles in these parts about that time he was compelled to haul his entire crop to Munday in order to get it ginned and from that point Seymour, in Baylor to find a market. Th county to find a market. This placed him more than 106 miles from ome and the round trip carrying him over 212 miles.
Since that time Mr. Dillard has

not missed a single cotton crop in 14 years and has not made a single failure on cotton, grain or feedstuff. In all these years his cotton crop has averaged more than one half bale per acre.

Mr. Dillard's 1907 crop of cot

consisted of 32 acres, and from it he marketed 18 bales, bringing him in all over \$1000. Eight bales of this crop were sold by him in Benjamin last week. having driven more than 60 miles to this market.

Land in his section is selling from \$8 to \$25 per acre and it can easily be seen by these figures that one crop will easily pay for the land even at the highest for eight acres of land.

AMENDED BILL PASSES SENATE.

Mathington, March 28.— The Aldrich Currency Bill Passes by 42
to 16.
Washington, March 28.— The Aldrich currency bill was passed by the
Senate yesterday by a vote of 42 to
61.— in the main a party vote. Previous to the taking of the vote on the
Bailey substitute, authorizing the Gorernment, Instead of National banks,
to issue the emergency circulation for
which the bill provides. The vote on
the substitute stood 42 to 13, and this
vote was entirely partisan, even Senthe substitute stood 2 to 3, and this vote was entirely partisan, even Sen-ator La Follette casting his vote with the Republicans. The bill has been before the Senate since January 2. The vote was not reached until after p. m., and the galleries were prac-

6 p. m. and the galleries were practically empty.

As passed, the bill provides for not more than \$\$50,000,000 of one emergency currency, to be issued by National banks upon the deposit by them of State, county and municipal bonds to be approved by the Secretary of the Treasury. The currency is to be issued with a view to securing an equitable distribution of the currency over the United States and in accordance with the unimpaired capital and surplus of banks in each State, Banks in each State, Banks with the unimpaired capital and expuse of haules in sech State. Banks
are to pay for this ememory circulation one-shift of one per cent per
month during the first four months
it is circulated and afterward threefourths of one per cent a month.
The bill provides that National
banks shall pay not less than one per
cent on Government bonds deposited
with them.

As amended, the bill carries an im-portant change in banking laws relat-ing to bank reserves. This amend-ment provides that of the 16 per cent ment provides that of the 1 per cent reserve required to be kept by banks not in reserve cities four-flifths of this to be kept in the vaults of the banks, and of that amount one-third can be in the form of securities of the kind

By another amendment agreed to By another amenument agreed to yesterday, it was agreed that one-half of one per cent interest to be charged be reduced from six to four months, after which three-fourths of one per cent is to be charged undel redeemed.
