Now Is the Time to **Doctor Cattle for Grub Worms**

Joe Burkett, County Agent, wants to remind all cattle and dairymen that now is the time to do something about cattle grubs. Cattle grubs cause the loss of five million dollars to Texas farm-ers and ranchers each year, they make beef cattle harder to fatten, cut down on milk production,

Control of the grub isn't par-ticularly hard, takes a little time, that's all. Extension entomologists recommend rotenone, in fact, it's the only material they do recommend. It's safe, effective and has proved its value over a period of years. During the war, rotenone was rather scarce, but

a pretty good supply is on the market this year. Whether you spray, dust, wash or dip your stock, it should be done at least three times before spring, at 30 day intervale. For the spray use 71/2 pounds of five per cent rotenone in 100 gallons of water. For the dust, mix thoroughly one part of five per pent rotenone powder with and a half ounces per animal, rubbing it into the back thorough-



Social Security Account Cards Needed by Workers

Increased employment during holiday season brings many ests for account number cards o the Wichita Falls social securty office, Erton F. Tate, manager announced. "Seasonal and part-time workers in stores, shops and other commercial establishments need a social security card just like regular and full-time employees. Every worker should show his card to the employer when he goes to work," Tate pointed out. "Employers," said Tate, "are required to report quarterly to he Collector of Internal Revenue the correct amount of wages paid to each part-time and regular worker with his or her social securty account number. Both the worker's name and social security number are needed to give the proper wage credit on the Social Security Administration's records. If this is not done, the worker may lose certain benefit rights.

"Account numbers are issued at our office in Wichita Falls in the Post Office building. Appli-cations may be obtained at any post office and mailed to our of

ures for the nation over a four-month period (May through August of this year) shows that over 45 per cent of the loans made were on new construction, and that the remainder were on homes previously occupied, for which the sales price averaged \$6,675.

With a current average of 48,-000 veterans monthly using their loan guarantee rights for home purchases, this means that about 22,000 new homes per month are being sold to veterans under the

Since the first GI loan made late in 1944, over 971,000 veterans had received VA-guaranteed home loans as of the end of October. The total value of their home purchases exceeds \$5,-610,000,000.

Only a month remains in which most National Service Life Insurance policies that have lapsed may be reinstated without necessity of taking a physical examination, the Veterans Administration

After the deadline date of December 31, 1947, policies that have lapsed more than three months cannot be reinstated without the veteran proving his insurability by a complete physical




