

Ex-Service Man **Food, Home Notes** Makes Good

(By Miss Elizabeth Elliott, Couny Home Demonstration Agent.)

TWO-ONE APRON

One of the latest clothing developments off the designing board is what might be called a two-in-one apron, which is made to give your knees protection when doing kneeling jobs, and also to give you a spacious pocket in which you can carry anything from a packet of seed on up to a mess of turnip greens.

The apron has a big pocket, which is buttoned instead of sewed on. When you're ready to do a kneeling job, you simply unbutton the big pocket and turn it inside out and over the knees. Then you're protected from dirt and dampness. When the job is finished, fold up the pocket, button it, and you have a handy place to tuck away gloves, seed packets, markers, or any other small things that may get lost.

If you try making this apron, use a sturdy cotton material, and line the pocket with a plastic material that is both washable and water proof. Then when you turn the pocket outward to kneel on, the plastic material will protect your knees from wet ground

ARRANGE FOR SITTING

Here's a question that housewives may want to ask yourself: "Why do I always stand up to do jobs like ironing, polishing silver, peeling potatoes, mixing bread and packing lunches?"

Most women answer that ques tion by saying that these jobs go faster when they do them stand-ing. This is true only when our kitchens and laundries are not arranged for convenient sitting. All too often the only seat in the kitchen is a high stool on which we have to perch with our feet dangling and our backs bent un

Protection Against Typhoid Fever

Austin.-If you have not been vaccinated against typhoid fever within the last two or three years, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, advises you to go to your doctor or to the nearest health officer and have him give you the three "shots" that will protect you against the disease.

"The three shots that will protect against typhoid are given at intervals of one week apart," Dr. Cox stated. "As it takes some time for the protective treatment to be established throughout the system, it is wise not to delay in having it done. My advice is, have it done now so that immunization may be complete before summer arrives and vacation trips are tak-
