



appeasement and permitted the sack of Czechoslovakia, which was followed in rapid succession by the invasion of other countries by Hitler's armies. The same atitude permitted Japan to invade and lay waste to China, and Mussolini to plunder and rob Ethiopia. The facts naturally raise doubt in the minds of sincere thinking people regarding the virtue of a policy of appeasement in a world so full of human greed and ruthess, power mad, ambitious lead-

The immediate result of the Wallace speech is a severe blow to the peace conference.
