Health Department Protects General Health in Texas

Austin.—Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, was recently asked to give the duties of the Texas State Department of Health in contrast with those of the general practitioner of medicine.

He stated, "The Health Department is charged with protecting the public health. This it does by education of the people as to how they may secure protection against disease, such as vaccination against smallpox and typhoid fever and immunization against diphtheria; by investigation of sources of outbreaks of disease; by quarantine and isolation of those ill with communicable diseases; by the prevention of the spread of diseases; inspection of water supplies; by advocating the production and use of safe milk and to prevent threatened outbreaks of communicable diseases.

The general practitioner and the Health Department alike believe that it is better to remain healthy than it is to get well after becoming ill, but the Department is engaged in the control and pre-

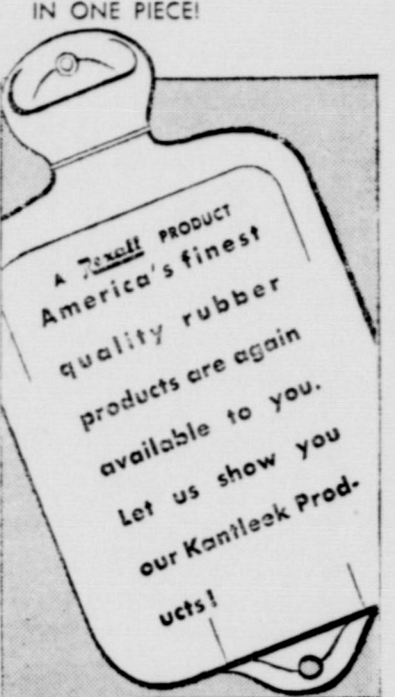
