If it is possible to find the ant colony, pour a small amount of a two or three per cent oil solution of the chlordane in the entrance. Then check the nests about a week later, and if necessary, repeat the treatment.

In spraying in the home, an ordinary house spray gun may be used. The baseboards, door and window cases, around builtfeatures and the drainboards should be wet almost to the running point with the spray. Give the cracks an extra dose. An oil solution of the same strength as that used for killing out ant colonies is recommended.

"Remember that chlordane is poisonous," Mr. Burkett warns. 'Foods, dishes, and cooking utensils should be taken out of the kitchen-or put where the spray won't reach them—until after the spray has settled. Follow the man-


The chlordane works on outdoor ant colonies, too. For ants in the lawn, a dust of five per cent chlordane is good, while red ant colonies can be killed out with a teacupful of two or three per cent solution. One treatment is generally enough to kill the nest, Mr. Burkett says.

Death Rates in Texas at Lowest Level in History

Austin, Texa -- Infant and mortality rates in Texas are at their lowest level in the history of the t te. according to figures released Bureau of Vital Statistics of the State Health Department. Mrs. Sam Denton was quite Infant mortality has reached a low of 41.2 death for every 1000 live births.

Compared to the figures for 1940, this represents a reduction of more than 39 per cent. In that year, there were 197,023 live births and 8,685 deaths. But despite these gains, Texas still has the sixth highest infant mortality rate in the United States, with fory-two states reporting lower rates.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health officer, attributes the reduction to the increase in public response to the educational efforts of the Texas State Department of Health. "We have reason for pride it our reduced infant and maternal mortality when it is realized that the reduction means in excess of 5000 babies are being saved annually which would have otherwise died," Dr. Cox said. "In addition, the birth rate is higher than the 1940 figure by more than 71,-

The comparison between the live pirths figures for 1920 and 1947, shows white births up 22,707; Latin American births up 7,186; and Negro births up 3,297. The report also shows maternal

mortality has been reduced over 65 per cent. In 1940, the rate was 4.6 for every 1000 live births as compared to 1.6 for 1947.
