the pond, commonly referred to as "the bloom" or the plankton, make up the main diet of fish. Therefore, the amount of plankton n the water will determine the number of fish present; likewise. the amount of plankton is depen dent on the fertilization program of the lake. A good fertilizer program should be carried on each year, and three months is all the me needed for this program. Make up a mixture of 400 pounds of cottonseed meal and 200 pounds of 20 per cent acid phosphate for each acre of pond area. Broadcast 300 pounds of this fertilizer mixture around the edge of the pond in the early spring, and at 30 day intervals apply 100 pounds until all of the fertilizer has been

applied. A well managed pond also means a well fished pond. One of the greatest troubles in farm pond management is overstocking. Balanced stocking should be practiced fish for your particular pond, and the county agent can help you in properly stocking and managing your fish pond.

Parents Warned to Immunize Children Against Diphtheria

Austin, Texas. - It is a tragthat Texas parents continue allow their babies to suffer and die from that painful and killing disease diphtheria. This is the opinion of Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, who says It is up to the parents. If they protect their children with immunization, they need not have diph-

Dr. Cox said that it is amazing nat this disease should be allowto take its toll of young lives hen it can be entirely stamped by proper immunization. Yet the past week, 33 cases were eported in this state.

"Babies should be immunized by he age of eight or nine months," Cox advised. Authorities on e care of infants recommend a rst dose by the age of eight or e months, and sometimes as early as six months. A second dose usually given later.'

To maintain complete immunity, r. Cox said that a reinforcing of toxoid is advised when a hild is old enough to enter school a Schick test reveals the need f one. Children who have never een immunized certainly should be protected without any further delay, the State Health Officer declared, and added that it is the responsibility of the parents to save the lives of their children.

kiel, 597 B. C. PROCLAMATION OF CYRUS THE proclamation of Cyrus, Ezra 1:1-5, records the happy word to the Jews that they would

not only return, but that the temple would be rebuilt. Cyrus called upon all the people who would to make offerings by which the temple might be restored. Cyrus was acting under divine impulse in this gracious and generous proc-

"The Lord God of heaven hath given me all the kingdoms of the earth; and he hath charged me to build him an house at Jerusalem, which is in Judah," said Cyrus, Ezra 1:2.

Fifty thousand Jews, their hearts rejoicing at the thought of returning to the land of their fathers, set out on the trek of 600 miles, laden with gifts from the Persians for the restoration of the temple in Jerusalem. They could now sing the song of the Lord, and no longer did their harps hang silently on the willow trees.

THE DECREE OF ARTAXERXES

The fourth chapter of Ezra

brings us to the halting of the work on the temple, after they had raised the magnificent sum of approximately \$400,000, and had aid the foundation for the temple, with imposing ceremonies. This delay was occasioned by the jeolousy of the Samaritans, who went to Artaxerxes, through employed counsel, and convinced him that it would be dangerous to allow these Jews to rebuild Jerusalem. At first, the Samaritans proposed that the Jews let them use the temple in joint worship, but the Jews feared the Samaritans and refused their offer. It was then that the Samaritans effected the delay in the building of the temple by the space of 14 years. Meanwhile, the Jews went forward with the building of their homes and re-establishing them-selves and their civilization in Jerusalem.

We come now to the part Haggai played in summoning the Jews to their duty and obligation to God to restore the temple. 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
