

Home study is not essential, and there is no final examination. Home Nursing certificates are presented to those women who attend the six lessons. The organization of the classes is under the direction of Mrs Moody Bursey. Co-operating with her are Miss Elizabeth Elliott, the Home Demonstration Clubs, Business and Professional Women members of the Columbian and Adelphian study clubs and local citizens. The Crowell classes will be held in the jury room of the court house. Membership in the

classes are open to women interested in learning nursing skill for the care of their family.



S. J. R. No. 8 A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine member: prescribing their qualifications; and providing for their election, tenure of office and

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so

as hereafter to read as follows: "Article 5. Section 2. The Su The Su preme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the con-currence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; pro-vided, that when the business of the court may require, the court may sit in sections as designated by the court to hear argument of causes and to consider applica-tions for writs of error or other preliminary matters. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this state, and unless he shall have attained the age of thirtyfive years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer, or a lawyer and judge of a court of record together at least ten years. Said Justices shall be elected (three of them each two years) by the qualified voters of the state at a general election; shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors elected and qualified; and shall each receive such compensation as shall be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of any Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for state officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the state. The Justices of the Supreme Court who may be office at the time this amend ient takes offect shall continue in office until the expiration of their erm of office under the present onstitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The Judges of the Commission of who may be in office at ime this amendment takes ef-Il become Associate Jusof the Supreme Court and shall continue in office as Associate Justice of the Su the Court until January 1s next preceding the expiration of the term to which he has been ap pointed and until his successor be elected and qualified.

Sec. 2. Said proposed Constructional Amendment shall be sub mitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a specia lection to be held throughout th State on the fourth Saturday August, 1945, at which electio each voter opposing said propose amendment shall scratch off th




