Mrs. Joe English was called to Houston on account of the serious illness of her sister.



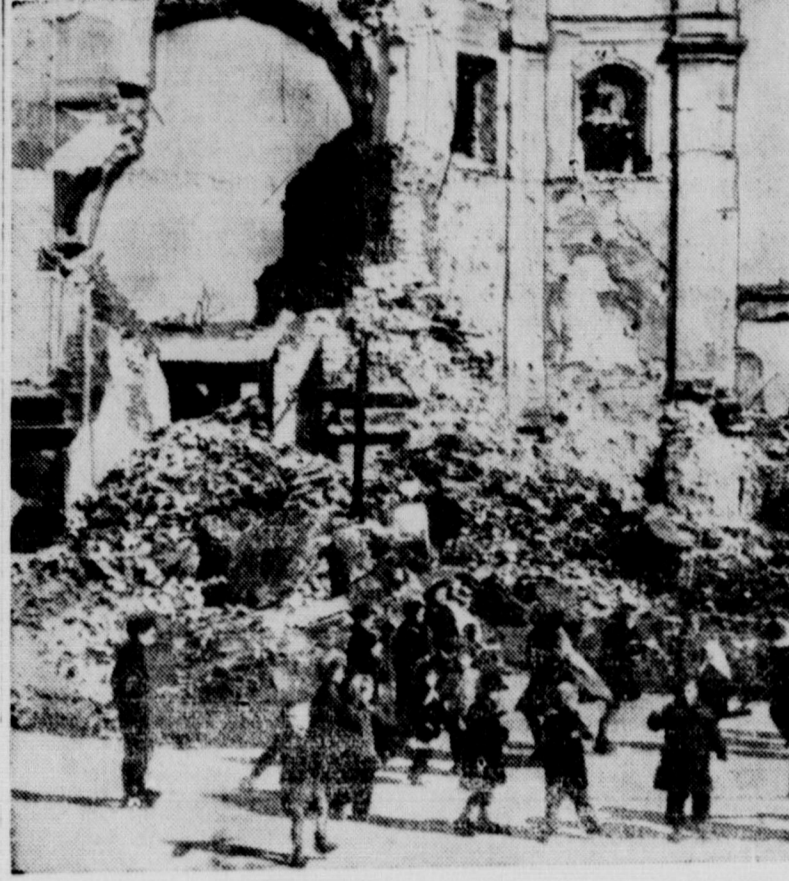
### The Suffering World

Travelers who have returned from war ravaged countries bring home most pathetic stories of the sufferings these people have undergone, and which still menace them. The lack of food and the near starvation diet existing in many localities is a most distressing situation. It is doubtful if ever before in the history of the world has there been such widespread distress. Millions will probably die of starvation before new harvests provide food for their relief.

The shortage of clothing is acute in many lands, and new garments are to be had at only prohibitive prices. Probably there was intense suffering through the winter in many countries from the short supply of fuel.

The people of fighting lands have undergone a terrible mental experience. The loss of sons and husbands has clouded their lives with heavy sorrow. The anxiety for the safety of fighting men has been most distressing. The constant strain resulting from bombardment of their cities and industries has had its depressing effect. Many of these people suffer from shattered nerves and a feeling of hopeless despair.

What is the duty of the American people, as they see all this distress? It is not for us to say,

### Scientists to Have New Opportunity for Study on May 8th

Washington, D. C.—Scientists will have their first opportunity to study cosmic rays and properties of atmosphere 100 miles above the earth May 8, when the U. S. Army begins firing a series of 25 German V-2 rockets at White Sands, N. M.

Twenty-two hundred pound war head attachments, normally carrying the rockets potent explosive armaments, which will give scientific data that has never been heretofore recorded.

Some of the nation's leading industrial and educational laboratories are participating in the tests. The huge missiles, measuring 46 feet in length and 65 inches in diameter, will be fired at the rate of about one a week until all are expended.

As the 14-ton projectile zooms into the sky technicians will constantly check its flight with the use of radar, radio and photography. Radar will trace the entire path, from take off until it hits the ground 80 miles away.

The rocket attains a maximum speed of 3,500 miles per hour after leaving the ground. In the event of misbehavior army ordnance men can give a radio signal to the missile's automatic pilot for fuel shut-off and bring it back to earth immediately.

The people who make too long speeches, who fail to stop when their message is really finished, mar some of the effect their words might produce. Also the too long talkers who interrupt the day's work by their too long calls and too wordy conversation, should look out that they do not interrupt business too far or bore their listeners.

Newspaper writers learn to condense what they have to say. They are forced to do so by the lack of more newspaper space. It would be well also if some public speakers could have training in condensation, and learn to avoid the error of talking too long.

### Food, Home Notes

(By Miss Elizabeth Elliott, County Home Demonstration Agent.)

#### NATIONAL HOME DEMONSTRATION WEEK

National Home Demonstration Week will be observed in Texas, as elsewhere, on May 5 to 12. But the Texas observance is expected to differ considerably from those in the 47 other states and in Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

In addition to receiving public acclaim, club women and 4-H Club girls will work actively in a program to help rebuild war-wrecked homes in other parts of the world. Club women and girls are joining in a gift of gratitude of "the things home demonstration club work has brought to them."

Each women's and girls' club in the state is being asked to give one or more of several kinds of gifts either to their fellow club members in the Philippines or to families in Europe and the Far East. For famine relief, each club may give oatmeal or more cases of evaporated or condensed milk, or one or more cases of other canned food needed especially in hungry areas. Those needed most desperately are meat, fish, peanut butter, baked beans, baby foods, stews, soups and fruits.

In the Philippines the great need is for summer clothing. Distribution of clothing sent by Texas club groups will be handled by Miss Presentation Altierra, Filipino home demonstration agent who with Miss Natividad Brodeth, received part of her field training in Texas homes in the early 1930's. For Philippine relief, clubs are being asked to give one or more cotton garments per club member, one or more bath towels, or two or more feed sacks per club member with needles and thread attached.

Purpose of the nation-wide observance is to focus attention on the contribution of the home and family toward progress and world peace. The theme for the week will be "Today's Home Builds Tomorrow's World."

In connection with National Home Demonstration Week several radio programs are planned in observance of the week. These programs are as follows:

Saturday, May 4, NBC Consumer Time, 11:15 to 11:30 a. m.

Sunday, May 5, CBS Country Journal of the Air, 7:30 to 8:00 a. m. Program will include a 4-

minute interview with a home demonstration club member by Burnham, home editor of Columbia Broadcasting System "Country Journal."

Monday, May 6, DuPont's Parade of America, 7:00 to 7:30 p. m. will include a plug for Home Demonstration Week.

Saturday, May 11, ABC (Network), American Farm program, 11:30 to 12 noon, will include a cross-country picked 3-minute talks by four farm women.

Saturday, May 11, NBC (Network) Home Hour, 12 noon to 1 p. m., will include a 5-minute interview with a farm woman, scheduled up at San Francisco.

Young Children Need Protection Against Measles

Austin.—With the incidence of measles more than sixty per cent higher than the seven year median, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued a statement concerning the use of gamma globulin for protecting very young or frail children from an attack of this perennial childhood disease and its often serious complications.

"If you have a child less than five years old who has been exposed to measles, your family doctor may recommend giving him gamma globulin," Dr. Cox advised. "Through city, county or state health departments, doctors can obtain gamma globulin free to be used as they think advisable. Infants and children, whose health makes it inadvisable for them to

suffer an attack of measles, may postpone the disease if gamma globulin is administered within eight days from the time of exposure."

The State Health Officer emphasized the fact that gamma globulin cannot give a child permanent protection against measles and added that the protection is ordinarily of about three weeks duration. However, there is no limit to the number of times it can be used, and a baby who is protected by it now can be protected by it again in June or July. Gamma globulin can go on shielding him against measles until he is old enough and strong enough to stand an attack without serious consequences.

During an outbreak of measles, Dr. Cox said that it is well to keep children under five years of age, and more especially frail children, from all other youngsters who might serve as sources of infection. Statistics show that nine-tenths of all measles deaths occur in children under five years of age.

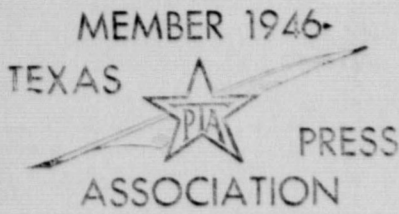

I consider the matter of price control and the prevention of inflation so vital that I feel no patriotic person will buy a single thing knowingly from a black market operator.

Washington News

Washington, D. C., April 26.—The death of Chief Justice Stone of the U. S. Supreme Court is a great loss to the country. He is the 12th Justice to preside over that august tribunal in the more than 150 years history of the country.

The U. S. Supreme Court is the most powerful judicial body in the world. The story is told that a dandy once asked the question "who do you appeal to when you lose your case in the Supreme Court?" The answer was, "To Heaven."

One of the remaining Justices of the Court will be promoted to Chief Justice. Personally I feel the President should select the new Justice from the Southwest-ern area of the United States.

Heretofore a vast majority of the members of the Court have come from the Northeast. In 1944 I introduced a bill in Congress to require geographical distribution of the Justices. The bill provided that at least three of the Justices should come from the states west of the Mississippi River and at least two of them from states east of the Mississippi and South of the Ohio River, roughly the "old South."
