Improvements and Additions Made at Methodist Church

As a result of a campaign recently inaugurated at the Methodist Church in Crowell, a number of improvements have been made and new outstanding equipment added to the church plant. The first move toward perfecting the project was putting a new roof on the church. It is thought by those in authority that the new roof will be entirely satisfactory and will prove to be able to shed any rain which may come. That remains until heavy rains come to be satisfactorily tested. A thorough plan for repair and re-decoration of the interior of the building is awaiting the proven roof. At the same time the new roof was put on, two large air conditioners were installed, which makes the building comfortable even in the hottest weather. A public address system has also been installed, the gift of the George Self family. In June, a new Hammond Electric Organ and inside chimes were installed and paid for by the entire membership of the church. In July, mass amplified chimes were added. C. P. Sandifer made the outside chimes possible. These have a two-mile range and it is expected that much enjoyment may be had by the entire community through these chimes. In August, a large pulpit Bible and a Speed-O-Print for use in printing church bulletins and other necessary publications for the church work was the gift of C. D. Campbell.

Smith states that the services will be held at the new Baptist Church which, though not quite complete, has already been used for service. Veterans News

Army Engineers have been given the "green light" on construction of new Veterans Administration hospitals at Shreveport, La., and Big Spring, Texas, VA announced this week.

It is expected that the engineers will advertise for bids on the hospitals within sixty days. Meanwhile, by order of General Omar Bradley, VA's new hospital construction program was being considerably revised because of the mounting costs of building.

In order to build the hospitals with the money originally appropriated by Congress, it will be necessary to eliminate all features not essential to good medical treatment for veterans, Bradley said.

It is expected that major modifications in plans for hospitals at Bonham and Dallas, Texas, New Orleans, La., and Mound Bayou and Tupelo, Miss., will be made. Plans for hospitals at Houston and El Paso, Texas, will not be affected by the order.

Desirable but unessential features such as theaters, office space and doctors and nurses quarters are being eliminated from plans to cut the cost of the new hospital construction program.

A record enrollment of nearly 100,000 World War II veterans in southwestern colleges and universities this fall is anticipated by the Veterans Administration and educators.

VA officials expect about a 15 per cent increase in the number of veterans attending college under the GI Bill as compared to last spring's enrollment of 85,000 in the higher institutions of learning in Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi.

Veterans entering school for the first time should obtain their certificates of eligibility immediately from the proper VA regional office. Others who plan to change schools or courses of study this fall must obtain prior approval from VA.

Veterans May Take Course in Technical Institute, Fort Worth

Fort Worth, Texas (Special)—The Technical Institute of the Ft. Worth Public Schools has announced a new course of study that is of special interest to veterans. In just fourteen months students of Technical Institute may now qualify for Airplane Mechanics licenses, without serving an apprenticeship.

The Aircraft School of Technical Institute is licensed by the Civil Aeronautics Authority. Instructors, equipment, facilities and courses of study and likewise accredited by the C. A. A. The school is fully approved by the Veteran's Administration, and veterans attending the school are eligible to receive tuition fees, necessary equipment and subsistence under the G. I. Bill.

Fourteen other courses are offered by Technical Institute, a non-profit organization. Included are courses in air conditioning, auto mechanics radio and electronics, machine shop practice, and printing. New classes start September 2. Anyone desiring more information is invited to write to Technical Institute, 3400 Crestline Road, Fort Worth. A catalog and complete information will be sent without charge.

J. L. Guley of Quanah defeated D. W. Eubanks of Truscott, 1-up, in the second flight. Consolation winner was G. W. Scales of Thalia, who defeated Clyde Myers of Truscott.

Third flight winner was J. D. Horne of Gilliland, who defeated Billy Brown of Thalia, 3 to 2. Consolation winner of this flight was Charles Wood of Thalia, who won over R. W. Hughes of Quanah, 1-up.

Appropriate prizes were awarded to winners, runners-up and consolation winners. Lunch was served to over 150 persons.

A large gallery of spectators followed the finals in the championship and first flights in spite of the intense heat. The match between Murrell and Maxey featured long driving and fine approach shots by both contestants.

Body of L. F. Weber Found in Cistern Tuesday Morning

Last Rites Held at Funeral Home Chapel Wednesday

The body of L. F. Weber, long-time resident of the Vivian community, was found Tuesday morning in the cistern at his farm home. Mr. Weber had not been seen around the house for three or four days and the fact that his horses needed water, aroused the attention of his neighbors and the search was begun and the body was found in the cistern about 12 o'clock.

Sheriff Ed Dunn, Deputy Greer Reinhardt and Justice of the Peace Ben Greening were called to the scene of the tragedy and it was the general opinion that Mr. Weber met his death by natural causes.

Funeral services were held in the chapel of the Womack Funeral Home Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock conducted by Rev. D. D. Denison, pastor of the Methodist Church, and Rev. N. B. Moon, pastor of the Baptist Church.

Pall bearers were Dick Carroll, Arthur Sandlin, Wayne Dishman, J. Don Lewis, S. J. Lewis and Bruce Benham.

Louis Frederick Weber was born Aug. 17, 1873, at Watertown, Wis. He came to Foard County thirty-two years ago and had been engaged in operating his farm since that time. Mr. Weber was a good citizen, quiet and unassuming in disposition, and was highly esteemed by the people of the Vivian community, and had many friends all over the county.

Survivors include five brothers, Max Weber and A. J. Weber, of Springfield, Mo., and W. G. Weber, A. P. Weber and Gus A. Weber, of Liberty Kan. The latter brother and a nephew, George Weber, of Liberty were here to attend the funeral. Sixteen nieces and nephews also survive.

T-Sgt. Fred Mabe and Family Arrived at Home August 5

T-Sgt. Fred Mabe and wife and small daughter, Barbara Ann, arrived in Crowell Tuesday of last week, Aug. 5, from Lechorn, Italy, for a visit with Sgt. Mabe's parents, Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Mabe, of Crowell.

Sgt. Mabe entered the service March 23, 1942, and was in the African, Sicilian and Italian campaigns and has been living in Italy since the war ended. He was married to Miss Mina Testa of Florence, Italy, Sept. 3, 1945.

Sgt. Mabe is now on terminal leave and will receive his discharge after 60 days. Following the end of the war Sgt. Mabe was with the 2610 Reumount Station of the Peninsula Bay Section.

Credit Association Recommends 3-Point Program at Meeting

A three-point program for farmers and ranchers under today's "high price conditions" was recommended by officers and directors of ten production credit associations in an annual conference in Amarillo July 28 through July 31, according to R. B. McMurry, president of the Memphis Association.

First, the group recommended that proper soil conservation practices be followed, Mr. McMurry said. "Good productive land is the best assurance of future income from which to meet expenses and repay debts. The more a farmer or rancher does to protect and build his soil, the better credit rating he will have with his production credit association. The association can go with him further and stay with him longer if he keeps his land highly productive so he can get a greater income from his operations year after year."

Second, the directors recommended that farmers and ranchers reduce debts while prices are high. Figures were cited showing that in 1939 it took 11 steers weighing 1,000 pounds each to pay a \$1,000 debt. In 1932, it took 24 steers; in 1939-1945, in 1941-1942; in 1946-8, in 1946-7.

Third, the group recommended that production credit associations complete their job of retiring their government capital. Reports showed that on May 31, 1947, the 36 associations in Texas had \$3,856,389 in earned surplus, \$6,227,090 in member-owned capital and that the government's investment is down to \$2,455,000.

The Memphis Production Credit Association has 812 stockholders.

Hardeman County Gets \$25,000 for Pease Flood Control

The sum of \$25,000 has been allotted Hardeman County by the State Highway Department for building jetties and flood control dikes near the Pease River bridge between Foard and Hardeman Counties, according to a news item in last week's issue of the Prairie-Chief.

The course of the river has changed in recent years, according to the article, and the change is forcing the cut bank far back on valuable property. The money will be spent to control the flood waters.

Opportunity Still Open to Reinstate F. I. Insurance

Attention is called to all veterans who have let their insurance lapse that it is still possible for them to reinstate this insurance by paying only two monthly premiums. L. T. Nance, contact representative of the Veterans Administration, stated in this office Tuesday that one premium for the 31 days of grace after the policy lapsed, the other premium pays for the current month and the veteran can continue to pay the premiums at same rate as while he was in service.

Veterans may reinstate any amount from \$1,000 to \$10,000 in multiples of \$500. Those who served the military service between January 1, 1916, have eight months from the effective date of discharge to carry it as term insurance. There are six permanent rates of G. I. insurance. Mr. Nance said, namely: Ordinary life, 30-year life, 20-year term, endowment at age 60, and endowment at age 65.

Veterans wishing to reinstate their insurance, should contact Mr. Nance, who will be in the county court house, Room 130, from 1:30 p. m. to 4 p. m. in the county court house. Reinstatement by paying two premiums without physical examination.

Miss Ina Mae Hardin Awarded Scholarship to Mary Hardin-Baylor

Miss Ina Mae Hardin, Crowell, has been awarded the Fannie Breedlove Davis Scholarship from District 11 of the Texas Baptist Woman's Missionary Union, for the 1947-48 school year at Mary Hardin-Baylor college, which began September 12. Miss Hardin was selected from a group of applicants in 13 counties in Northwest Texas, which comprise the district, according to President Gordon G. Singleton.

The scholarship is awarded in honor of one of Mary Hardin-Baylor's former students, Mrs. Fannie Breedlove Davis, who led in the organization of the Texas W. M. U., and who aided in the founding of the Southwide W. M. U. She served as the first president of the Texas W. M. U.

Miss Hardin is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jeff F. Hardin. She is a graduate of Crowell High School, where she was a member of the Future Homemakers of America, pep squad, Girl's Reserve, Girl's club, and counselor for the Girls' Auxiliary. She is planning to enter the field of church work after graduation from college.







The repeated advances in the price of coal and the uncertainty of its uninterrupted supply are going to result in a good many switching over to oil and gas. The further development of atomic energy may also enter into the picture and displace coal in many types of industry.

Stalin, on the other hand, wants the little countries of Europe to decide upon the Russian form of government and then he will compel them to set it up.

The Supreme court has ruled the Petrillo law to be unconstitutional. The Petrillo law which was jammed through a rabbit Congress requires the broadcasting stations to hire more musicians than they have need for.

Contrary to the general supposition only one out of four marriages goes on the rocks. The record shows that there were 2,300,000 marriages last year and but 600,000 divorces.

Straight Thinking About Drinking

LESSON TEXT FOR AUGUST 17—Proverbs 20:1; 23:19-21, 29-35; Ecclesiastes 10:17.

MEMORY SELECTION—Be not drunk with wine, wherein is excess; but be filled with the Spirit.—Ephesians 5:18.

The increase in the drinking habits of our nation is a source of concern, not only to the forces of morality, but to the liquor interests themselves. How strange it is to have the purveyors of a commodity urge moderation in its use!

Undoubtedly the Bible's answer to this whole problem is the only right one. The Word of God has many strong things to say concerning alcoholic beverages. Wise is the man who heeds the injunctions of Scripture.

I. Liquor—a Description (Prov. 20:1). What a striking text this! Think of its implications. "Wine is a mocker." It grasps its victim in a vice-like grip, and then taunts him of his inability to release himself. The drunkard is a victim of his own appetite, helpless to resist the temptation which ensnares him.

The young person who takes his first drink for sociability is indeed deceived, in that alcoholic liquor never reveals the possible cost which it exacts from the one who takes that first drink. The better part of valor is to leave the stuff alone.

The Word of God says further that "strong drink is a brawler" (A.S.V.). All of us have probably seen how the drunkard enters into conflict entirely without reason. Liquor seems to make a man senseless to danger and quick to express anger.

H. Liquor—a Warning (Prov. 23:19-21). The admonition of this passage is that we should not be found among drunkards and gluttonous men.

Solomon here tells us of one of the results of drunkenness and gluttony—poverty. The drowsiness which is the result of both of these sins does indeed clothe a man with rags.

If, therefore, we have no higher motive than that of self-respect, than that of having enough of this world's goods to make a presentable appearance, we should avoid company with those who will lead us into the same excess that characterizes them. How important it is that we guide our hearts in God's way.

Let us understand, of course, that there are far higher motives for right living than those involved here. However, if we can come to the conclusion to avoid drinking on the basis of a lower motive, how much more important it is to come to the same conclusion on the basis of a higher one. As Christians, that higher motive concerns our testimony before men, our living a life that will cause others to want to know Christ; in short, our living for the glory of God.

III. Liquor—a History (Prov. 23:29-35; Eccles. 10:17). In the first of these Scripture passages we have what may be called a history of drunkenness. This sin leads to woe, to sorrow, to contentions, to wounds without a cause.

But that is not the end. Look carefully at Proverbs 23:32 and stress the first three words, "At the last." At the last, it does indeed bite like a serpent and sting like an adder.

Such poison is injected into one's body and soul that it seems as though there is no remedy. Thank God, there is a remedy, there is power in the blood of Christ to make the foulest clean.

In verses 33 to 35 we read some of the results of drunkenness: Beholding of strange things (v. 33), utterance of perverse things (v. 33), insensibility which is the result of drinking (v. 35), and inability to avoid succumbing to the same temptation all over again (v. 35).

Is it any wonder that the admonition is "Look not thou upon the wine when it is red, when it sparkleth in the cup, when it goes down smoothly." Although man still has a semblance of right thinking, the temptation is great enough to deceive him as to the consequences.

In view of such results, is it any wonder this same Preacher says in Ecclesiastes 10:17 that the land is blessed when its rulers eat and drink for strength and not for drunkenness.

It still is true that righteousness exalteth a nation, but that sin is a reproach to any people. And since the princes of the land as the leaders will frequently personify the people of the land as the followers, happy is that nation which has godly governors.


