A good ratio is one buck to ten does, and each doe can raise two litters per year, and sometimes three with careful management. Five to seven rabbits per litter is the average. Tularemia affects only the wild

rabbits. Domestic rabbits are free of this disease. If the rabbit owner starts his business with good, healthy stock and carries on strict sanitary precautions, he should have little trouble from disease. Here is a word of advise, es-

pecially to the younger rabbit raisers, from Burkett. It doesn't do to get too attached to the rabbits and make pets of them.





Ordinary House Fly Is Menace to Health

Austin, Texas. The ordinary housefly is an enemy to health, and is one of the agents most commonly responsible for the spread of disease throughout the nation, according to Dr. Geo. C. Cox, State Health Officer. Typhoid fever, dysentery, and many other intestinal diseases can often be traced to the common housefly as the carrier of infection.

Speaking in this connection, Dr. Cox advised: "Be sure that your windows and doors are tightly screened so that stray flies will not endanger the health of your family. Keep flies away from food, drink, and utensils used in the preparation of food. Make sure, if you live in rural districts, that outside privy vaults are tightly covered so as not to permit the entrance of flies. Infections from this source can be picked up by flies and spread to human beings through contact with food, drink and utensils.

Keep all garbage covered until collected or buried. Eliminate all breeding places for flies and you will be helping your community in its work of controlling communicable diseases and preventing unnecessary illness.

Dr. Cox said that the State Health Department would furnish upon request a pamphlet out-lining safe and practical methods recommended for use in fly con-


